It Is Possible To Have All Of Our Streets In Lockney

Under the National Industrial Recovery Act it is possible for Lockney to pave all of its streets by borrowing the money from the Administrator of Public Works and give them as security a lien on the property paved. The Santa Rosa Rock Asphalt Co. estimates that it will cost \$100 for a fifty-foot front lot. To make it easily paid by property owners payments can be scattered over a period of ten or twelve years. A payment would have to be made the first year. Say that a loan is secured for eleven years. No payment is made the first year, then owner would pay ten dollars per year for the next ten years the property for ten years for paving in front of a fifty-foot lot. Almost any property owner can pay that amount.

First Feed To Drouth Zones

The first carloads of feed for livestock have been shipped into the eight drouth-stricken Panhandle counties, according to members of the Potter County Relief Commission, who are acting as purchasing agents.

Eight carloads of hay purchased at Plainview, eight carloads of cottonseed meal, bought in Clarendon, Sweetwater and Quanah, two carloads of brand purchased in Wichita Falls, and one of corn bought at Stamford comprised the first shipment.

They will be paid for from funds distributed to each county by the Texas Relief Commission. The local committee is acting only as purchasing agents to take advantage of buying in carload lots. P. C. Bennett, Potter County farm agent, is advisor to the committee.

More than \$27,000 has been set aside to distribute to the eight counties, Dallam, Hartley, Moore, Sherman, Ochiltree, Hansford, Deaf Smith, and Oldham.

The money comes from the emergency fund of the Texas Relief Commission, which is administering the federal aid. The farmers will work some county project in exchange for the feed.

We regret to lose them as citizens of Lockney, but wish them well in their new location.

Farmers Are Co-operating In Cotton Reduction Plan

According to reports reaching this office, the farmers of the north half of Floyd county are cooperating with Secretary of Agriculture Wallace in his cotton reduction program and are signing contracts to reduce their acreage in cotton this year by plowing up a certain number of acres. We are of the opinion that Floyd county will go over big with this program.

The local committee is out of blank contracts but will perhaps receive another supply today. Something like twenty-five farmers were in the office Wednesday to sign contracts and were disappointed that no blanks were available. This is no fault of the committee, as the delay was caused in shipping from the source of supply. As we understand it, Saturday night is the last day for signing of contracts unless the time is extended by Secretary of Agriculture Wallace. If you are going to take advantage of the offer of the government in reducing your cotton acreage, you had better act on this matter at once. If the plan is not to go over and cotton is to be no one will be to blame but the producer of cotton. It is strictly up to the farmer whether he wants to live on a program of this kind in any year or not. Some take the attitude that they will go over and they will get the benefit, but instead of getting the benefit, they will get the loss.

In planting cultivating and picking a cotton crop when you buy cotton from the government 6c per pound and get cash besides, then if cotton advances in price you get the benefit of the advance also. If it goes to ten cents you make \$20 per bale and don't have to buy your hand. If you plant a big crop and a good yield is made all over cotton belt and you receive 3c you receive \$15 per bale an have to take it, have it ginned, etc. If the price below 6c you don't make anything except the cash advance by the government and that would perhaps be as much or more than you make on your crop.

We Must Get More Money Into The Hands Of People

The first task or objective under the national recovery law is to get more money into the hands of the people, so they may buy more goods, so stores and factories will hire millions of the unemployed to meet the demand. To do this, the law makes possible a cut in the number of hours now worked by men with jobs. Others then will have to be hired to do part of the work. At the same time the rate of pay is to be increased so that working less time, men will still make a living wage or better, and be able to spend enough to help business make jobs for yet more men.

Procedure Explained
The law lets all business in the same line get together and voluntarily agree to do this. The procedure for accomplishing the object is:

A representative of one industry drafts a code of fair competition. Since enactment of the Sherman anti-trust law in 1890 companies in the same line have been prevented from getting together but the national recovery allows it for two years.

The code, for the present, is only to set the minimum wage that the industry may pay, and fix the maximum with, possibly, provisions for bidding hours that any employe shall work, selling below cost of production, to eliminate "sweatshop" competition.

...the buying public may suggest changes to meet their needs. The law permits employes the right to organize any way they choose, and employers are forbidden to interfere.

Johnson is aided, in considering the elements, by three boards, one of arbitrators, one of labor experts and one of representatives of consumers. Each must advise from the viewpoint of his group.

When they agree upon terms of the code, it is up to Johnson. When he approves, it passes to President Roosevelt, who has reserved final say on all agreements. Once the codes are promulgated they have the force of law, so all plants within the specified industries must abide by their terms.

If any firm refuses to act under its industry's code, the president can compel it to do so by requiring the whole industry to take out licenses, closing down the one which does not qualify by accepting the code.

If any industry refuses to adopt a code, the government may force one and order it enforced.

While increasing wage and jobs is the emergency phase of the law, later the codes may be expanded to outlaw unfair competition.

About 35,000,000 pounds of wool have been sold in Texas at prices ranging from a low of 12 to a high of 28 1/2 cents a pound. The bulk sold at prices of 20 to 26 cents. It is expected that the remaining 5,000,000 unsold in the state will go at prices of 25 to 27 cents a pound or higher. A conservative estimate of the average price of the 40,000,000 pounds of wool sold in Texas this season is 22 cents a pound, or a total of \$8,800,000.
