

Local Students Win Number of Places At League Meet

Lockney school students won a number of places at the district Interscholastic League meet held at Floydada last Saturday. The high school track team won fourth place in the meet, the grade school track team won first place, and high school students made excellent showing in the literary events.

Harold Hall won first in the district in tennis singles last week and will enter the district meet at Lubbock on April 24. The girls volleyball team will enter the district tournament at Ralls Saturday morning of this week.

In high school track events the following places were won by Lockney students:

Larry Godfrey won third in 220 yard dash, the Lockney relay team won third in the mile relay, with Bob Logan, Calvin Pyle, Glenn Worsham and Herbert Watson carrying the stick; Bobby Carthel won second in broadjump, with Glenn Worsham winning fourth; Jack Cole won first in the mile run, Glenn Worsham won second in the high hurdles and second in the low hurdles and Jack Cole won fourth in the low hurdles.

Of the eight teams participating, Floydada won first, Spur second, Crosbyton third and Lockney fourth.

All boys who won as much as third place will participate in the district meet at Lubbock on April 24.

Grade School Wins
The Lockney grade school team swept the grade school events almost clean, piling up more points than all other teams in the district competition. Boyce Sutterfield won first in except chinning the bar, making 34½ points to a total of 29½ for all other schools.

C. B. Smart won first in the 100 yard dash, first in the broadjump, Jimmy Williams won first in the high jump, Boyce Sutterfield won first in the 50 yard dash and the Lockney team won first in the 440 yard relay with Smart, Sutterfield, Williams and Ray Bertram carrying the stick.

Lockney placed four students in the literary events. Three students entered the typing contest from Lockney and all three qualified for the regional meet. They were Bobby Lu Casey, Mary Louise Manning, and Edwin Langford. Two from Matador also qualified in this event, making a total of five who will represent this district. Edwin Langford also won first in the ready writing contest.

A much improved senior cast presented "The Perfect Gentleman" in the district one-act play contest held Thursday night of last week. They won second place with Floydada winning first, and Ralls and Spur also entering.

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Irrigation School Planned Here For Friday, April 23

Plans are underway now for the annual Irrigation school which will be held at the Plains Theatre here Friday, April 23. A group of outstanding farm men from the area will appear on the program, according to County Agent A. L. Hartzog, who is in charge of the program.

Plans are underway also for a feed to be given by Lockney business men at the noon hour. This is also an annual custom.

The program will be an all-day affair with the first discussion scheduled to start about 9:30 a. m.

Those who will appear on the program and the subjects they will discuss are as follows:

C. E. Fisher of the Spur Experiment Station will talk on "Weed Killers at Work under Irrigation."

Ray Dickson, superintendent of the Spur station will discuss "Pre-Planting Soil Moisture as it Affects Cotton Yields."

Dr. A. W. Young, head of the Agriculture Department of Texas Technological College will speak on "The Use of Fertilizer."

John Box of the Experiment Station will discuss "Cotton Breeding and Mechanical Harvesting."

R. E. Karper, agronomist of the Lubbock station will talk on "Grain Sorghums Breeding". Mr. Karper is the world's foremost grain sorghum breeder, and this talk will especially be of interest to certified and registered growers of grain sorghums.

Roy Quinby, superintendent of the Chillicothe Station or Kenneth B. Portis of the Amarillo station will talk on "Improved Varieties of Wheat in Texas."

The school will probably close out about 4 or 5 o'clock in the afternoon.

Three Oil Tests In Floyd Co. Reported

At least three offsets of the No. 1 Byrd discovery well in eastern Hale county will be located in Floyd County, according to reports here.

The discovery well is located about three miles north and a little east of Petersburg and about 16 miles airline southwest of Lockney. The Byrd tract is just over the line in Hale County. The three new tests reported are on the E. T. Crump land, section 19, block K, partly in Hale but mostly in Floyd County, on the Bob Mayo land, section 18, block K, also mostly in Floyd County, and the L. M. Carmichael land, section 18, block K and mostly in Floyd county.

