### Aldermen grant Energas increase

The Dimmitt Aldermen voted Monday night to grant a rate increase to Energas, and agreed to clarify and transfer various agreements between Amstar Corp. and the City of Dimmitt.

Energas had requested a 7.7% rate increase, bringing an estimated \$8,914,983 increase in revenue for the company. However, in a recent settlement meeting with the steering committee representing all cities served by Energas, both parties agreed on a 4.3% increase, generating a \$5 million increase in revenues.

Energas representatives said that increased expenses may have resulted in a higher level of increase if the case had been brought before the Texas Railroad Commission. It was also noted that this is the first rate increase by the company since December of 1981.

The new rate will be in effect on the Nov. 1 billing and will represent about a 20-cent-per-mcf increase for the domestic and commercial customers affected.

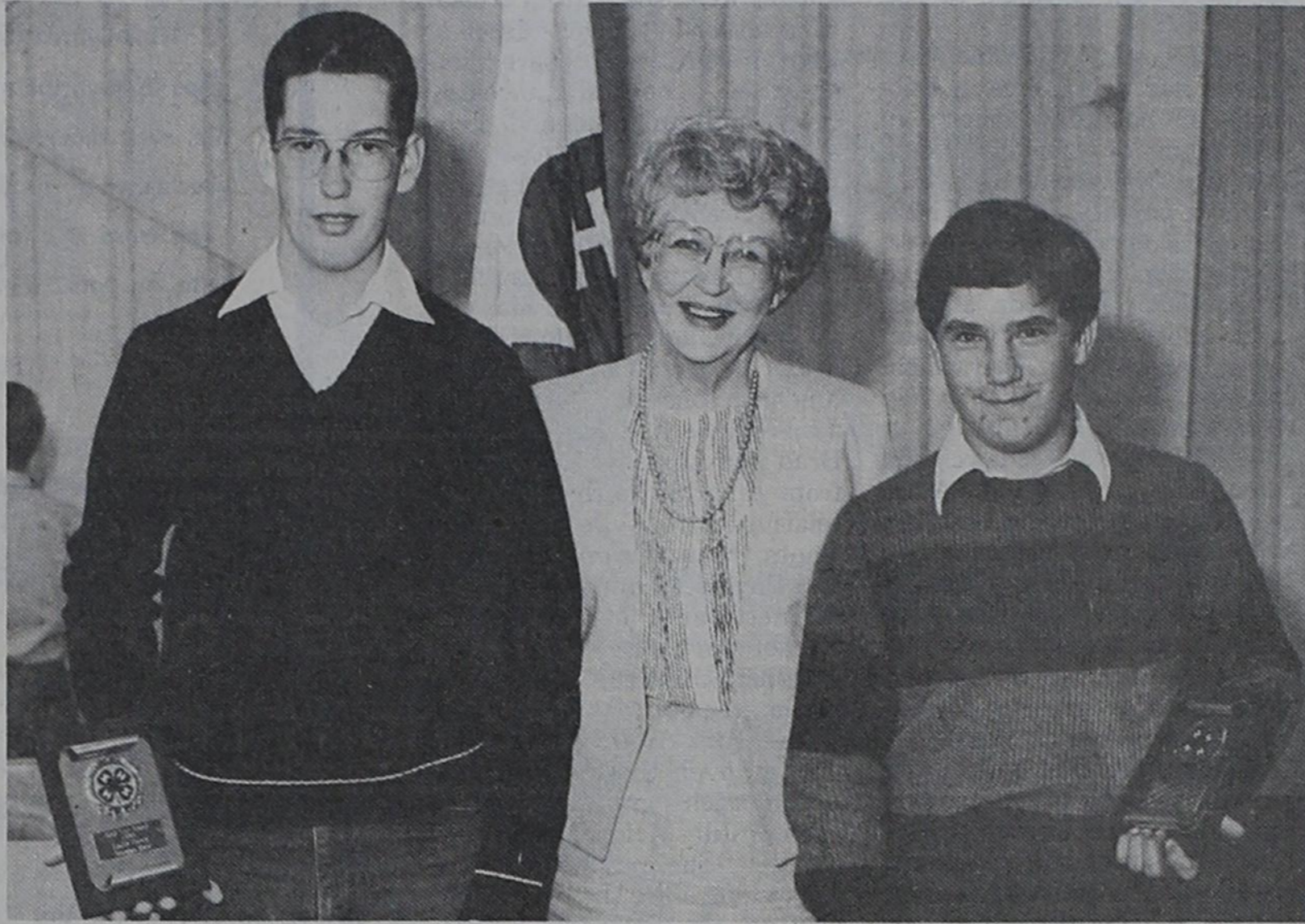
Voting for the negotiated increase were Aldermen Joyce Hunter and Ann Armstrong. David Behrends voted against the increase. David Hays was

