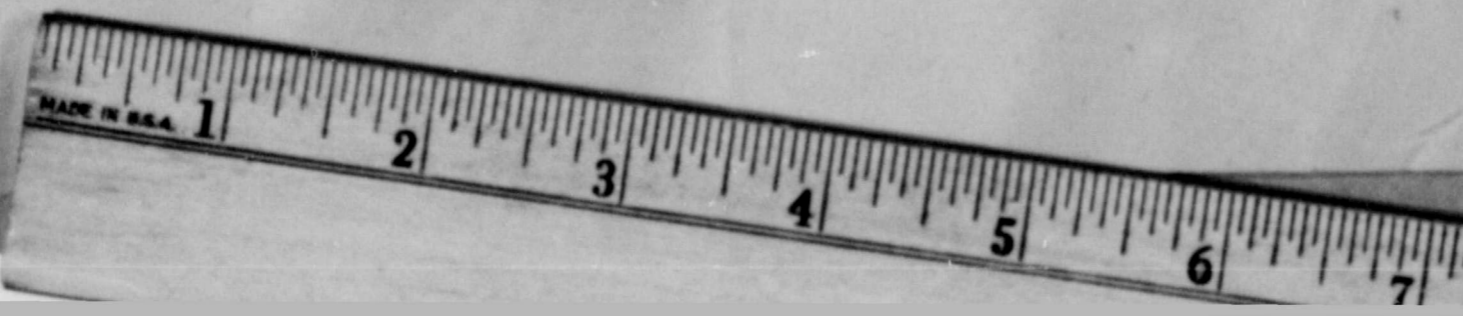

Chevrolet dealers delivered 43,311 units during the first twenty days of May, according to William E. Holler, general sales manager of Chevrolet Motor Company.

Retail deliveries during the year to May 20 totaled 324,344 against 223,857 units for the same period of 1933, 145 per cent of the same time last year.

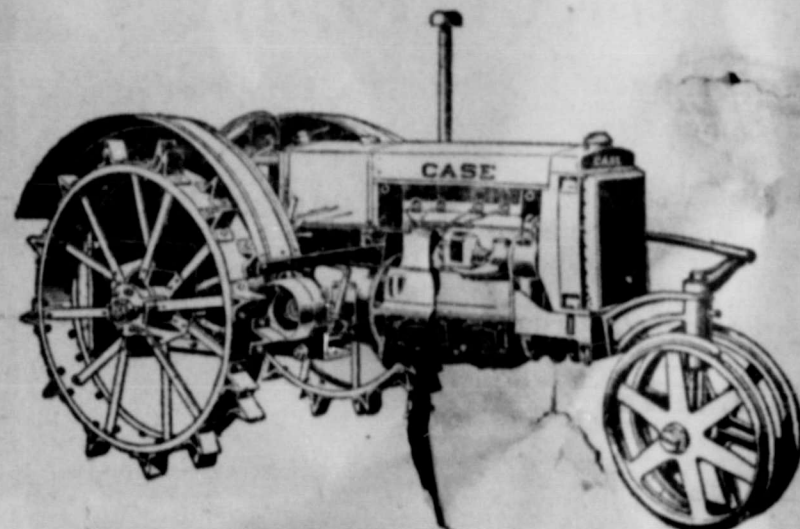

FLOYD AND HALE COUNTY RESIDENT 45 YEARS DIED SUNDAY

Funeral Services Held At Plainview Monday

Due to a heart attack, death claimed Rufus Madison Irick, pioneer resident of Floyd and Hale counties, Sunday evening at his home, 111 East Second Street at Plainview. Mr Irick was 79 years old and had lived on the plains 45 years.

Funeral services were held Monday afternoon at 4 o'clock at the First Baptist Church of which he was a member, with Rev. J. Pat Horton, pastor, officiating. Burial was in the Plain-

view Cemetery.

Mr. Irick was born July 17, 1854, at Knoxville, Tenn. Immediately following the Civil war he came with his parents to Texas and settled in Fannin County, near Bonham, and it was there that he and Miss Amanda Caroline Myres were married December 1, 1875.

In 1882 he and his family moved to Throckmorton County and from there they came to Floyd county, settling in 1889 in what is now known as the Irick Community. They moved to Plainview in 1897.

The First Baptist Church and the first school in Floyd County were organized in Mr. Irick's home and he was foreman of the first grandjury in this county. He

also assisted in the organization of the county. The passing away of Mr. Irick will mean one less to attend the old-timers reunion at Floydada next year.

He helped to organize the old Llano Estacado Baptist Church Association and for 27 years was very active as a layman.

After coming to the Plains Mr Irick was a freighter, a stockman, and did construction work. For years he operated a merchantile establishment and also carried funeral supplies. He served as a pioneer undertaker and even built the caskets used in this country.

Pall bearers were G. W. McDonald, Grady Shipp, H. L. Gunter, J. D. Hatcher, Jo. Wayland, Jack Gallaway, Mont Carter and Bob Newton.

Surviving are his widow, Mrs. Amanda Irick, three daughters, Mrs. Adeline Thomas of Aberdeen, Wash., Mrs. Burt Holly of San Gabriel Calif., and Mrs. Tom Vaughn of Plainview; a son Roy Irick of Plainview, sixteen grandchildren, and nine great-grandchildren.