Reports are that contract has been let on these wells and that operations are to start soon.

The Byrd well was producing at the rate of 12 to 15 barrels per hour after swabbing, it was reported. A pump is being installed.

County Given Quota Of \$125,000 Bond Sales In Loan Drive

A quota of \$125,000 has been set for Floyd County in the Security Loan campaign, April 15 through June 30, Mr. J. M. Willson, county Savings Bonds chairman, announced today after receiving the figure from the U. S. Treasury Department.

"This is the highest quota we have received since the war," Mr. Willson said, "but the threat that today's peace-time inflation offers to our personal and national economic security makes it vital that we achieve the objective. I have no doubt that this county can and will meet the quota."

He said that rapid progress was being made toward completion of the volunteer organization that will carry out the Savings Bonds solicitation in the county, but urged that individuals, clubs and organizations offer their services in the campaign.

"The United States cannot be for their own strong unless we have a strong national economy," he said. "If the individual citizens of this and every county in the nation provide for their own financial security, it follows that the nation is strong economically. Widespread ownership of Savings Bonds by the people fights inflation provides a guard against possible depression and allows for the sound management of our national debt. Money received from the sale of Savings Bonds issued to retire inflationary short-term government obligations which are held by banks and large corporations."

WE CAN SHOW BY EXAMPLE

Viewed from historical perspective, American leadership of the democratic forces of the world has come with unprecedented suddenness. It took England centuries to reach a comparable pinnacle of power and prestige which found its climax in the Victorian era. The same thing was true of France in her great days. Now, only a few years after our long-established policy of isolation was abandoned, all the Western powers are looking to us to blueprint the future.

We have assumed this leadership at a time when some of the most difficult and dangerous issues the nations have ever known are coming to a head. And the fate of the world depends to a greater degree than most of us realize on the wisdom of the American people and their government.

Many may still believe that our obligation can be discharged entirely through economic relief, military support, and other purely material factors. That attitude could be a sure road to disaster. Material things will gain nothing unless they are backed up by an example that will help to reestablish ethical and spiritual values in the Western world.

from economic depression to war itself, can be traced back to a single cause. That cause is Statism—the idea that the people exist for the government, instead of the government existing for the people. That has been the philosophy of every dictatorship from Mussolini's to Hitler's to Franco's to Stalin's. It has led to the planned terrorization of whole peoples, and to a complete degradation of every ideal of freedom and the dignity of man. It has even made alarming progress in England, where socialism is gradually following the same course that has led to oppression in a dozen countries, and we are beginning to feel the bite of it in the United States through the continued expansion of government authority.

What can the United States show the world by example? First, and most important, it can show that the principles of equality, freedom and opportunity for all on which this country was built are not out of date. It can then show that the free enterprise system, which the government can regulate but with which it was never intended to compete by the founders of our country, can do infinitely more to raise the standard of living of a people than any other system. Lastly, it can prove that a nation can achieve greatness and power through encouraging the individual abilities and ambitions of its people instead of through coercion and brutality and suppression of debate.

This is a permanent contribution that America made to the world.

KEEPING UP THE FIGHT

Some men high in the food industry have recently forecast that there will be a decline in the general retail price level in the relatively near future. And organizations dealing in other kinds of retail commodities have also sounded hopeful notes.

These forecasts must necessarily be taken with a grain of salt, for the reason that we are living in unpredictable times and any number of things could change the outlook drastically. However, they are indicative of the attention business is giving to the price problem. All over the country, both chain and independent merchants are reporting that substantial percentage of consumers have been forced to cut down their buying. Savings are gone, and current income in these

cases is insufficient to purchase much beyond the necessities. And that condition contains a grave threat to the system of mass production and mass distribution of goods which underlies the American standard of living.

