One Killed, One

Curtis Wills of Littlefield Dies Instantly Following Accident Wednesday Morning

Truck-Train Crash

Littlefield Man in Local Clinic With Severe Injuries Received In the Accident

One man was killed and another seriously injured here at 4:05 Wednesday morning when the truck in which they were riding crashed into the side of a Fort Worth and Denver freight at the crossing about one mile out of town on the Lockney-Plainview highway.

Curtis Wills, 35, of Littlefield was killed instantly and J C Glover Jr. of Littlefield is in the local clinic with a dislocated hip, severe facial and body lacerations and two broken ribs. His condition is reported to be satisfactory considering the extent of his injuries.

The two men were returning to Littlefield, their home, from East Texas where they had delivered a load of horses. The six-wheel truck which they were driving apparently struck between two tank cars of the freight train which was enroute to Lubbock.

It is stated that Wills, owner of the truck, was asleep at the time of the accident, and died instantly after the crash. Glover, driver of the truck, stated that he saw the train too late to stop and swerved in the direction the train was moving. The 70 car train was proceeding slowly after passing through the gates at the intersection of the Santa Fe and Denver tracks.

Relatives of Wills and Glover arrived here Wednesday morning from Littlefield. The body of Wills was taken overland to Littlefield for burial. He is survived by his wife, two children, and his parents, Mr and Mrs J W Wills, all of Littlefield.

Whitfill & Baggett Buy Elevator

A deal was completed this week whereby Messrs Ed Whitfill and J W Baggett purchased from J H Hohlaus, the South Plains Grain Co. elevator property, and now have charge of same and are conducting the business.

Whitfill & Baggett need no introduction to the people of Floyd county as they have been engaged for many years in the gin business here and at Aiken. They will continue to operate their gin plants.

This new concern will be known as the Lockney Gin and Grain Co., and they will purchase all kinds of grain that the farmer may have to sell in any quantity. A little later they will add a complete line of all kinds of feed, and also install a feed grinder, etc.

It is the intention of Messrs Whitfill & Baggett to give the farmer complete grain and feed service 24 hours out of the day and 365 days out of the year.

Mr Hohlaus has not announced his future plans, but will remain in Lockney for a while before making a definite decision just what he will do. He has been engaged in the grain business in Lockney for many, many years.

shopper surveys have been completed in the School Communities of Campbell, Hillcrest, Cedar, South Plains, Edgins, Fairmont, McCoy and Lakeview by the County Agricultural Agent, D E Bredthauer. A very serious infestation is anticipated in parts of these communities as he reports that as many as 10 egg pods were located on a space consisting of two square yards. Only a small percentage of these eggs have started to hatch.

Bredthauer has been notified by the Grasshopper control Department that sufficient bran and sodium arsenite are in transit for grasshopper control in Floyd County.

It is expected that the grasshoppers will have completed hatching by the 15th of May, and it will be necessary at this time that a poisoning campaign be started so as to kill a large portion of these grasshoppers before they do any damage to the row crops and at the same time wait until a large portion of the hatching has been completed so as to try and complete the job at one operation.

Grasshopper Survey Meet To Be Held Today

Entomologist From A & M To Assist In Campaign Against Invasion of Hoppers

W. Dickerson, entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service of College Station, will be the principal speaker at a grasshopper survey meeting to be held in the District Court Room at Floydada today. Dickerson will assist community leaders in organizing their communities for the purpose of waging a uniform campaign against the hopper invasion.

Hopper poisoning must be begun immediately as they have not yet migrated into the fields and are still in the fence rows and pastures. County Agent Brethauer estimates that the grasshoppers will not damage the wheat but they will be sufficiently large enough at the time the cotton and maize crops come up to do considerable damage. If every farmer will be cautious enough by scattering the poison around the fence rows, it is believed by local and state authorities that the hopper trouble can be handled in this section.

Reports show that the hoppers found here are of the destructive species and possess a migratory habit which makes them very injurious.

All persons who are interested in the control of this grasshopper menace are invited to attend the meeting at Floydada today.

A mixing plant for poison to kill the pests is now in operation, and sufficient arsenic and arsenite has been sent to help cope with the situation. Farmers are to furnish either bran or cotton seed hull to half of the bait.

2 teas. flour
Cayenne
1-2 teasp. salt
1 cup grated cheese
1 egg white
Crushed Brazil nuts
Mix flour and seasonings with beaten egg white. Mix well, roll grated cheese and fold into stiffly into small balls and roll in crushed Brazil nuts. (To crush, place between folds of paper towel and crush with rolling pin.) Fry in deep mazola (375 F.) until golden brown. Serve hot on toothpicks.
