## **CCC Purchase** \*Agreements Protect **Grain Prices**

Farmers in Floyd County can protect the price of their grain crops crops this year through two methods Ray S. McEntire, Administrative VOLUME 46 Officer of the Floyd County Agricultural Conservation Association, points out. Purchase agreements as well as commodity loans will be offered to farmers as a means of price For Colorado support on 1948 crops of wheat and grain sorghums. The purchase agreement and loan are offered farfrom time of harvest through December 31, 1948. Under these purchase agreements the producer will state the maximum quantity of the elgible commodity upon which he desires an option to deliver The CCC will accept any quantity up to the maximum stated by the producer during the 30-day period immediately following the maturity date of the 1948 loans, April 30, 1949. The purchase agreement program is offered to assure producers price support at not less than the announced county loan rate for both wheat and grain sorghums where the pro ducer is (1) unable to obtain storage desires the assurance of a floor price on his grain, and (3) his type of storage on the farm does not meet loan storage spefications.

Purchase Agreement is Simple

The eligible producer who signs a purchase agreement form and pays his fee to the county committee has a standing offer by CCC that if he has not been able to sell his wheat or grain sorghums between the date the form is signed and April 3o, 1949. for at least the support price, the CCC will purchase the grain, The producer has a "bid" or an "offer". and at any time he can obtain from the trade more than the CCC "bid". he may, if he chooses, sell his grain. 

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an Amendment to Article 5 of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Section thereto to be known as Section 1-a, authorizing the Legislature to provide for the retirement and compensation of judges and Commissioners of Appellate Courts and Judges of District and Criminal District Courts on account of length of service, age or disability, and for their reassignment to active duty where and when needed; providing for the submission of the Amendment to the voters of this State; and providing for the necessary proclamation and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article 5 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding theirto a new Section to be known as "Section 1-a," which shall read as follows:

"Section 1-a. The Legislature shall provide for the retirement and compensation of Judges and Commissioners of the Appellate Courts and Judges of the District and Criminal Courts en account of length of service, age or disability, and for their reassignment to active duty where and when needed."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the State of Texas at an election to be held on the second day of November. 1948, at which election all voters favoring such proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for the retirement and compensation of Judges and Commissioners of the Appellate Courts and Judges of the District and Criminal District Courts of this State on account of length of service, age or disability and for their reassignment to active duty where and when needed."