It is significant that retailing has often taken the lead in movements to reduce prices and to prevent price increases. It has done this in various ways. First of all it has voluntarily cut its own unit profits, and reduced overhead costs to the minimum. Secondly, it has cooperated with manufacturers in seeking means to produce goods of a given quality at a lower cost. Third, it has been a great help to consumers in showing them how to make the dollar go as far as possible.

The next few months will tell if

the peak of inflation has been passed or not. Whatever the answer, intelligent American business will keep on fighting the problem with all the resources it has.

Urges Immunization Against Diphtheria

Austin, Texas.—It is a tragedy that Texas parents continue to allow their babies to suffer and die from that painful and killing disease diphtheria. This is the opinion of Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, who says "It is up to the parents. If they protect their children with immunization they need not have diphtheria."

Dr. Cox said that it is amazing that this disease should be allowed to take its toll of young lives when it can be entirely stamped out by proper immunization. Yet in the past week, 33 cases were reported in this state.

"Babies should be immunized by the age of eight or nine months," Dr. Cox advised. Authorities on the care of infants recommend a first dose by the age of eight or nine months, and sometimes as early as six months. A second dose is usually given later."

To maintain complete immunity, Dr. Cox said that a reinforcing dose of toxoid is advised when a child is old enough to enter school if a Schick test reveals the need of one. Children who have never been immunized certainly should be protected without further delay, the State Health Officer declared, and added that it is the responsibility of the parents to save the lives of their children.

