"Uncle Joe" Allison Passes At Lubbock

"Uncle Joe" Allison, a familiar figure on the streets of Lockney for many years, passed away at the home of his son, Alvis, four miles southwest of Lubbock last Thursday afternoon.

"Uncle Joe" had been a resident of this area since 1910 and had lived in Lockney until about four years ago when his residence in the east part of town was destroyed by fire.

Mr. Allison had been working as a night watchman and sleeping during the day, it was reported. When a member of the family went to wake him at 4:30 p. m. Thursday he was found apparently lifeless in his bed. He was laid upon arrival of a physician, cause of death was believed to be due to a heart attack although he had suffered no previous attacks to the family's knowledge.

Funeral services were held at 2:30 o'clock Sunday afternoon in First Church of the Nazarene, Fourteenth and Avenue Q, with Rev. Albert F. Lamb, pastor, officiating. Burial was in Memorial Park cemetery. His wife died several years ago.

A. Hunt of Stephenville; Mrs. Rich Gordon of Foyens; and Mrs. Linnie Johnson, Oklahoma City, Okla.; five grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.

Last rites for Mrs. E. L. Ayres, pioneer of Lockney, were held in a graveside service in Silverton cemetery at 4 o'clock Wednesday. Earl Cantrell, assisted by J. W. Chancell, had charge of the services and funeral arrangements were under the direction of M. W. Lemons Funeral Home of Plainview.

Pallbearers were Buck Sams, Guy Sams, Kelly Webster, Marshal Davis, Jim Davis and Durwood Davis. Mrs. Ayres passed away Tuesday night in the Lockney hospital.

Mrs. E. L. Ayres was born March 29, 1874 in Erath county near Stephenville. The family moved to Tharpspring about 1881. While living there Mrs. Ayres obeyed the gospel of the Church of Christ. She remained faithful to the church and attended church until her health began to fail. In 1891 they moved to Briscoe county. On Dec. 12, 1894 she was married to Elmer Lee Ayres, who preceded her in death Dec. 3, 1946.

To this union were born seven children. One of which is deceased. Carlisle preceded her in death Dec. 1, 1934.

The surviving children are: Madison of Lamesa, Walter, Lee, Robert, Della and Frederick of Lockney. She is also survived by two granddaughters, Joye Lee of Modesto, Calif., and La Don of Lockney; one sister Miss Emma Waller of Lockney; and 14 nieces and nephews including Miss Emma Stalbird of Lockney.

Mr. and Mrs. Ayres moved from Briscoe County to Lockney in 1901 where they made their home until their death.

More Farm Bureau Meetings Announced

Ben Quebe of Providence, president of the Floyd County Farm Bureau announced another series of meetings this week in which the Farm Bureau will seek to educate and enroll Floyd County farmers in the Farm Bureau.

The Farm Bureau, an organization of farmers, which seeks to unite the efforts of farmers and sponsor legislation for the benefit of farmers, is an old organization in most parts of the nation, but new to West Texas.

Quebe said. The Bureau has been operating on a small scale in West Texas several years but has never before put on a concerted drive to gain members.

In a drive last year this county secured around 1200 members in their county organization. Mr. Quebe hopes that Floyd County will do at least half that well.

The first meeting of the series will be held at the high school in Lockney next Thursday night, February 26. The next meeting will be held at Dougherty Friday afternoon, Feb. 27th at 2:30 and the third meeting in the county court room at Floydada Friday night, Feb. 27 at 7:30.

A county-wide meeting is planned for Floydada on Thursday night, March 4 with a kick-off meeting to be held at both Floydada and Lockney on Friday night, March 5 at 7:30. Bill Shannon of Hale Center, will be the principal speaker at each of these meetings.

Mr. Quebe urged that every farmer in the county should attend at least one of these meetings and align himself with other farmers for their mutual interest.

Hospital Receives New Incubator

The Lockney hospital has received the new incubator for premature babies which was recently bought for the hospital by the Lockney Rotary Club.

The incubator is designed to keep the spark of life alive in babies who are born prematurely. It has special equipment for controlling the warmth as well as the humidity of the interior.

Coach Hansard said this week, "I have been very happy the past year in Lockney and had no thought of leaving until this position was offered me. However, it is a job that I can't afford to turn down and I have decided to accept."

