## Lockney Wins Tournament

Liberty Wins Second and Sudan Wins the Consolation Tournament; Large Crowds Attend All of The Games

More enthusiasm, pep and interest was displayed here last Friday and Saturday over the girls basketball tournament than any other school activity this year. Liberty was eligible for the finals Saturday night with a match against the home girls. They lost his game but were winners of the second award which was the choice of a silver or gold trophy. They selected the gold one leaving the silver one for Sudan, winners of the consolation bouts.

Sudan won the consolation in the finals Saturday night at 7:30 over Silverton.

There were eight good fast moving teams represented in the tournament including Irick, Lorenzo, Gasoline, Aiken, and Silverton besides the three winning teams.

Fans stated that the real game of the tournament was played off, Friday night between Lockney and Sudan in the preliminary series. The scores stayed tied up most of the time, but Lockney happened to be ahead 2 points when the whistle blew for game. This game was the fastest ever played on the Lockney gymnasium by any girl's team.

The biggest crowd that has ever been out to a game this year filled the lower floor and balcony.

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## Chairman Jeff D. Ayres Explains Relief Procedure For Floyd County

Wants Closer Cooperation Between County Administrator And The Public

In order to correct any erroneous conceptions about relief procedure in Floyd County, Jeff D. Ayres, Chairman of the Floyd County Board of Welfare and Relief, in a statement today enumerated some of the fundamental regulations under which destitute persons become eligible to receive aid, and under which they may have an opportunity to work for the aid granted.

"I feel that some of the fundamental policies of our Relief Program need to be explained and I hope that such explanation will result in closer cooperation between our new County Administrator, Mr. Edwin Heald, and the public generally," said Mr. Ayres.

"In the first place, under the State Relief Law, a person must be interviewed by a Case Worker who will ascertain the needs of the applicant. All applicants must make affidavit that they have given a true account of their economic condition. When it has been established that the applicant has no means of subsistence for himself and those dependent upon his support except through the relief organization, the Case Worker then will register the person as a Relief Client.

"Second, only Relief Roll Clients certified by the Case Worker as employable are eligible to be assigned to Work Relief Projects authorized for Floyd County.

"Third, Work Relief Projects must be presented through the County Administrator to the State Office for approval. Once approved, a project may be developed by employable clients from the

"Mr. Ayres added that the Floyd County Board of Welfare and Relief has no authority to prepare a work relief project but who and will gladly advise with the County Administrator, the Commissioners' Court, the School Board, the City Councils of Floydada and Lockney or any members of these bodies about any projects they may desire to sponsor."

He said "the County Wage Scale Committee is responsible for fixing the scale of wages to be paid work relief clients and by the Floyd County Board of Welfare and Relief has no voice in this matter, whatsoever."

The men chosen are R. M. Barry, R. Fred Brown, R. L. Trice, B. Johnston, J. I. Bloxom, Larry R. Hartman, John Holmes and L. A. Williams.

Wheat lands to be measured should be staked by the producers before it is measured by these men, it was said. No joint compliance papers will be accepted after the land has been measured, it was pointed out.

### Slow Rain That Turned Into Snow Will Be Of Much Benefit To Wheat

Tuesday afternoon a slow foggy drizzle turned into snow and melted as fast as it hit the ground until late in the afternoon when it began to pile up, and by nine o'clock at night when it ceased, it measured about two inches. If it had not melted early in the afternoon it would have measured several inches.

The gauge at Hammonds & Co. registered .37 inches of moisture which will be of immense benefit to wheat, and will carry it over for several weeks. Some wheat, but not much, had begun to look a little "sick."

This is not sufficient moisture to cause any amount of land to be put up for row crops. We will have to receive several inches before this work can be done.

We are of the opinion that we now have the dry spell broken and will receive additional rain and snow within the next week or ten days.

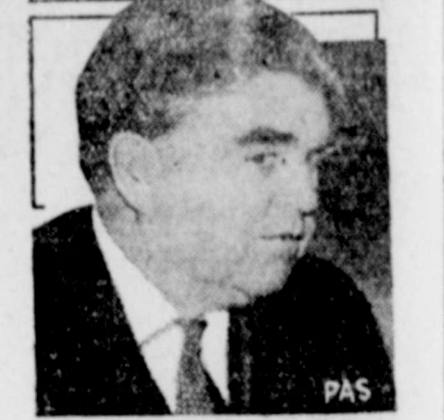
"The Cotton Section of the RR made no special regulation to distinguish between a Rural Rehabilitation Corporation or any other private corporation or individual. If a farmer who has a cotton contract on his farm and leases part of the farm under contract to the Rural Rehabilitation Corporation he is required by present regulations to divide his cotton base on the pro rata basis in the same manner as if he leased part of the farm to a private individual."

## BRUNO HAUPMANN RECEIVED DEATH SENTENCE WED.

Jury Only Deliberates 11 Hours. It Is Almost Certain That An Appeal Will Stay Execution.

FLEMINGTON, N. J., Feb. 13.—Bruno Richard Hauptmann was condemned to the electric chair tonight by the jury that tried him for the kidnap-murder of baby Lindbergh.