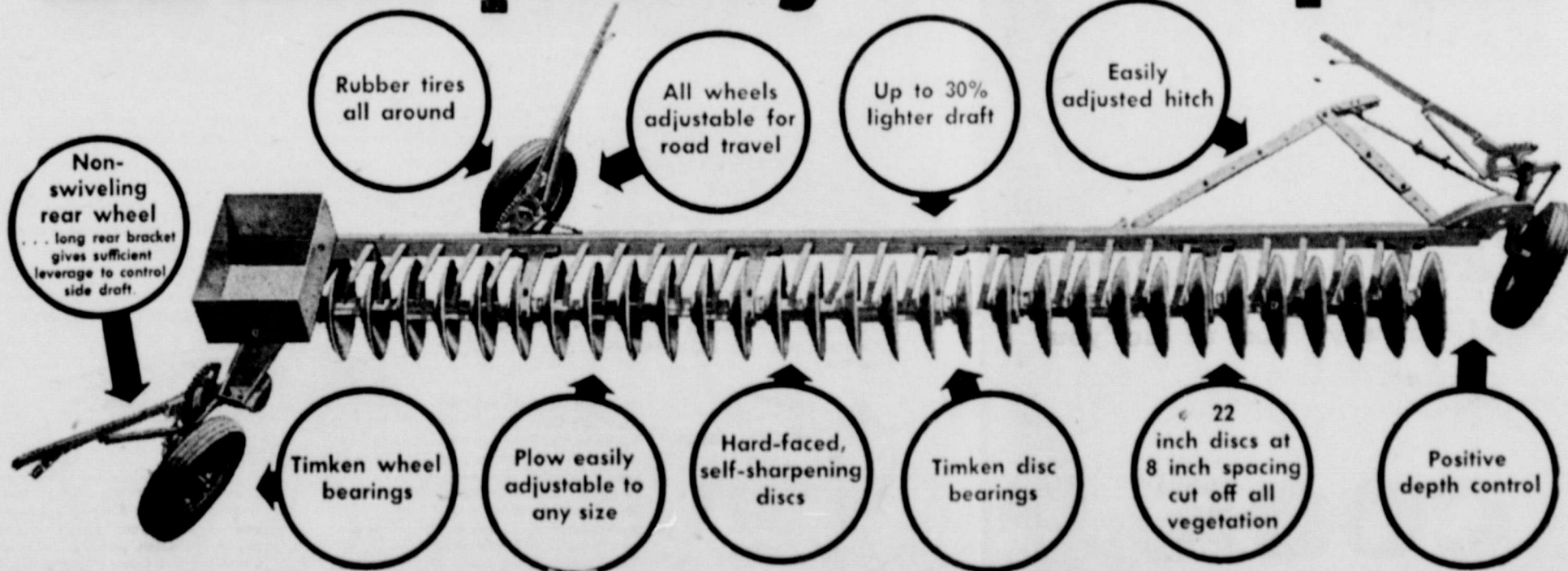

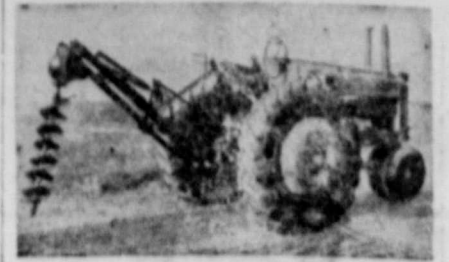

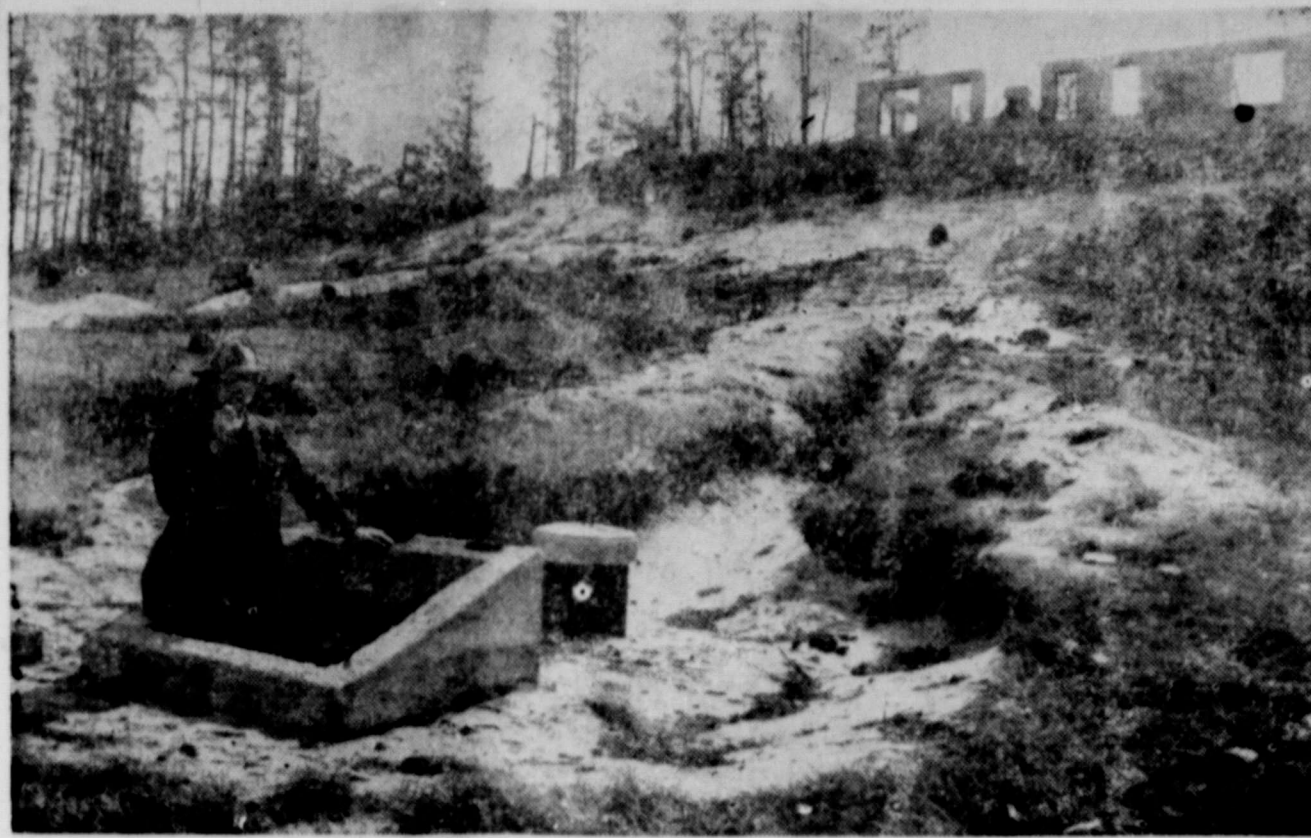

Farmer Shoots Rich Cattleman, Chops Up Body

Former Convict Says Deed Inspired by Need For Money.

COUNCIL BLUFFS, IOWA.—Confession of a farmer that he shot and killed a wealthy cattle buyer, cut the body into bits to speed up its burning on a pile of corn cobs and then scattered the remains on a cornfield, was announced by local authorities.

The slayer, C. R. Bruntlett, 50, a former convict, said he was motivated by a desire to obtain money to pay his gambling debts and to make a payment on a farm. He said he killed the cattle buyer, Percy J. Smith, 57, after forcing Smith to write a check for \$9,800, ostensibly for 60 head of cattle.

Son Unaware of Deed.

While Smith's body was burning on the Bruntlett farm, 4 1/2 miles southeast of here, his son, Richard Smith, farm operator, went to the scene in search of his father and stood nearby, unaware of the tragedy, while the slayer assured him Smith had left some time before.

Bruntlett has been held since the day after Smith's disappearance, because he was the last person known to have seen the cattle buyer alive.

Max Studer, agent for the Iowa bureau of criminal investigation, said Bruntlett gave this account of the slaying:

