



NRA OPPOSING SHORTER HOURS

Agreements To Shorten Store Hours Are Declared Not In Keeping With The Spirit Of President's Program

WASHINGTON, Aug. 7.—The official NRA attitude is that shorter business hours conflict with the president's blanket code.

A. D. Whiteside, deputy administrator, has wired the Indian Retail Grocers association urging it to "give serious consideration to the fact that in several local communities retailers are making joint agreements to shorten store hours."

Violates Agreement

"This is not in keeping," he stated "with either the spirit or the fact as expressed in the president's reemployment agreement or in the president's statements regarding reemployment of which the essence is to effect an increase both in reemployment and in wages to those employed.


"The proposal to shorten store hours is in violation of section 8 of the president's reemployment agreement. Re consideration of the provision of the retail codes and possible withdrawai of insignia will be necessary immediately if community or concerted action to shorten store operating hours is taken."