White and unshaved, he tottered slightly as he stood between his guards, heard himself ordered to "die in the electric chair."

He was sentenced to die in the week of March 18, but an almost certain appeal to the New Jersey Court of Appeals and Errors would stay the execution.

The jury of eight men and four women spent 11 hours and 6 minutes in a bare room of the old courthouse where Hauptmann had been on trial since January 2 before they reached their verdict.

"We find the defendant, Bruno Richard Hauptmann, guilty of murder in the first degree," intoned Foreman Charles Walton, Sr., in the deathly quiet of the littered smoke-filled courtroom.

Lakeview and Floydada will play for county championship Friday night at Floydada and Saturday night here. If a third game is necessary the place will have to be decided later. The champions of the county will go to the district meet at Lubbock February 22 and 23.

Quite a bit of squabbling is going on in the Senate over the \$4,880,000,000 relief bill of President Roosevelt. He has asked for permission to spend this money as he thought best in relieving distressed conditions in the U. S. Some Senators want to know just what for and where he is going to spend this money. The President has told them in so many words that he cannot tell just at this time just where and for what he purpose will spend it. Senator Carter Glass, Chairman of the Senate Appropriations Committee, is more or less leading the fight against the bill. He has never been in sympathy with the New Deal policies. The President has let it be known in a round-about-way that he will veto a bill that will not permit him to carry out his program to end the dole. In that instance, if the bill fails, it will throw back into the laps of the Senators, and the responsibility for not providing means for the taking care of the unemployed will be on their shoulders. They are not going to let that happen. The pressure would be too great for them to withstand. They are just "talking through their hats" now. The bill will come through in just about the shape the President wants it. The Senators are the aristocrats of Congress and they do not want anybody to think the President is dictating to them just what to do, if they can help it, therefore they are having a few hot debates on the floor and rear and rant, pull their hair and raise old Bill Ned in general, and then they will vote the bill just about as presented originally. 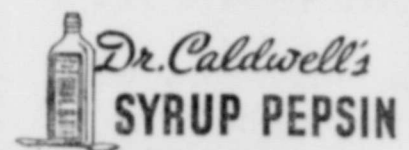

### A BABY IS BORN EVERY 4 MINUTES IN TEXAS

A new baby every four minutes 320 every day, 10,000 a month—that's the record of Texas, who showed 121,508 births registered with the State Bureau of Vital Statistics in 1934. This total carries an increase of 8,800 over 1933, when 112,669, the greatest number of births ever registered with the bureau in any year, were registered.

The 1934 records showed an excess of 57,956 births over the total deaths. Last year in Texas there were 63,552 deaths recorded, or one death every 8 minutes, 174 each day, or 5,296 per month. Or putting it another way, about two babies are born in Texas each time a death occurs in the State.

The Bureau of Vital Statistics is a part of the Texas State Department of Health and is charged with the duty of seeing that every birth and death occurring in the State is properly filed and registered. Such records are known as vital statistics because the information contained is of vital importance to the person himself, the community, and the State.

Texas is now in the Registration Area for both births and deaths. Every one can assist in helping to keep our records at this high requirement if they insist that every birth and death occurring in their family be registered.

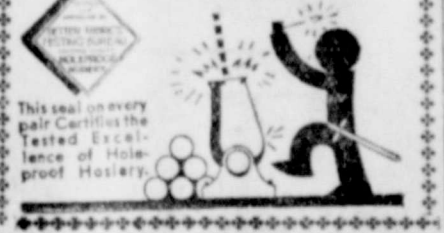

#### Edinburgh Tea Squares

- 1 cup butter
- 1 cup sugar
- 1/2 teasp. salt
- 1 cup flour
- 2 1/2 cups rolled oats

#### Filling:

- 1-2 pkg. pasteurized dates
  - 1 cup water
  - 1 tsp. lemon juice
- Cook pitted dates with the water over a low flame until a paste is formed. Add lemon juice cool.

Cream butter; stir in sugar gradually, then sifted flour and last the rolled oats and salt. Continue to stir until mixture holds together. With a broad-bladed knife, spread one-half mixture over the surface of a well-oiled pan. (The layer should not be thicker than 1/4 inch). Spread filling over the bottom layer and then cover with the remaining half of the mixture. Bake in very moderate oven 325 degrees F. for about 30 minutes. Remove from oven, crease into 2 inch squares.

#### Surprise Scones

- 2 cups flour
  - 4 teasp. baking powder
  - 1/2 teasp. salt
  - 2 teasp. sugar
  - 2-3 cup milk
  - 15 pasteurized dates
  - 4 marshmallows
  - 1 egg yolk
  - 1/2 cup nut meats
  - 2 to 4 teasp. shortening
- Pit dates, and stuff with quartered marshmallows. Sift flour, baking powder, salt and sugar. Work in the shortening with the finger tips or a fork. Stir with a knife, add milk to form a soft dough. Toss dough on a lightly floured board and roll out to a thickness of 1/2 inch. Cut in 2 inch rounds. Place a stuffed date near one edge of each round of dough and press the edges of the round together to enclose the date. Brush the semi-circular scones with slightly beaten egg yolk which has been diluted with a little milk. Sprinkle with finely chopped nut meats. Bake in a hot oven, 450 degrees F. 10 to 12 minutes. 15 scones.