He picked Smith up at his home and drove him to the Bruntlett farm on the ruse that he had 60 head of cattle to sell. At the farm Bruntlett, who owns only 25 head of cattle, forced Smith at gunpoint to write the check.

Hacked Up Body.

Then he shot Smith in the head twice, tossed his body on the pile of cobs, poured kerosene on it and lit the pile. This done, he went to Council Bluffs where he hired a truck to haul his 25 head of cattle to Omaha and telephoned Mrs. Smith that her husband had gone to Kansas to buy cattle.

Returning to the farm, he found that the body had not burned well. He took a corn knife and hacked it to pieces, put it back on the cobs

and poured more kerosene on it.

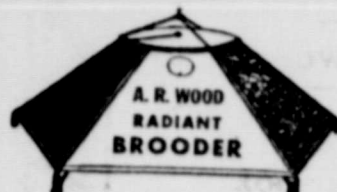
During a week of questioning, Bruntlett's wife, mother of three children, told authorities her husband didn't have 60 head of cattle and that she hadn't seen Smith hauling cattle away from the farm.

Marketing Lighter Hogs Stretches Feed Supply

By marketing their hogs at just one pound lighter weight, hog men over the country could conserve about seven million bushels of grain, says Wisconsin College of Agriculture. Marketing hogs at lighter weights is one of the best ways to stretch the feed supply. Hogs marketed before they weigh 230-240 pounds usually require less feed to put on a pound of gain than hogs fed to heavier weight.

