



"Good-Bye" to a Debt Limit

In the wake of the passage of the lend-lease bill last month, we have seen negotiations to take over Britain's war contracts in exchange for her manufacturing plants and of her real estate in this country as well as her securities. We have seen billions of new appropriations for our own defense measures. The passage of the \$7,000,000,000 "arsenal of democracy" bill increased our per capita debt by \$53. This alone boosted the per capita share from \$346 to \$399, or about \$2000 per family.

When the latest debt figures for the quarter ending March 31 are available, the total will be found to be rapidly approaching the present ceiling of \$65,000,000,000. In so saying, I am considering this in terms of what we are already committed for and of what we expect to do. The original budget cost of the defense program for 1942, submitted by the White House to congress in January as totaling \$28,480,000,-000, has been raised to \$35,480,000,-000. 





Someone asked me the other day whether I'd rather serve under officers of World war days or under those of the New Army. In 1917 I reported officers' training camps and the schooling of selected service men; and by the time the scuffle in France was over I had been correspondent, enlisted man and lowwanking officer. Today I am doing what I did in 1917: Reporting the camps, talking with privates and generals and watching them at work.

Without pinning any medals on myself and without ego enlarging my head, my opinion therefore may be competent. If I were an enlisted man I'd much prefer to be under my present officers than the 1917 crop. I would be the last to run down my World war comrades and friends; I'll match their zeal and quality against their successors', but I find that the 1941 officer-whether second lieutenant or colonel-knows his job better.

Most 1917 officers had not the slightest experience in their new ranks. A young man fresh from civil life was accepted for an officers training camp, where he was expected to learn in three months the trade of a soldier and the duties of an officer. Then he received a lieutenant's commission, assignment to a regiment, and command of a platoon of some 50 men as green as he had been 90 days before. No less breath-taking was the colonel's advancement. From captain of a regular army company of 50-the same size as the new shavetail's platoon-he was jumped to command of a wartime regiment of 3500.


