At eight-thirty Monday morn. ing it began spitting snow and as the morning passed the fall became heavier, melting almost as fast as it hit the ground but piled up moisture to the extent of .12 of an inch, making a total of .57 nches for Sanday night and Mon day morning.



With recent reductions in cottonseed meal and hulls prices it will be found more economial to feed these products than imported feed stuff although it is not recommended that hulls reblace other roughage entirely, where mules or horses are being worked daily, they may well be used in a part of the daily ration.
