FUNERAL SERVICES HELD FOR MRS. "KITTY" FOSTER SATURDAY

Had Made Lockney Her Home For The Past Twenty-Six Years

Funeral services for Mrs. "Kittie" Foster, age 71 years, were held on the lawn of her home in West Lockney, Saturday afternoon at 4:00 o'clock. Services were conducted by Rev. B. J. Osborn pastor of the Methodist church, this city. Interment was in the Lockney Cemetery.

"Aunt Kittie" as she was called by her many friends in this community, had been in ill health for some time, however, her going so suddenly was a shock to the community. She had made this city her home for the past 26 years. Her husband preceded her in death on March 25th 1913. She is survived by her two sons, Emory Foster of Amarillo and Tommie Foster of this city and two sisters, Mrs. Emma Foster and Mrs. J. C. McWhorter, of Amarillo.

Mrs. Foster was the eldest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. R. S. Ferguson. She was born on July 10, 1863 at Salado, Bell county, Texas. On May 20 1891 she married Alex H. Foster of Georgetown, Texas. In 1903, she with her husband moved to Plainview, 5 Years later moving to Lockney.

ED (PERCH MOUTH) STANTON BREAKS JAIL AT LUBBOCK SUNDAY

Deputy Overpowered In Surprise Attack When He Goes To Feed Prisoners

Four desperadoes who slugged their way out of the Lubbock county jail at 8 a. m. Sunday and kidnaped a bank vice president and a justice of the peace as hostages are being sought by officers of three States.

Officers of West Texas, Oklahoma and Eastern New Mexico were notified of the break but authorities urged that the desperadoes not be pressed until their two captives, Walter Posey, vice president of the First National bank of Lubbock, and Campbell H. Elkins, assistant justice of the peace had been released. Mr. Posey and Elkins were released Sunday evening near Big Springs and returned to Lubbock.

The escaped men were: Ed (Perch Mouth) Stanton, under a death sentence for the murder of Sheriff John C. Mosely of Sossiter County at Tulia.

William E. (Bill) Doupe, Canadian World War veteran and flier, under a 10 year sentence for robbery. He was a partner of Paul Mitchell in the holdup killing of Robert Tharp, young football star in 1932 at Lubbock.

Andrew H. Nelson, youth under burglar sentences in Lubbock, Motley, Terry, Stephens; Dickens and Floyd Counties. Nelson is also under federal indictment for burglary of the postoffice at Meadow, Texas.

J. B. Stephens, under burglary sentences from Motley, Dickens and Floyd Counties.

A surprise attack by the four prisoners overpowered Deputy Sheriff Bedford Carpenter as he and a group of jail trustees were entering the cell block Sunday morning to feed prisoners on the third floor.

Stanton, Doupe, Nelson and Stephens, all considered desperado men were in the same cell. They had pried and cut loose an iron strip from the door of their cell, had butted or broken the metal into five strips, pried open the door leading into the run-around and then the door leading into the foyer. In that space about two feet by four in area, they crunched, waiting for Carpenter.

Carpenter said as he was attacked and beaten about the face, he drew his gun but the prisoners quickly pinioned him and disarmed him.

The prisoners with a rope improvised of bedding, tied Carpenter's hands behind him and forced him into the elevator, which Nelson operated.

Posey, the bank vice president was standing in the jail lobby on the first floor. Nelson, still with a gun covered him. Carpenter related afterward that Posey raised his hands without speaking. The jailbreakers next covered Elkins, who was sitting on a table in the jail front office.

Keys the desperadoes had taken from the main cell block door upstairs were used to open the gun case in the sheriff's office. A sub-machine gun, two 30-30 rifles, one sawed-off shotgun and a pistol used in practice shooting were taken. The prisoners found several clips of shells and a drum of cartridges for the machine gun.

One of the prisoners noticed Elkins' new sedan parked in front of the jail and asked who had the keys to the machine.

"I've got them in my pocket and you can have them," Elkins was quoted as saying.

All of the escaped prisoners are still at large at this writing Thursday morning.

CCC CALLS FOR NINE YOUNG MEN FROM FLOYD COUNTY

Must Be Between Age Of 18 And 25 Years. Applications Must Be In By July 3rd

Clifford Rhoades, County Administrator was in Lockney Wednesday, and stated that Floyd County had been called upon by the Civil Conversation Corp for nine young men for enlistment in this work. Application should be made to Mr. Rhoades and must be ready to mail by July 3rd, and those accepted will report for duty on July 6th. Three men will be secured from Lockney from the relief rolls and the other six will be secured from other parts of the county. One application will be accepted as alternate.

