First we want to say that we appreciate the "pat on the back" when you called to the attention of your readers the fact that Dalhart because of its good fire record has received the maximum credit rating. No town or city in Texas, even those having paid fire departments, has a better credit rating than Dalhart. The members of our department are glad to have been instrumental in saving the citizens of our town many dollars in insurance pre-

And now Ed quoting from your column you say "It is probably true that in their efforts to raise sufficient funds to do the things they want to do the fire boys may have done some things that many of us don't think beneficial to all concerned.'

We infer from this you mean the sponsoring of carnivals by the fire department. We have tried to finance our organization by the sale of tickets to our annual dance on February 22nd. Some years we have been able to do this but for the past few years we have not. We have also tried staging shows and "giving away" a car; both returned little financial remuneration. So at times when our funds were low or depleted and we have been approached about sponsoring a carnival we have consented, as we found this a means of raising some "easy money" without much effort or expense on our part. Then to the front lawn that reaches down to the beautiful Potomac. Now American citizens stand there and gaze silently across the river, as once again they see the tall, handsome surveyor, the statesman and soldier, and offer a prayer of thanks for the wisdom that set this nation on a true course.



tired of hearing that it plans to drive on Singapore or into the South Pacific. When has it said so? he challenged.

Spokesmen said very little about the U.S. decision to fortify Guam and Somoa except that Japan views the action with "concern."

Still other officials said the Far Eastern situation would be "greatly mitigated" if the U.S. could be persuaded to restrict its activities to the Western hemisphere.

It appeared possible today that under German prodding Russia and Japan may sign a non-aggression pact which would allow Japan to concentrate its forces for a drive into the South Pacific. There were also indications that Japan is still massing forces that could be used for a South Pacific thrust.

Fifteen Japanese battleships today cruised in the Gulf of Siam, within easy striking distance of Singapore. Representatives of the Dutch government-in-exile today warned Dutch residents to get out of Bangkok because of the tense Far Eastern situation.