Mrs. Hansard will also teach in the Cisco school system.

Greenville Man Found Dead At Floydada

The body of a man identified as C. M. Andrews of Greenville was found in a room at the Commercial Hotel in Floydada Tuesday afternoon. He had registered at the hotel Monday afternoon and was last seen about 7:30 Monday night when he ate supper in the hotel dining room.

Justice of the Peace T. Z. Reed, who investigated, returned a verdict of death from natural causes. The man was lying across a bed fully clothed and had been dead probably 15 or 18 hours when found. He was probably 60 years of age.

Whether he had been asphyxiated by gas fumes in the tightly closed room or had suffered a heart attack was not determined.

Hotel employees quoted him as saying that he was making a trip through the southwest to buy cotton. He had a son and a daughter in college in Alabama. Sheriff Leland Hart said. The body was returned to Greenville Wednesday.

Billy Wesley Wins Scholarship In 4-H Cotton Contest

College Station, Feb. 18.—Floyd County in the South Plains area of Texas came up with another winner when W. J. "Billy" Wesley, Jr., of Lockney, was chosen as one of seven winners in a state-wide 4-H cotton contest sponsored by the Anderson-Clayton Company, J. W. Potts, state boys' 4-H Club leader of Texas A. & M. College, announces.

Billy will receive a \$200 Anderson-Clayton Scholarship Award for submitting the most outstanding report in his area; this scholarship can be used for courses in agriculture at any of the six agricultural colleges here in Texas.

Billy's cotton demonstration for 1947 consisted of five acres planted to Paymaster, which produced 4,955 pounds of lint cotton and 8,220 pounds of cottonseed. Adjoining land produced an average of one and three-fourths bale. The five acres had been in sugar beets the previous season, had been fertilized with 8 tons per acre of barnyard fertilizer, and was irrigated in July and August. It was necessary for him to replant his crop following heavy spring rains.

Billy has also placed high in many of the livestock shows in which he had entries.

In order to win a first place, Billy was judged on the basis of the results of his 4-H cotton program, his participation in 4-H and community activities, high school scholarship, leadership ability especially in cotton work, and a short theme on the story of his contributions to the 4-H Cotton program, Potts said.

Calvin Pyle of the Lockney team, winner of the middleweight crown in the high school division of the Amarillo regional Golden Gloves tourney, blasted Paul Hill of Tahoka, high school division winner in the Lubbock regional Gloves meet, for a technical knockout in the first round of the feature bout.

In an exhibition go Lubbock's James Witt fought to a draw with Robert Quizenberry of Lockney, but fans applauded the bout as the best of the card. Both Witt and Quizenberry opened up with a barrage of lefts and rights at the opening bell and blasted each other around the ring for the full three rounds.

Lockney Students Rank High In Pepsi-Cola Test

ROAD BONDS ARE APPROVED MORE THAN FOUR TO ONE

Floyd County finally got together on a road paving program and in the road bond election Tuesday of this week approved an issue of \$500,000 by a vote of more than 4 to 1. The vote was 1470 for to 361 against.

The election Tuesday was the third time the county had voted on a road bond issue within the past three months. The first two were defeated by narrow margins. They were for \$300,000 issue. The road program was broadened and the issue increased in the last election.

Among the big boxes Lockney and Floydada both gave the issue a nice majority. Probably the largest percent among the larger boxes was West Lockney who voted 190 for to 27 against. Southwest Floydada voted 295 for to 86 against.

In the smaller boxes Sterley voted 42 to 6 in favor. Lone Star voted 93 to 2 in favor and Sandhill favored the issue 144 to 5.

Strongest vote against was South Plains who voted 51 to 7 against.

First plans of the Commissioners Court, according to Judge W. E. Grimes, is to contact the district highway engineer and secure an appointment to appear before the highway commission in Austin in order to present the matter to them. A large delegation of Floyd County citizens will make the trip with the Court, Judge Grimes said.

The Judge also said that the court was going to be very cautious in selling bonds, endeavoring to get the best deal possible.

Another matter which work has already started on is clearing the right-of-way for the proposed roads. The right-of-way has been secured most of the way on the Lone Star road as well as the Sandhill road, it was reported. These two roads will probably be the first two started under the program, it was indicated.

