

SIX MINUTES IN 1934

Every time the clock ticked off six minutes in 1934 somebody met accidental death. Not all due to autos, of course, but to unanticipated happenings, many of which could have been avoided through a greater use of care. Accidents cost this country 90,-000 lives and two billion dollars in money last year. Five times as many were killed and injured as died from natural causes.

Appalling as it is, death by auto accidents amounts to only 28 per ent of the total number of accidental deaths from all causes; falls account for 18 percent; drowning about 9 percent; burns about 7 percent and railroad ac-cidents nearly 6 precent of the accident total. Incapacitatio through accidents and sickness cost the country about a billion dollers a year.

But here is the sad part of the story-more than 50 percent of all accidents can be averted. And that is the point we are most anxious to impress upon Floyd County citizens. You may get hurt while being careful, but you are certain to get hurt if you are not careful. The chance of escan ing unburt through using care is so much greater than in being careless that it would seem any sensible person would always be careful.