absent. Because of the impending sale of the Dimmitt Amstar plant to American Maize-Products Co., representatives of Amstar asked the aldermen to clear up an oversight in a 1968 ordinance, and also asked that the city transfer any agreements with Amstar to Dimmitt Operating, Inc., the American Maize-Products Co. wholly-owned subsidiary that will be named as operator of the Dimmitt plant.

In 1968, the city had agreed to the closing of all streets and alleys within the borders of the plant area, but a technicality in the ordinance spelling out the agreement left one alleyway in question.

The aldermen voted to authorize Mayor Wayne Collins to execute a quit-claim deed to the alley to insure a clear title to the property before it is transferred.

Aldermen voted to transfer authorization for use of city streets and alleys for the purpose of maintaining the sewer line from the plant to the sewage treatment facility, and to assign the water service agreement between the city and the plant.

### Top 4-H'ers are announced

This year's County 4-H Gold Star winners are both boys—Trampas Moke of the Bethel 4-H Club and Joel Nelson of the Flagg 4-H Club.

They were announced by County Judge Polly Simpson as the winners of the top individual 4-H awards at the annual County 4-H Achievement Banquet Saturday night in the County Expo Building.

Announcement of the Gold Star winners climaxed the annual banquet, which also featured the awarding of achievement pins and certificates, recognition of adult leaders, and announcement of Loralee Acker of Nazareth and Jamie Baker of Bethel as this year's "I Dare You" award winners.

Nelson, 15, is the son of Donny and Wanda Nelson and is a sophomore in Dimmitt High School. He has served as vice-president of the Flagg 4-H Club, vice-president and secretary of the 4-H Horse Club and as a voting delegate to the Llano Estacado Horse Association. He has won first place in the district horse judging contest, showed the grand champion mare at district, and was the junior high-point performance winner in the Llano Estacado Horse Association. He also has won a silver medal

at the State 4-H Trap Meet, advanced to the state level in horse judging, and placed third in district in record book competition.

His 4-H projects have included horses, lamb, shooting sports, parliamentary procedure and citizenship.

Moke, 14, is the son of Don and Carolyn Moke and is a freshman in Dimmitt High School.

He has served as president and reporter of the Bethel 4-H Club, has been a 4-H Junior Host, has attended Electric Camp and the Texas 4-H Congress, participated in district record book judging and has served on the banquet committee and the carnival committee.

He is a former winner of the "I Dare You" award, was nam-

ed the outstanding 4-H boy of his local club, and also has received a showmanship award.

His 4-H projects have included swine, sheep, poultry and photography.

### Merchants should watch for forgery

The Castro County Sheriff's Dept. announced recently that a suspected member of a check forgery ring operating in a four-state area has been apprehended and is in custody in Littlefield.

A warrant has been issued in Castro County for the arrest of Arthur Lee Faulwell, 34, of Lubbock, who was indicted Oct. 3 by a local grand jury. He is also under indictment in several other towns.

Sheriff's deputies said that he had been on parole for similar crimes and was out on bail on burglary charges. The forgery ring to which Faulwell allegedly belongs has passed checks totalling more than \$35,000 in 18 Texas cities (including Dimmitt), as well as cities in New Mexico, Oklahoma and Kansas.

Checks stolen from McCabe Spreader and Feeder and stolen claim payment checks from American States Insurance have been among the forged checks being passed. Extra caution is urged in accepting checks from these sources, although deputies emphasized that not all such checks would necessarily be forged.

Two Dimmitt men representing the Texas Corn Producers Board returned from Venezuela Friday "highly optimistic" about the possibility of major corn contracts with that country.