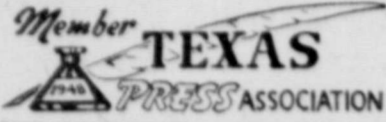

EIGHT STEERS BRING RECORD PRICE

Lubbock.—Eight steers from Texas Technological College sold at auction last week during the Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show at Fort Worth for an average of \$484.69 each, believed to be the highest price ever paid at public auction for show steers at the Fort Worth event, according to Dean of Agriculture W. J. Stangel.

Two of the animals were Hereford and six were Aberdeen Angus. They

averaged 1095 pounds each, and the price per pound paid ranged from 43 cents to 45 1/2 cents. They were sold to bring a return for their feeding and use in class instruction, Stangel said.

Kilmer B. Corbin Announces for Office Of State Senator

"The people of West Texas stand today on the threshold of the greatest era of prosperity in history," Judge Kilmer B. Corbin of Lamesa, stated here recently when he visited this area in the interest of his candidacy for State Senator from the 30th District.

"Whether or not the people of this great section are able to take advantage of the opportunity which this new era will offer will depend largely upon the strength of their voice in State Government," Corbin added. "and I want to have a part in strengthening that voice."

The 28 year old Dawson Countian, who is now serving his third term as County Judge of his home county without opposition opened his active campaign by lashing out at the system which has existed in the past, to give politicians, who are tools of the special interest groups, almost complete control of the State Legislature.

The Senatorial aspirant, who was reared on a Dawson County farm, educated in the schools there, Texas Technological College, and the University of Texas Law School, called on voters of this district to examine his record in both public and private life, and his actions and experience in county government. Prior to his election as County Judge, he taught and served as principal in Dawson County Rural Schools. Judge Corbin is a lawyer, a member of the Lamesa Bar and State Bar of Texas.

"The need exists today more than ever before for sound thinking and constructive action in our state law-making bodies," Corbin said. "The people must awaken to the fact that too many state office holders owe their allegiance—their very political existence—to special groups who would dominate legislation in Texas. There are too many men holding down big jobs at the expense of the farmer, rancher and small business man of Texas."

Corbin is married, and the father of three children, Barry, age 7, Blaine, age 4, and Jane, age 3. He has long been active in several state organizations whose chief aim is bettering the conditions of West Texas. He is a member of the Baptist Church, a

32nd Degree Mason, Past Master of Lamesa Lodge, and a member of the Knights of Pythias, and a member of the Knights of Kloran.

Corbin's platform, which he hopes to present to every voter of the district before election day, includes the completion of redistricting of Texas' legislative districts in order that the people of West Texas will have an equal voice in their state government; a constructive program of soil conservation; a social security program for the aged, blind and dependent children of the state; a sound program for the building of a system of farm-to-market roads for Texas, which will be second to none; more and better aid for the schools of Texas, and a revision of the outmoded Code of Criminal Procedure of Texas.

A plan to pass a law to prevent large corporations from purchasing land for any purpose other than for which the incorporation was accomplished will also be one of his main aims. If elected, "The wealth of the land, belongs to the people," Corbin stated. "And I, for one, will work to see that the lands of West Texas are kept from the hands of monopolies."

"I am entering this race," Corbin said, "with the feeling that my background as a farm boy, a teacher, a lawyer, and a public official has given me the qualifications with which I can serve the people of my district to their advantage. I have no connection with the vested interests of Texas and will never obligate myself to anyone except the people I serve. If elected, I will exert my every effort in the interest of the people of the 30th District. No man can do more; no man should do less."

