#### TEXAS CCC ALLOTMENT HAS BEEN INCREASED

Texas quota of young men to join the Civilian Conservation Corps has been nearly doubled by an increase from 14,200 under the old program to 28,880 under the new program, it was announced last week by Neal Guy. enrollment supervisor for Texas.

Enrollment under the new quota will take place between June 15 and August 31, Guy stated, at which time county relief administrators wil receive applications from young Texans desiring to to civilian conservation camps. Heretofore, applicants had to be between the ages of 18 and 25 which has now been stretched to ten-year bracket of from 18 to 28. Part of the men accepted will be sent to camps in nearby states, the rest to camps in Texas.
