Survey needs more people

With the deadline just two weeks away, slightly more than 1,100 Castro County residents have registered their occupations, skills and services with the Texas Employment Commission's county-wide labor survey.

"THE NECESSARY 10 percent of the county's total population has been reached," said Gene Clements, supervisor of the TEC's Smaller Communities Team, which is conducting the free survey. "This will furnish a cross-section of the county's skills and services. However," he added, "we need an even greater number of registrants in order to reflect a more accurate listing of the county's industrial development potential."

Main purpose of the survey is to provide statistics that could lead to future industrial development in the county. Clements said that potential industrialists might interpret a light registration here as a negative attitude toward new industry by the county's citizens.

"A COMMUNITY'S attitude is a major factor for industries seeking to expand or relocate," he said, "and our attitude here toward increased development must be better expressed."

Jimmy Ross, president of the Chamber of Commerce — which requested the current survey — also urged more local residents to register.

"All communities that have previously been furnished this service have shown more willingness to assure a successful survey," Ross said. "Dimmitt and Castro County have a great deal to offer in the more industrial future. We shouldn't ignore a program that is designed to help us grow."

ROSS REMINDED local residents that the labor survey "is being conducted at Castro County's request, and at virtually no cost."

Clements explained that the labor survey isn't intended to list only potential employees of new industry, but is aimed at providing accurate statistics on the numbers and types of professional and business services available here, and on the general "make-up" of the county's population.

"Please register with the Labor Survey at 103 East Bedford as soon as you can," Clements urged. "Less than five minutes of your time is required to register yourself and all eligible members of your household."

Patrol reports nine May wrecks

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated nine accidents on rural highways in Castro County during May, according to Sgt. Vernon Cawthon, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

THESE CRASHES resulted in one person killed, three persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$8,570.

The Highway Patrol figures do not include wrecks in the Dimmitt city limits during May, in which one man was killed and two injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for Castro County during the first five months of 1969 shows a total of 36 accidents resulting in one killed, 21 injured, and an estimated property damage of \$28,501.

Inflation has been in the news more in the past few days than ever before. Even a television network devoted an entire program to the subject and the last administrator of OPA, Michael V. DeSalle, was in the news again, advocating some type of voluntary price controls. He even suggested that the president use the persuasive powers of his office to encourage the big corporations and businesses to initiate self imposed price controls.

I am no part of an economist. In fact I have had very little contact with money or anything of very much cash value. It follows that I can't speak with anything approaching a large hunk of authority concerning things financial. However, try as I would, I couldn't find the logic in the idea that ten percent added to everybody's income tax would put a damper on inflation. Apparently about all that little gimmick did was to make it harder for everybody to pay their light bill and green fees.

Far be it from me to presume to tell the powers that be, or that was, how to run their business but somebody is going to be forced to make some changes. Ours is a rich and powerful country and wealthy as all get out, but everything has its point of exhaustion, even the United States of America.

In addition to the subject of inflation another matter of general interest that has been appearing in the papers recently has to do with munitions and armament factories reaping exorbitant profits from the production of war materials. To me, this seems to be the most likely cause of inflation. This segment of our economy is not in the business of creating wealth but actually are engaged in the business of destroying wealth and devouring the growth potential of the nation's economy. We are not knocking our own defense establishment, we are proud of it and it must be maintained.

It would seem reasonable, however, that if Mr. and Mrs. John (See ABOUT DIMMITT, Page 6)

Panhandle girl first to go for Miss Grain Sorghum title

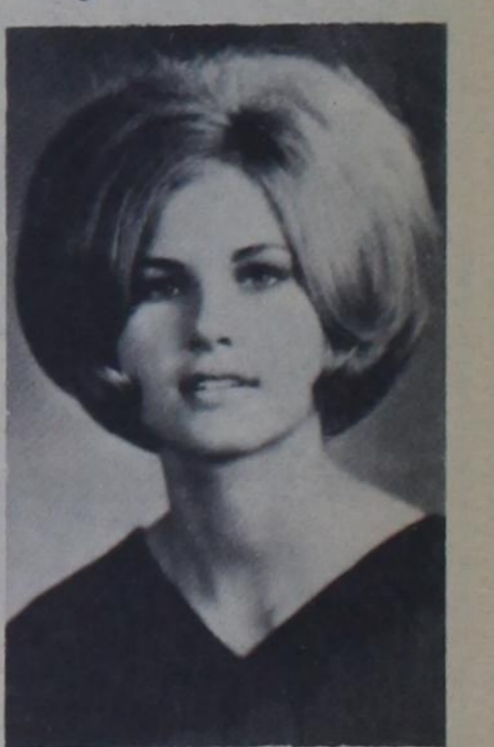
The Miss Grain Sorghum of the Nation Pageant has received its first entry.

On writing a check, place the numeral amount close to the dollar sign. In other words, do not leave a space between the dollar sign and the numerals.

Let's say that you are issuing a check for \$15.27. In writing out the fifteen, start it far to the left. There should be no space between the left edge of the check and the FIFTEEN.

When you write the "and", put it on a slant. Print it in capitals. Keep the written figures close together.

Maintain your savings account back in a safe place. Print the account number on the outside of the holder for easy reference.

Record your savings account number, checking account num-

ber and credit card numbers in a special notebook.

Thursday night we studied aircraft structure and engine operation and started the Federal Aviation Administration regulations.

I was told to be sure and tell who was in the class so I will. They are Charlie White, our school superintendent; Emmett Broder-son, Gene Smith, Johnny Kittrell, Loy Wylie, my cousin, Kim Parker, and me.

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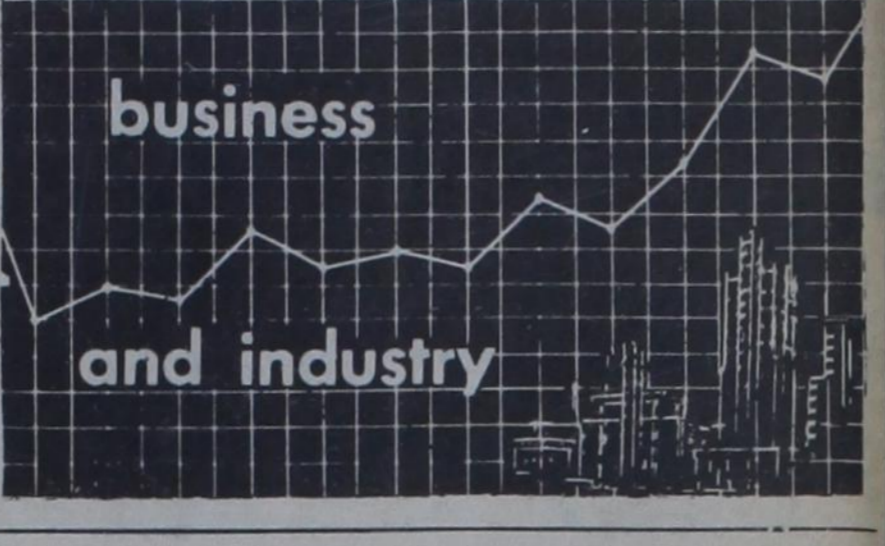