Carl King and Bill Clark spent three days meeting with Venezuelan dry millers, brewers, poultry producers, trade service directors, the minister of agriculture and other government and industry officials. Representatives of the US Feed Grains Council set up the meetings for them.

An official of the Central Bank of Cooperatives in Denver also met with the trade delegations in Venezuela to explain the financing plan which it worked out last year with the TCPB, which enables US financiers to loan other countries the money to buy American commodities.

"We're very optimistic that we're going to sell them some corn," King said. "How much, we don't know. Some of it is going to be on the short term. We're probably looking at a small shipment for February-March delivery, then we're looking and hoping for a shipment of 200,000 to 400,000 metric tons of pre-contracted corn from the 1985 crop year for delivery in 1986."

Most of the corn, King said, would be white food-grade corn.

"They're going to import some 500,000 metric tons of white corn in 1985," King explained. "However, they must consume their domestic production first — the government makes them do that. They must pay a much higher price for domestic corn than they do for imported corn."

Venezuela's primary source of corn from 1965 to 1980 was South Africa, King explained.

Martha Isaacs, her sister Sandra Honea of Dumas, and their parents C. A. and Oleada



The same eligibility requirements as in previous surplus-cheese distributions will apply, according to the Castro County Community Action Center, which will distribute the cheese and butter.

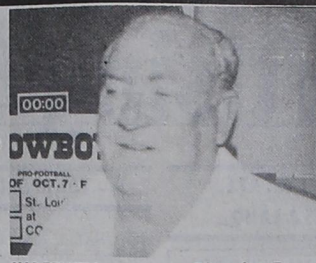

## Any more questions about the Wildcats?

Now, do you have any more questions about why the Littlefield Wildcats are expected to play in the state championship game?

Dimmitt's Bobcats got all their questions answered convincingly here Friday night as the Wildcats reeled off a 41-0 victory.

All-state tailback Steve Greene gained 222 yards on 25 carries and scored four touchdowns on runs of 3, 2, 4 and 49 yards as the powerful Wildcats rolled up 329 yards on the ground and 97 in the air.

Meanwhile, the Littlefield defense held the Bobcats to 42 rushing yards on 23 plays. The Bobcats got most of their yardage through the air, completing six of 22 passes for 115 yards.

The Bobcats pushed to the Littlefield 12 and 23-yard lines on second-half drives, but could get no closer. Two pass interceptions and two fumble recoveries by Littlefield stopped other Bobcat marches and helped the Wildcats control the game.

Many fans were expecting the once-beaten Bobcats to play the state's second-ranked team closer than they did.

"The game WAS a little closer than the final score indicated, but they definitely dominated us," Dimmitt Coach Clifford Smith said. "We had one or two chances to get into the game, but we never did do it."

He added, "Besides them being good, we just didn't play very well. We played too much individual football, and not together — everybody was trying to make his own big play. And Littlefield was able to take advantage of every mistake we made."

## Swifts top Cowboys to remain unbeaten

Tailback Chris Gerber gained 204 yards rushing to lead Nazareth's Swifts to an impressive 33-20 Homecoming game victory over the Happy Cowboys Friday night.

An early interception by Todd Hill set up the Swifts' first touchdown. The Cowboys were driving on their first possession when Hill picked off the pass and returned it to the Nazareth 35. Moments later, Gerber broke loose on a 40-yard scoring run for a 6-0 Nazareth lead. Gerber missed the extra-point kick.

Hill played hero again on the first play of the second quarter when he caught a 16-yard touchdown pass from quarterback Ricky Backus. Gerber booted the extra point, giving the Swifts a 13-0 advantage.

Nazareth scored again in the second quarter when Gerber capped a drive with a one-yard touchdown plunge. The point-after kick failed, leaving the Swifts with a 19-0 lead.

Happy's Jimmy Moore finally broke the hold of the powerful Swift defense when he gathered in Nazareth's next kickoff and ran 85 yards for the Cowboys' first score. Ed Johnson kicked the extra point to cut the Nazareth's halftime lead to 19-7.

After shutting down the Cowboys' offense to start the second half, the Swifts scored again with 5:39 left in the third when Gerber raced 21 yards for his third TD of the night. Gerber's point-after kick was good, giving the Swifts a 26-7 lead.