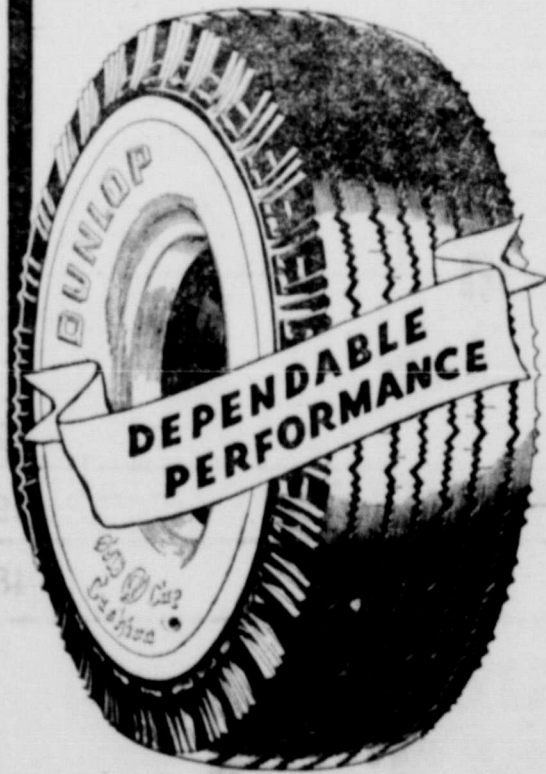

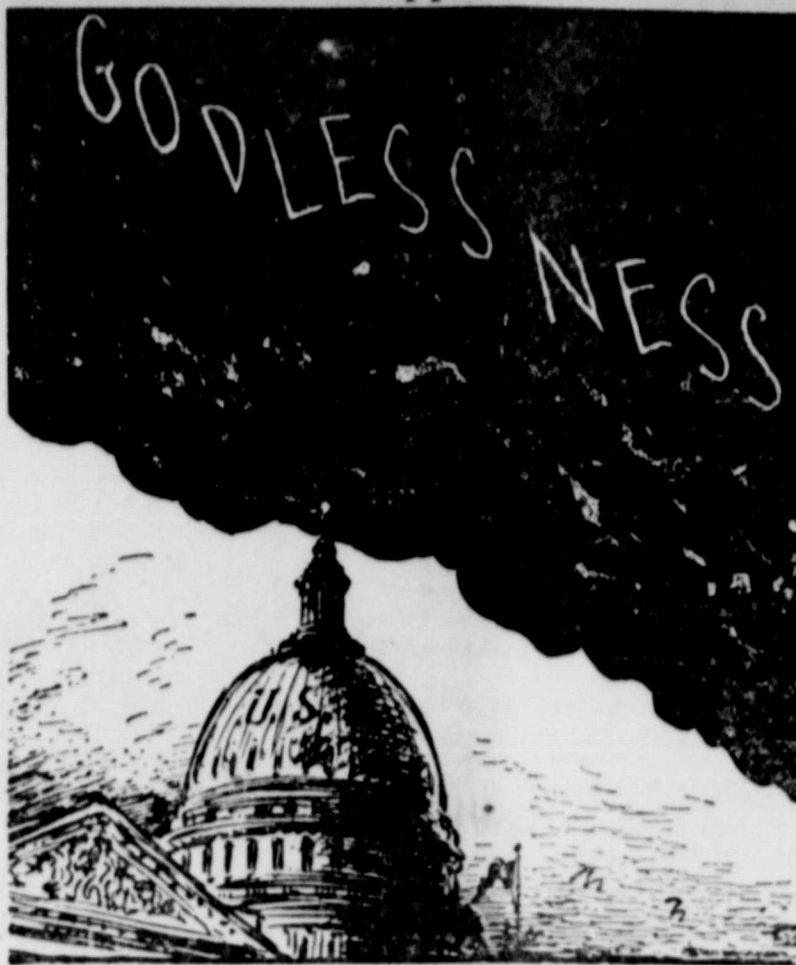

Starter Solution Helps Garden Grow
Miss Petty Says

To get an early start in growth with tomatoes, peppers, and eggplant, try using a starter solution, says Leila Petty, County Home Demonstration Agent of the Extension Service of Texas A. and M. College. These vegetables are having to be set out a little late this year due to the late freeze.

When setting out the plants in the garden, pour a teaspoon of the solution around each one. And here are directions for making the starter solution: add one pound of 5-10-5 fertilizer to five gallons of water—that's the same as 10 pounds of 5-10-5 to a barrel of water. Mix well and let the solution stand for a while so it will completely dissolve. Repeat in seven to ten days to give the plants a good "send-off".

