



\$200 FINE TO LET STOCK RUN ON HIGHWAY

The Legislature of the state of Texas this year passed a law providing that any person owning any horse, mule, donkey cow bull, steer sheep, goat or any other livestock who permits the same to run at large unattended on that portion of any designated State highway in the State which is inclosed by fences on both sides shall be guilty of a misdemeanor. Each day such live stock are allowed or permitted to run at large is a seperate offense.