A special call has been made for CCC work for Veterans. Those that wish to enter this work are asked to get in touch with Mr. Rhoades before July 10th.

CHILD WELFARE SURVEY

The Texas Relief Commission is cooperating with the American Legion, American Legion Auxiliary, the Child Welfare Division and the State Dept. of Health in making a survey.

The families of ex-service men and women, all the families who have blind crippled or other wise handicapped members under fifty-five years of age, and all Relief families with children will compromise these groups.

By making this survey, it will be possible to locate crippled and otherwise handicapped persons, and assist them through funds already available, and will make it possible for them to obtain further assistance.

A survey of each town and rural community in the county will be made to ascertain the number of persons in ill health.

Cooperation of each and every citizen of the county is asked by the Welfare Worker, in order that every case can be given attention. If you know of any handicapped person in your community, report the case at the Relief office, and it will immediately be investigated.

Our State Dept. of Health is striving to improve the health of every person and no more necessary work can be done than adjusting abnormal health conditions among our children in order that they may make genuine citizens in the future.

HOUSING BILL IS EXPLAINED FOR HOME USE

Hopkins Boomed For Post As Administrator Of New Law

Appointment of Harry L. Hopkins as administrator of the new housing law appears to depend on whether he prefers to take that position or to continue as relief administrator.

His appointment is still being urged by those responsible for the legislation to increase home building and repairs. Little consideration has been given to any other man.

Meanwhile inquires about the borrowing of money for home repair are bringing the reminder that the federal government itself advances no funds under this latest emergency set-up.

What lending there is will be by banks and building and loan associations, with the privilege of government insurance of the loans to varying degrees.

Answers Delayed

The delay in appointing an administrator has made it difficult to answer numerous letters to Washington about the procedure necessary to get a loan.

In general, however, a man in Hackensack New Jersey, for instance, who wants to take advantage of the opportunity, may apply to any private lending agency for a loan to build a porch which would cost say \$1,500.

If the bank or other agency wishes to make the loan, it will do so and arrange for the homeowner to pay it back in monthly payments which may run as long as five years.

The lender then may notify the new housing administration, under procedure not yet outlined, that he wishes to take advantage of the government's guarantee. If the loan meets the government's requirements, the administrator will guarantee the lender against loss up to 20 per cent of the loan.

Repair Campaign Seen

There is no reason why a person desiring to make a loan may not now begin negotiations with his bank or another lending agency.

A home repair campaign is expected to be started within 30 days, at which time a huge program to inform both prospective lenders and borrowers will be undertaken.

It is impossible to lay out exactly the procedure for getting a loan for a new home, and it will probably take somewhat longer for the government to explain this phase of the program.

When regulations as to loans for new homes are complete, the would-be home owner will seek his loan from a building and loan association on other such mortgage company, and again it is the lender who will decide whether to advance the funds.

80 Per Cent Insured

If he does make the loan, the lender can be insured up to 80 per cent of the appraised value (Continued on page 4)

One reason for this is that the country is one in which no unanimity may be depended upon in general as to seasons from year to year. Wheat, planted in the winter to mature in the spring, some years makes big, while the ensuing row crop that is harvested in the fall is poor. Vice versa, the row crop conditions are good sometimes while the wheat situation is bad. Generally speaking, row crops are getting off to a bad start in most of Floyd County this year. It is a fine thing to have a good wheat back log if the final outcome of the row crop is what it is forecast by conditions right now! Two shots beat one shot at a livelihood on the farm, in the printing office or anywhere almost.—Floyd County Hesperian.

FARMERS COOPERATING IN GOVERNMENT PROGRAM WILL MAKE INCOME

Benefit Payment Through Adjustment Act Will Represent Substantial Part Of Total Income

Threat of crop destruction by drought has placed added importance on income protection features of the commodity adjustment programs which farmers of the country are carrying out under the direction of the Agricultural Adjustment Administration. For the first time in the history of American agriculture crop income insurance is provided on a nationwide scale.