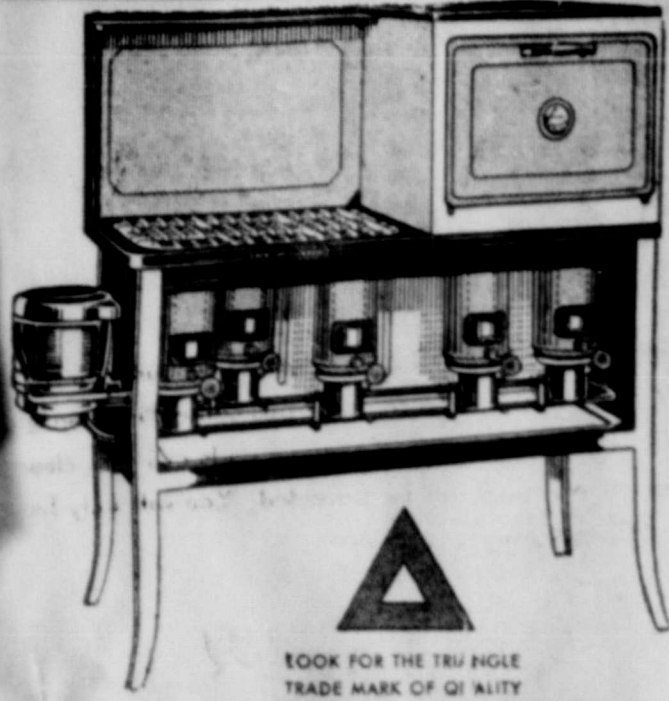

STATE GIVEN RIGHT TO CUT GAS RATES

AUSTIN, June 5 —District Judge Charles Wheeler today ruled that the state has the right to maintain a suit to enforce reduced gas rate ordered by the Railroad Commission.

He ruled also, however, that the state cannot ask any money judgment to reimburse consumers

for "excessive" charges collected after the reduced rate was ordered to become effective.

In effect, Judge Wheeler's ruling left in force the state's suit for injunction to require the Lone Star Gas Company to abide by the present rate for gas set by the Railroad Commission September 13, 1933, but denied the state the right to ask penalties for failure to observe the reduced rate. The utility has continued to charge 40 cents a thousand cubic feet at city gates.

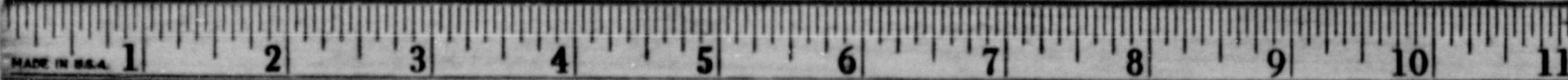

RAISIN PUFFS

1-2 cup butter,
1-2 cup sugar,
2 eggs.

1 cup sweet milk
2 cups flour,
3 tsp. K. C. baking powder,
1 cup raisins

When black cloth becomes shiny, rub the spots with slices of raw potatoe.

Small dainty pieces of laundry such as laces, fine handkerchiefs and neckpieces will wear much longer if they are put inside a bag to launder. They are seldom very dirty and need not be rubbed hard to clean.

Starch your linen before you mark it with indelible ink. The starch will prevent the ink from blurring.

Scorched spots can be removed by laying a thick paste of starch over the spot, making the paste with just enough water to make the starch stick well. Let the starch dry on the material and then wash thoroughly.

Try adding an apple to your vegetable soup. It improves the flavor greatly.

Left over rolls and biscuits may be freshened by placing them in a paper bag, tying the mouth securely, sprinkling the bag with water and placing the whole thing in the warming oven. They taste and feel like fresh ones.

If the rolls of your wringer are greasy, rub them with a bit of paraffin and the grease is easily removed.

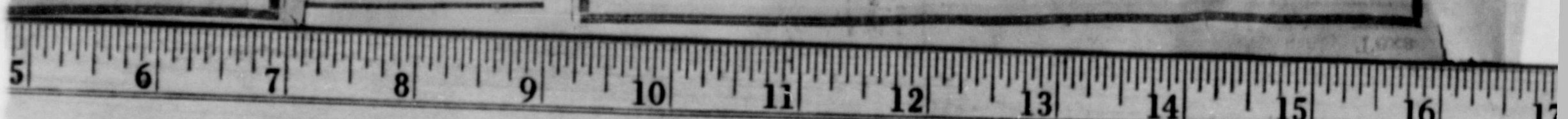



This does not mean that farmers were dishonest in giving their production figures, the Board says, but that farmers had no way of knowing exactly what they had produced for five years. Production figures were of necessity estimates based largely on memory. The same was true of acreage figures. A farmer assumed he had 100 acres in a field but it might have been 90 acres or 110 acres if actually measured. On the other hand, the Bureau of Crop Estimates knows with great accuracy the total bales produced in Texas every year. The average of this for five years

became the Texas allotment. This was apportioned out among counties on the basis of local ginings taken into account. It was imperative if there was to be a cotton program at all that the total cotton production given by farmers in their contracts added to that of no signers not exceed the known state total. That is why cuts were necessary, the Board explains.

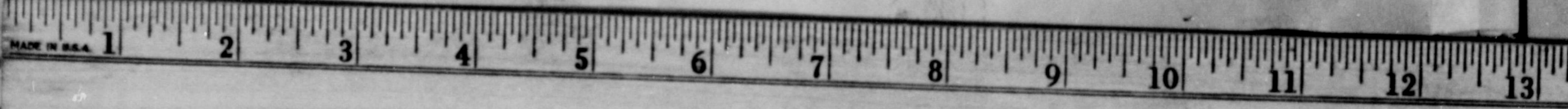
