





Echos From The President's Speech

Few have been the occasions, since the development of two strong political parties, that an address of the President of the United States has received the unanimous approval of all the people that Mr. Roosevelt's Sunday night speech received. Republicans and Democrats, labor capital, and business, big and little, united in praising the definite stand taken by the President.

Even those who have consistently disagreed with the President on all his policies could find little in the speech that did not truly represent the opinion of the mass of the people. A few, including the appeasement leader, Mr. Wheeler, did criticise the speech and others were quick to applaud the stand taken by the Senator while remaining silent regarding the talk heard around the world and delivered by a leader who has never pussy-footed about his position on foreign affairs. That Mr. Wheeler and his cohorts received so little support is truly indicative of the people's approval of Mr. Roosevelt's stand.

Of course there was some disagreement from some quarters on the speech. The mustached-man, author of "Mein Kampf", evidently didn't like it and those German newspaper editors who were privileged to read only that portion of the speech that their leader permitted found occasion to criticise it. The President of the United States was called a liar and even God was called upon to punish him, this coming from a vegetarian who has consistently denied the existence of a Supreme Being.

In this country, where the voice of the people is still heard above that of an individual, there arose a mighty shout of indorsement when the closing words of the President were heard or read. That was national unity as expressed by a people who still have the freedom of expression and are willing to make sacrifices to maintain it.