But then Johnson decided it was time for an encore on the Cowboys' kickoff-return act. He took a Billy Steffens' kick at his own 10-yard line and weaved his way 90 yards for Happy's second TD. Steffens got a little revenge when he blocked Johnson's extra-point kick, leaving the score at 27-13.

The Swifts used up four minutes of the fourth quarter on the next scoring drive, with Kevin Hoelting getting the TD on a seven-yard pass from Backus. Gerber added the extra point to give the Swifts a commanding 33-13 lead.

Happy mounted its final scoring drive against Nazareth's junior varsity defense late in the game. Miguel Fernandez went in for the score from a yard out, and Kelly McDonald added the extra-point kick to make the final tally 33-20.

Penalties, interceptions and punt returns played a big part in the game. Nazareth killed three Happy drives with in-

terceptions, while Happy stopped four Nazareth marches with three fumble recoveries and an interception. The Cowboys had 70 yards stepped off against them on nine penalties, but the Swifts were whistled only three times for 15 yards. Happy gained 10 more yards on its two punt returns for touchdowns (175) than it gained in total offense the rest of the game.

The Swifts finished with a big 356 yards in total offense, with Gerber getting 204 of them on 26 carries. Backus threw only six passes, with two of his three completions going for touchdowns.

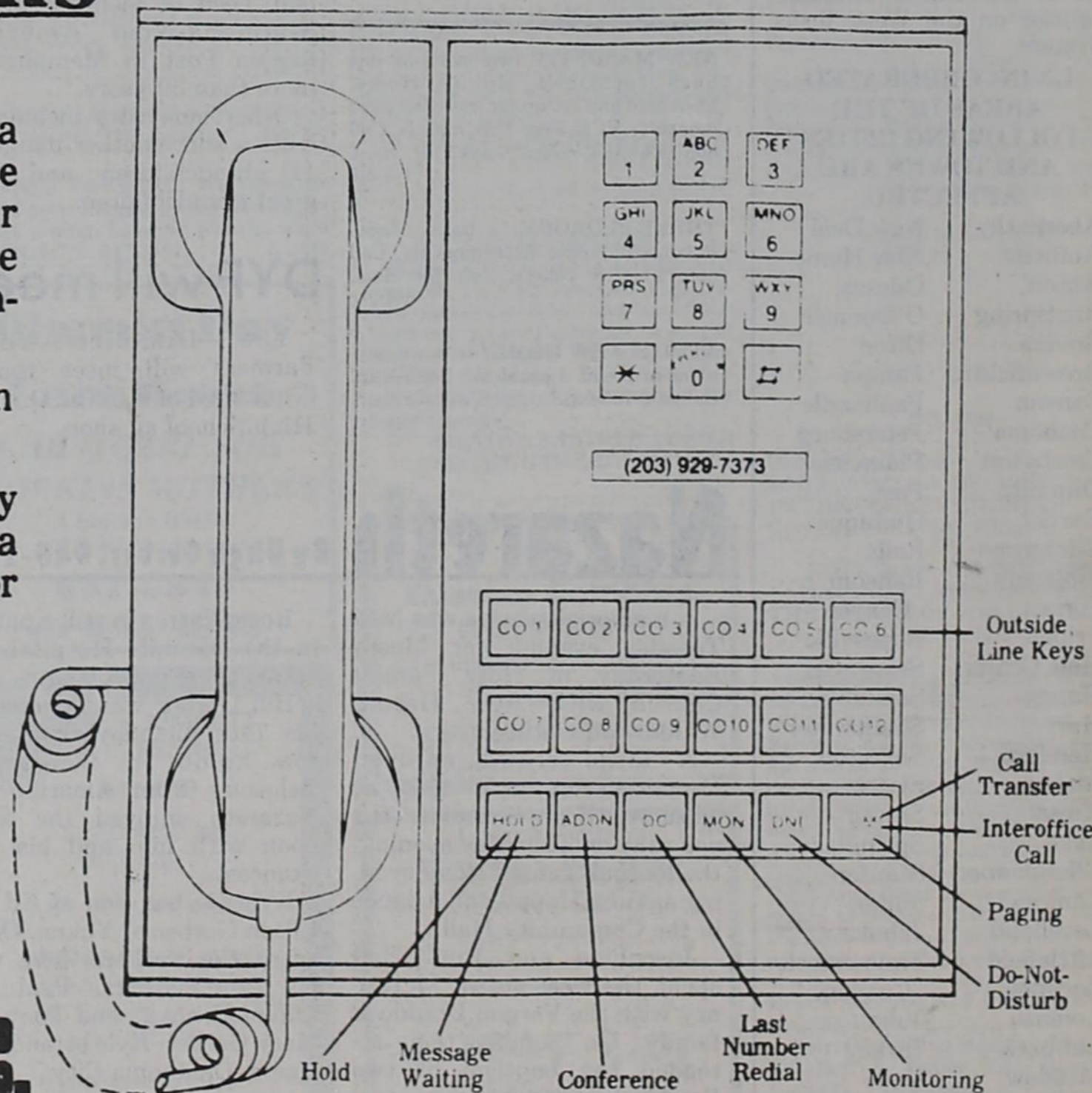

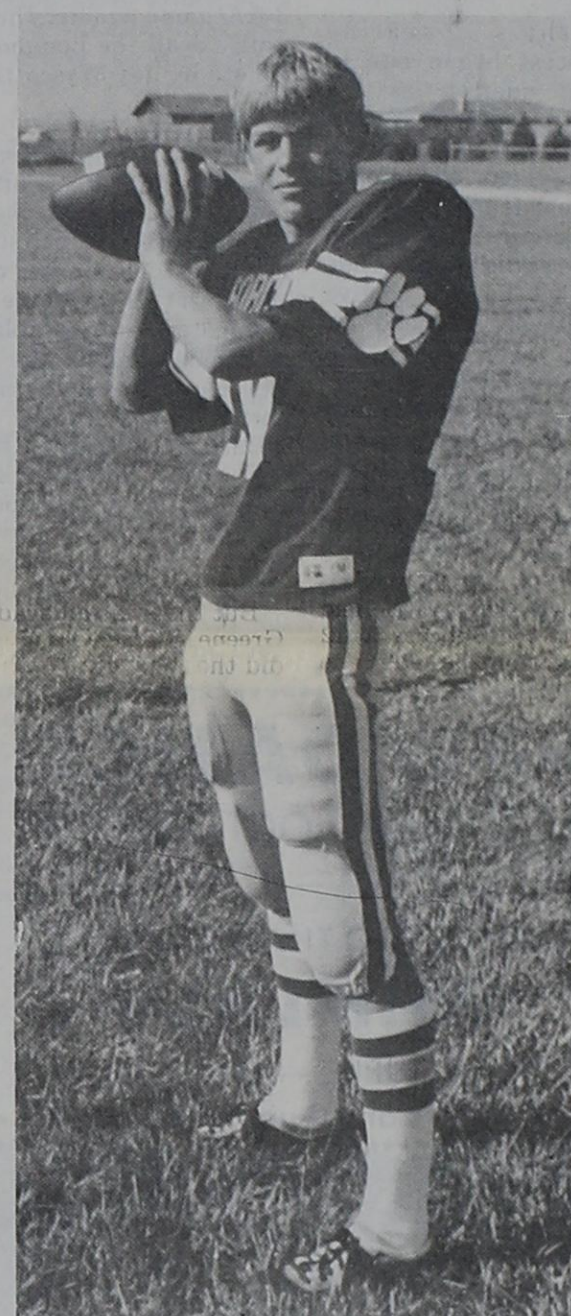

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# Abernathy wins showdown, 21-0

It was supposed to be one of those classic matchups — the area's number one defense against the number one offense.

The defense, the Hart Longhorns, was overcome at the end by a larger Abernathy offense as the state-ranked Antelopes posted a 21-0 win over the 'Horns Friday at Hart, in their District 3-AA opener.

"We wanted to match power with power," said Hart Head Coach Mark Stroebel. "Their size and strength wore us down in the fourth quarter, though."

In the first period and most of the second, the Hart defense kept the 'Lopes out of the end zone. Twice, Abernathy was turned away by Ronnie Rodriguez's interceptions.

Rodriguez's first pickoff came after Abernathy had covered a shanked Longhorn punt at the Hart 33. On second down at the Hart 43, quarterback Jamie Mansanales, who finished the night four-of-11 for just 47 yards, had his first pass intercepted by Rodriguez. Mansanales suffered the same fate on the next Abernathy possession.