Because they are based on past production averages the amounts of the rental or benefit payments are not diminished by current

crop failure. In cases of serious drought damage this year, benefit payments through the adjustment act to farmers signing contracts will represent a substantial part of their total farm income. These assured payments guarantee that a cooperating farmer will have some income, even though his crop fails entirely.

The commodity adjustment programs have been so planned that they are flexible enough to meet such unusual situations as that created by the drought in many sections. They protect the producer from being crippled, through complete loss of income, in his efforts to renew production when the immediate failure has passed.

The brides going away suit was Navy blue with red and white accessories. The grooms suit was navy blue.





of the property. If a home owner for instance, has \$2,000 he probably will be able to borrow an additional \$8,000 to build a \$10,000 home because the \$8,000 or 80 per cent of the appraisal will be insured.

Here again the government lends no money. It simply supervises a mutual insurance fund which will be built up by payments of the home owner, probably amounting to 1 per cent a year, in addition to his payments for interest and for reducing the amount of the loan.

The procedure necessary for these loans is much more involved than in the case of modernization and in all likelihood this phase of the program probably will not get under way for perhaps 60 days.

Interest Is Reduced

A third feature of the program will permit persons now owning homes to refinance their existing mortgages up to 70 per cent of the appraised value.

For instance, if a home owner has paid up 30 per cent of the value of his home, he may finance the remaining 70 per cent, in an insured mortgage, similar to that given in the case of a new home.

This procedure will make it possible for the home owner to get a long term loan in place of his existing first and second mortgages which usually are supported to be paid off in full in from three to five years.

In the case of both new and old homes the insured mortgage will be paid off in up to 20 years. In both cases the interest rate will be materially reduced from what has been customary in the past.





HOME HINTS

Don't wear out delicate embroidery work in laundering. Use this method: Make a very hot thick paste of French chalk and spread it over your embroidery. Roll up the embroidery and paste carefully, and leave it in a dark place for a week. When you take it out it will be quite fresh and clean. If you haven't the patience to leave it for a whole week, at least leave it over night.

The shiny appearance of a suit of men's clothing can be removed by rubbing the material with a piece of fine black emery paper. Emery paper can be bought at any hardware store for a few cents.

After washing white corduroy in warm soapy water until clean, let it soak in soapy water for half an hour. Then rinse it in clean water, changing the water at least three times and rinsing again in blueing water, cold. After that don't wring or squeeze the corduroy, but hang it, dripping; to dry in the open air. Do not iron it.

When you are boiling clothes, put them in cold water and bring them to a boil on the stove. Then let them boil for at least ten minutes stirring them with a stick that you should keep for that specific purpose.

Use a large meat grinder to cut up your cabbage for slaw. It's easier and does the work just as well as cutting it by hand.

A teaspoon of marshmallow added to the ingredients of your candy will prevent it from drying out and hardening for several days.

Next time you make French dressing, put the ingredients into a fruit jar and shake. It's much easier and quicker than stirring with a fork.

Supplies have been forwarded to the following counties, to committees where loans were made in 1933: Bailey, Castro, Cochran, Briscoe, Crosby, Floyd, Hale, Hockley, Lamb, Lubbock, Scurry and awisher in this section, as well as North Plains counties. Emergency loans are available for summer fallowing and the combined purpose of summer fallowing and purchase of winter wheat seed in certain counties of Texas, New Mexico and Arizona, through the Dallas office, where wheat is grown commercially. A maximum of \$1 per acre for fallowing and \$1 for the purchase of seed, is set.

Loans are handled through county loan committees and field supervisors. Frank Perkins is representative in Lockney.

McAVOY ELEVATOR CO. SHIPS SOLID TRAINLOAD OF WHEAT

Reception Committee Awaited The Arrival Of This Wheat At Fort Worth

A \$90,000 trainload of wheat had a hero's reception committee when it arrived in Fort Worth Friday morning, from Aike in Floyd County. It was the first time on record in the United States that a trainload of wheat had been shipped from a single community by one elevator concern to a single consignee and then sold to a single milling company.

McAvoy Elevator Company of Aiken shipped the wheat. E.M. Rogers & Co., commission merchants, received it. Kimbell-Diamond Milling Company of Fort Worth and Sherman bought it.

The shipment meant approximately \$75,000 to farmers of Floyd and Hale counties who raised the wheat. The trainload tested from 60.5 to 62.4 pounds. It was all No. 1 drak hard wheat. Protein tests ran from 12 to 15.80 per cent.