#### Butterscotch, of Course!

In addition to those delicious morsels of butterscotch candy that stick to your teeth you can also make "Scotch Kisses" by dipping fresh marshmallows in butterscotch while it is at a soft ball stage, keeping it hot over hot

water while you do the dipping. For the butterscotch candy:

- 2 cups brown sugar
- 1-4 cup white karo
- 1 cup water
- 1-4 teasp. salt
- 1-3 cup butter
- 1-4 teasp. vanilla

Put sugar, karo, water and salt in a sauce-pan. Stir over low heat until the sugar is dissolved. Increase heat and cook to firm-ball stage. Add butter and cook with occasional stirring until the thermometer registers to brittle stage. Remove from stove; add vanilla; pour into a buttered shallow pan. While still warm, crease into squares with a blunt knife.

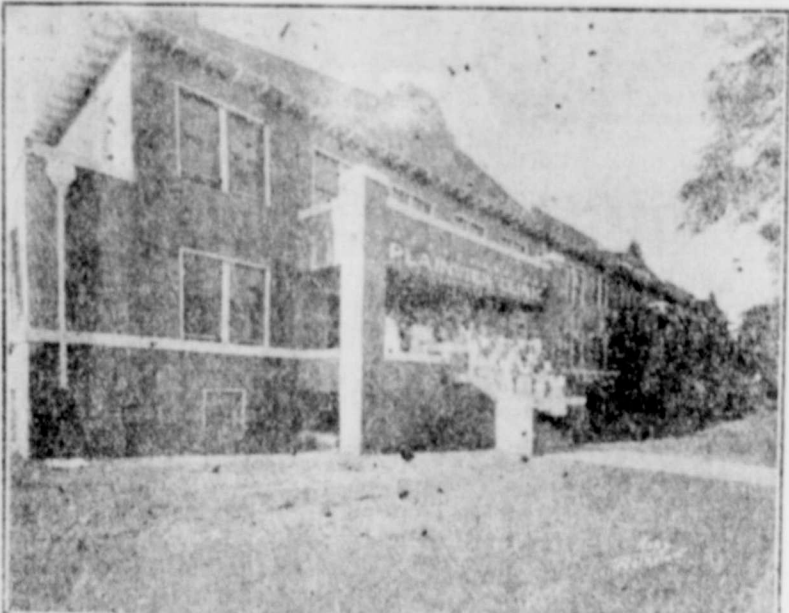

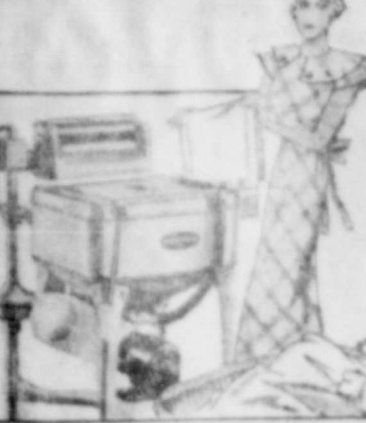

Fred Brown will be in charge of measuring the wheat lands in the Floydada territory; Battey in the Southeast portion of the county, including Dougherty and Lakewood; Hartman and Johnston in the North, East and Northeast portions of the county; Bloom in the Northwest portion; Trice in the Southwest portion; and Williams and Holmes in the West ern portion.

The acres rented to the government will net the producers about \$14 per acre, it was said. The number of contracts for the 1935 harvest is a little less than 591, the number of contracts for the 1934 harvest season.

Wheat producers will be required to make a statement of the number of bushels of wheat harvested in 1934, it was explained. Included in the instruction given by County Agent Glen A. Lindsey Tuesday to the wheat supervisors was to the effect that the sides of fields in wheat or other drill crops are to be measured one foot outside the seeded area.

All the measuring work will be done under the instruction and supervision of County Agent Lindsey.

strictly by the number of certified relief clients on Floyd County Relief Rolls.

The Case Worker, in all instances, determines the amount of money a client is eligible to receive, regardless of whether he is a Work Relief Client or a Direct Relief Client. In general, a Work Relief client is eligible to receive only enough additional money to take care of the additional expense he incurs in the matter of clothing and additional food necessary to sustain him while working. On an average, a Work Relief client, according to Texas Relief Commission Regulations, may receive from 5 per cent to 10 per cent more as a Work Relief client than he does as a Direct Relief client.

The Wage Scale paid Work Relief clients in no way affects the monthly allotment of funds to that client. A higher wage scale means that he will work fewer hours to complete his monthly budget; a lower wage scale means that he will work more hours to complete his monthly budget. His total monthly allotment remains the same in both cases.

These Regulations are in force not only in Floyd County, but also in every other County in the State, and the above statement has been approved by the State Relief officials," said Mr. Ayres.

With recent reductions in cottonseed meal and hulls prices it will be found more economical to feed these products than imported feed stuff although it is not recommended that hulls replace other roughage entirely, where mules or horses are being worked daily, they may well be used in a part of the daily ration.