Abernathy's "wearing down" process began late in the second quarter, as the 'Lopes drove from their own 40. After converting on fourth down at midfield, the 'Lopes scored in just four plays, with Chester Cooper blasting in from four yards out. Wade Wesley added the PAT to give the 'Lopes a 7-0 lead at halftime.

Hart held off Abernathy during the early going in the third stanza before unleashing the 'Lope offense after a Longhorn punt from the Hart 3 carried only to the 'Horns' 22. The 'Lopes drove to the Hart 4 before stalling, but on fourth and one, Ross Bradley scooted in for a TD. Wesley's PAT

made it 14-0.

Backed up deep in his own end, Hart quarterback Brett Ritter was sacked, forcing a fumble. Todd Johnson, Abernathy cornerback, recovered the loose ball in the end zone for the touchdown. Wesley's third kick of the night made it

final, 21-0.

The loss was Hart's second of the year, against four wins.

Nazareth will travel to Vega, Dimmitt will go to Muleshoe and Hart will be at home against Hale Center in important district games. Kickoff times for all three games will be 7:30.

#### DIMMITT AT MULESHOE

The Mules have been the hard-luck team in 2-AAA this year. They lost three starters, including two all-district linebackers, in their season opener against Portales, so they haven't been able to play up to pre-season expectations.

"One of the kids they lost, Jeff McCarty, was a potential all-state linebacker," DHS Coach Clifford Smith said.

But don't get the idea that the Mules aren't a good team, Smith warned. Their 2-4 record is deceptive, because all the teams that have beaten them are powerful ones — Portales, Morton, Friona and Idalou. They've defeated Frenship and Floydada.

"We'll have to stop Mr. Mark Moton," Smith said. Moton, a 165-lb. senior tailback "has got lots of speed and he makes them a threat all game long."

Quarterback Todd Jones (160-lb. senior) is a "pretty good passer" and like to throw to Moton and to tight end Lester Burks (160-lb. junior), Smith reported.

The top Mule in the line is No. 50, Sergio Leal (165-lb. junior) who plays right guard on offense and inside linebacker on defense. The biggest Mule is No. 71, John Isaac (6-5, 205). He's been playing tackle because of team injuries, but may be playing his original position, tight end, wearing No. 86.

#### HALE CENTER AT HART

"I think if we can beat them we can go to the playoffs," Longhorn Coach Mark Stroebel said. "But they're gonna be tough."

Hale Center was the pre-season pick to go into the playoffs behind Abernathy. The Owls are 4-2 and 1-0 so far, with victories over Tahoka, Petersburg, Olton and Well-

ington, and losses to Lockney and Lubbock Cooper.

"I think they'll come out and just try to run over us," Stroebel said. "They're pretty big, and that's the kind of game they've been playing."

On offense, the Owls feature a pair of "book ends" — twins Ennis and Ernest Smith, 185-lb. seniors who play at the end positions. Their biggest threat in the backfield is 185-lb. running back Mitch MacBeth, and their top defensive player is linebacker James Pardo, a 202-lb senior.

The Longhorns will have the added incentive of Homecoming in the important 3-AA game. It will be their next-to-last home game of the season.

#### NAZARETH AT VEGA

Injuries have scuttled Vega's season so far. Picked high in the district, the Longhorns are now 0-6.

"They're beaten up pretty badly right now," Nazareth Coach Rex Minshew reported. "Their starting quarterback went out with ligament damage, and they've got a few other kids on the sideline, and

Littlefield's Junior Varsity capitalized on a special-team touchdown to dump the Dimmitt JV, 20-0, last Thursday in Littlefield.

