Demonstrations of weed killers will be given by C. E. Fisher of the Spur experiment station The latest spraying devices for use in weed control are to be on display, among them a spray that reduces the amount of liquid required from 200 to 5 gallons to the show: the acre.

The high gallonage required by previous equipment was one of the hurdles in weed control. The low gallonage device dispenses the same amount of 2-4D as the big gallonage equipment hut does the job as well, say those who have observed its use. The device operates under thirty pound pressure from a plane or motor vehicle.

Pressure was on this week through out the states of Texas, Louisiana. Mississippi, Oklahoma and Arkansas for the complete liqidation of surplus personal property. Employing a system of traveling sales crews operating out of the Grand Prairie office. the War Asets Administration quickly readied emergency clearance involving more than ten million dollars worth of materials. The site liquidations will get under way March 25 at New Orleans, and additional sales have been scheduled to follow in quick | succession at San Antonio, Houston Oklahoma City and Little Rock. The agency advises the public to make on the spot inspections, since time will not permit advance information in the form of catalog listings. Other details will be furnished on request.

Three Texas camps are to be cleared of remaining surplus buildings for offsite use via the sealed bid mehtod. At Camp Barkeley, near Abilene, purchasers will have until April 5 to get bids to the Grand Prairie WAA office on 45 structures and 100 tagert frames. The other bid sales concern 60 Fort Brown buildings, near Brownsville, and 53 GI structures at Camp Swift, near Bastrop. In each of the offerings priority claimants will be considered during an initial period. with the general public buying the residue before final deadlines.

War Assets Administration is soon to stage another nation-wide clearance of surplus aircraft under both fixed prices and sealed bids from veterans and other buyers. A total of 336 planes, 90 per cent located at Bush Field. Ga., are in the offering. Tactical, training and transport airplanes are included, with one C-47 transport on sale at Walnut Springs, Ark. On the fixed price portion, veteran buying begins March 29, with other classes buying in successive later periods. The sealed bid sale stipulated that purchase offers must be in the hands of WAA's Washington, D C., office by March 29.

One of the country's biggest surplus carbon plants, located at Sunray, Moore County, went on WAA's high bid block this week. Prospective purchasers must submit their proposals