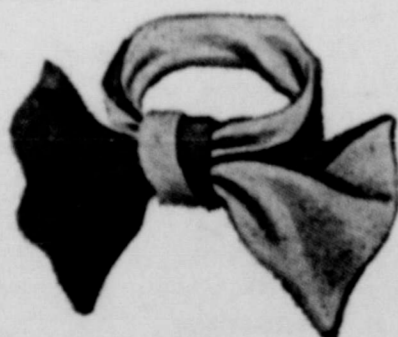

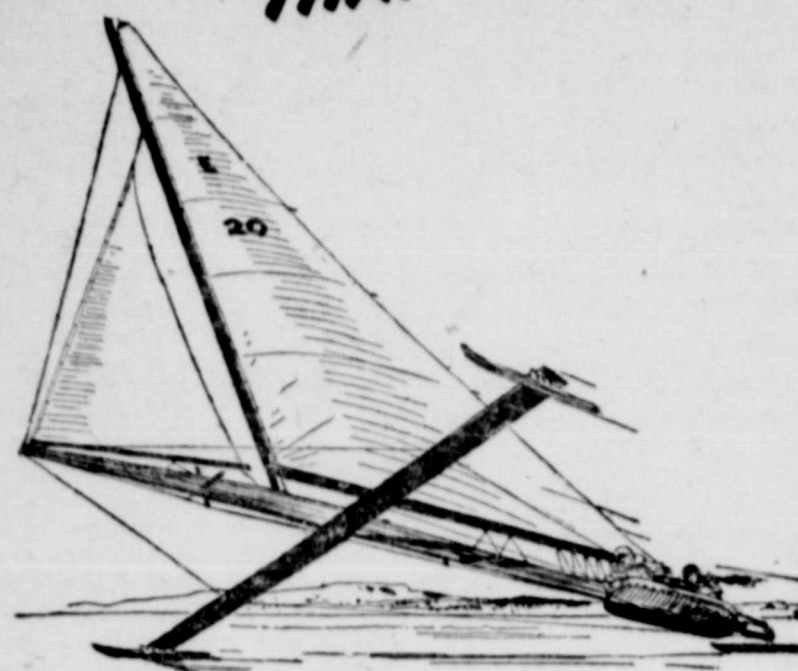

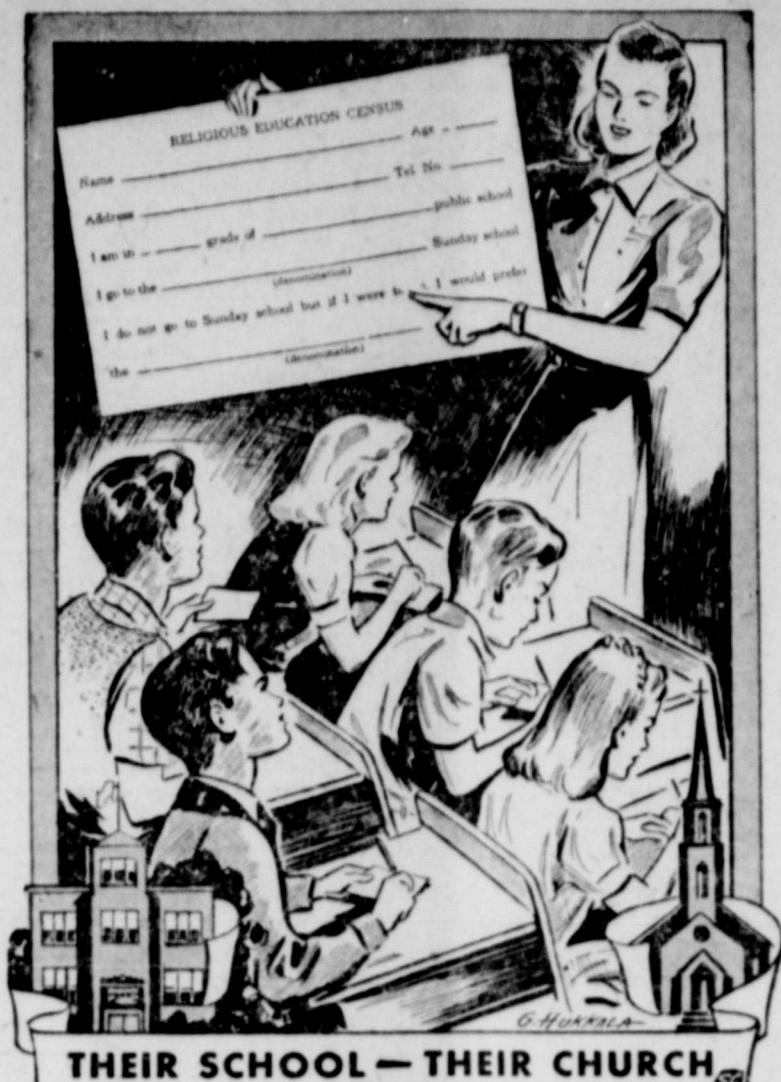