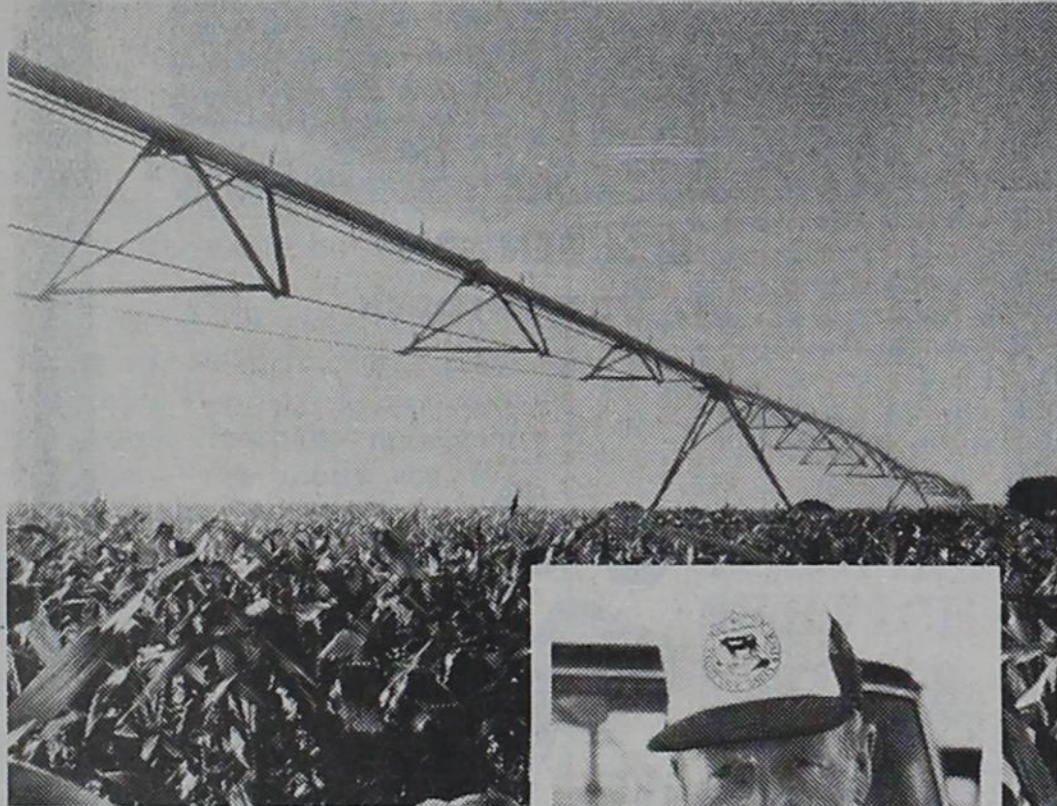

but a drought in South Africa has dried up that source.

The Dimmitt men were interested in marketing corn grown in the seven-county High Plains "check-off" area and handled by both independent and co-op elevators in the same area.

Growers in the TCGB area pay a half-cent per bushel voluntary check-off fee to finance market development and research.

King said his and Clark's trade trip "was the first time the Venezuelans have ever been approached with a three-point plan — (1) a reliable supply,

(2) quality control, and (3) the most competitive credit rates in the world."

"It takes a long time to get foreign markets lined up, but we feel optimistic that this can be done," King said. "We're looking for a trade visit by these people from Venezuela in about December, sponsored by the US Feed Grains Council and the Texas Corn Producers Board, and we're looking forward to hopefully negotiating a contract for the 1985 crop year."

"In the meantime," he said, "we're in the process of getting the lowest cost possible on shipping rates, and are trying to trim all the costs we can, except the price to the farmer."

## Hart forfeits four grid games

Hart High School has forfeited its first four football games of the season because of an ineligible player on the varsity squad, Head Coach Mark Stroebel said this week.

The ineligible player was an 18-year-old senior who had transferred to HHS from the Dallas area this year, Stroebel said. Although the youth had not played football before, he is in his 11th semester of school since starting eighth grade, and University Interscholastic League rules allow a student only 10 semesters of eligibility from the eighth-grade point.

The youth was on the Longhorns' kickoff and kickoff return teams.

"We turned ourselves in when we realized we were using an ineligible player," Stroebel said. "When I found out, I guarantee you that was the worst day I've ever spent."

He added, "The kid felt real bad about it, too. He didn't know the eligibility rule, and it wasn't his fault."

The youth has been reassigned as a student trainer, Stroebel said.

The Longhorns won three of their first four games by shutouts, defeating Anton 19-0, Lazbuddie 19-0 and Kress 14-0. Their only loss during the four-game span was to Nazareth, 10-6.

The forfeits officially drop Hart's season record from 4-2 to 1-5 so far. The Longhorns remain 0-1 in District 3-AA play.

"It's over with, and what counts now is district play," Stroebel said. "Our kids have a chance to go into the playoffs, and that's what we're working toward."