The presentation of the certificates

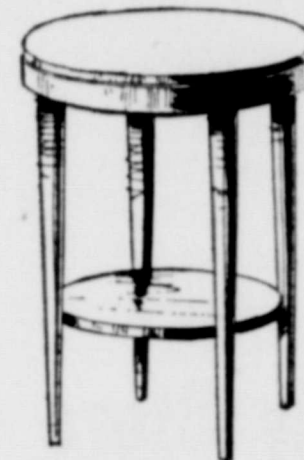

Weekly SURPLUS NEWS

The regional War Assets Administration office will shift into new quarters during May by moving a few hundred feet into Plant A, of the former North American Aviation plant near Grand Prairie. The relocation next door to the present WAA headquarters in Plant B was declared most satisfactory from the viewpoint of government economy and suitability to some 600 employees, most of whom reside in either Dallas or Fort Worth. The move will be made to clear B Plant for the navy. Plant A is under a navy lease to the Texas Engineering and Manufacturing Company, now engaged in aircraft modification and other work. Both Temo and WAA will occupy the A Plant.

The WAA is looking for a new buyer for the big Continental Motors plant at Garland. The National Equipment Company of Marshall, Texas, previously had contracted to buy the 194 acre installation, but failed to meet the down payment deadline. The factory, with its eight additional subsidiary buildings, is described as one of the finest plants still under government ownership. Letter proposals

for purchase, accompanied by one percent deposit, will be received by the Grand Prairie office of real property disposal between April 9 and April 29.

Seventy-five buildings of the Childress Army Air Field are not to be included in the airport property to be transferred by WAA to the city of Childress. They will be offered in a public location sale at the field April 21 and 22. The buildings will be sold regardless of priority, enabling purchasers who desire individual structures for their own use to buy them on high bid basis for removal. Catalogs will be available at the Childress location, where the inspection period will continue through April 20.

No punches will be pulled in describing the condition of 40 house trailers soon to be sold by WAA at Houston. The trailers are actually unusable due to deterioration of roofs, sides and flooring, the agency advises. Thirteen are located at the University of Houston, 3801 St. Bernard St., with the other at 3201 Wheeler St., where they may be inspected on April 26. They'll be offered on a high bid basis to World War II veterans from 10 to 11 a. m. April 27, with any remaining going to the general public thereafter.



soon to the Pampa Army Air Field. Approximately 207 surplus buildings at this field will be offered without priority through informal bidding May 4, 5 and 6. Almost every standard type of GI camp building will be included in the sale. The general public is invited to complete inspection by visiting the field between April 2 and May 3, excepting Saturdays and Sundays.

As WAA scurries toward the finish line in its disposal job, a number of small site clearances will place quantities of consumer goods on the market at scattered locations in Texas. Goods discarded for military usage are being assembled now on lot bid sales at Love Field, Dallas, and camps near Lubbock. WAA emphasized that the army and navy still has top priority for withdrawal of any material it may conceivably need. Advance announcement of location sales will be made through the Grand Prairie Customer Service Center.

As the larger war surplus installations are cleared a consumer goods in the current series of War Assets location sales, additional smaller locations in North Texas and other places in the southwest will be the scenes of emergency clearance sales. The WAA advises that due to the larger number of these small sites and the small amount of property, only limited advance notification of these sales will be possible. It urges prospective buyers to watch local newspapers for such announcements.

Part of the Oklahoma Ordnance Works at Choctaw will go into peacetime production as the result of action by War Assets Administration this week. The ordnance plant's power unit and water system was sold to the Grand River Dam Authority of the state of Oklahoma for \$3,500,000.

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One of the big problems of insect control is to find new poisons as fast as the insects become resistant to the old ones. Florida laboratory workers have developed house flies which can withstand twice the amount of DDT that kills normal flies.
