Russia, Turkey Loom In Picture

WASHINGTON. — For many days a dapper little Russian Ambassador Constantine Oumansky has been complaining privately that he has not been able to get an audience with Mr. Hull, Secretary of State. "I see it is Sumner Welles," Oumansky said. "The Secretary of State has to discuss the matter personally."

ELKHART IS HERE TODAY

On account of heavy Panhandle rains, the Guymon motorcade, scheduled to arrive in Dalhart this afternoon at 2:55 to advertise the Ninth Annual Pioneer Day May 2, has been postponed till next Tuesday at the same hour, according to a telegram received by the chamber of commerce this morning.

However, as this is written just before noon there is no word from the Elkhart, Kan., delegation and supposition is it will be here soon. It is boosting the Elkhart Coronado Day celebration Sunday, sponsored by the Elkhart Lions club.

The Dalhart Lions have agreed to send the Dalhart High School-XIT band, directed by C. W. Beene, to the event. It will open at 2 p.m. with a parade. The Coronado pageant, to be given later in the evening, will have more than 100 characters. Dr. Francis H. Buckmaster is in general charge of arrangements.

Half Inch Rain Falls In City

Near noon today nearly a half inch of rain had fallen in Dalhart since last night. The U. S. field station registered .41 of an inch.

The Denver railroad reported showers south of Dalhart, also between here and Texline, 36 miles northwest.

The Rock Island reported scattered showers over the entire division.

Superintendent Virgil Dominick said .32 of an inch fell at the Canadian River Booster plant about two miles east of Dalhart.

General Motors Strike Looming

Detroit — General Motors officials said today that \$750,000,000 in defense orders will be seriously delayed if the CIO goes through with its threat to call a strike affecting 160,000 men in 61 plants. The strike is to support demands for a general wage hour hike, union shop and other contract agreements.

The CIO says it will not call out men working on defense orders, but General Motors officials say any strike will hamper defense production.

C.-C. MEET IS TONITE

A discussion of defense raw materials and facilities that the Dalhart territory can offer the Office of Production Management will highlight the meeting of chamber of commerce directors tonight at 7:30.

The meeting was originally scheduled for Friday night, but was moved up to tonight in order not to interfere with the XIT motorcade that will leave at 7 tomorrow morning for the second and last day of the annual Hansford county celebration in Spearman.

Directors tonight will advise with Secretary Rex Mahoney on preparation of a brief listing materials and facilities which Mahoney next Monday afternoon can present to a Panhandle-wide committee at Amarillo which in turn will prepare a Panhandle brief to present to the OPM and high Army and Navy officials in Washington.

Mahoney and Director Carl Hogg last Monday attended a Panhandle-wide meeting called at Amarillo by Col. E. A. Simpson, new president of the Amarillo chamber of commerce.

Russia and Turkey bulked increasingly larger in the international picture today as a result of Rumanian and Hungarian troops massing on the Russian border; and Bulgarian troops taking over the patrol of Grecian Thrace adjacent to Turkey.

An acute food shortage in at least some Balkan areas may be driving Hitler toward some demand on Russia. It is said that the food situation in Bucharest is becoming desperate and that increasing dissatisfaction is evidenced by mounting sabotage.

A vital oil pipeline was damaged and when sixty French prisoners were sent to repair it they added more damage.

Turkey has repeatedly said it would not stand for an Axis or Axis-dominated country patrolling Thrace, even if Greece herself gave the permission. Turkey's entry into the war could result from this latest Nazi action. Turkey is also agitated over growing German control in the Aegean, including reported occupation of Lemnos, an island dominating the western approach to the Dardanelles.

Germany is expected to make some demand on Turkey regarding the Dardanelles, Russian outlet to the world's oceans. Hitler may only ask, some quarters said, that the straits be closed to foreign warships—which of course would be British and Greek.

Berlin's last night reports that Nazi troops were pouring through storied Thermopylae pass were evidently a bit premature. Both Berlin and London said today that fighting is still going on in that sector. It seemed that Allied resistance to the Nazis has stiffened. This led some observers to believe that Britain may be having some luck evacuating British and Greek (Turn to Page 4, Column 3)

London Letter Begs For Aid For Babies

London, England
March, 1941

The Texan:

I write to you after months of air raids that leave us the only large maternity hospital in London (England). We face the coming months, supported by American generosity and touching messages of sympathy.

One of our Nurses' Homes was hit by high explosives and it has rained "incendiaries". Here, in historic "Queen Charlotte's of London", we know the courage of our poor mothers to be, their husbands absent, fighting for freedom's cause. They can only contribute life. . . . for life must go on.

We give each mother free care, and our steel helmetted nurses reach them under gunfire, driving cars with anti shrapnel roofs. Our Patron, Queen Elizabeth, has inspected our arrangements and Mr. & Mrs. William Churchill attended our entertainment. (Little Winston, their baby grandson, was attended at birth by Queen Charlotte's chief Surgeon.)

Bringing the new life into the world and aiding it until 5 years old, costs this unendowed hospital eighty dollars —our war charity funds cannot include this work.

I feel that some of your readers may be moved to send their generous checks to us here, preferably by the Clipper. I would be deeply grateful for group, club or family contributions to our care of one or more of these mothers and hope we may be enabled to name a Cot (500 dollars) for your City in our American Ward.

XIT Motorcade To Spearman Fete

You're going with the XIT motorcade to Spearman tomorrow. You're going separate from the motorcade—be sure to wear XIT regalia and get a special hatband at the chamber of commerce office any time this afternoon up to 6 o'clock.

Hatbands are entirely free. Motorcade will leave at 7 tomorrow morning from the Dalhart high school band hut. Rains, if they continue, will be no handicap, because there is pavement all the way to Spearman by

way of Dumas and Stinnett. And this route is not a great deal longer than the most direct one via Dumas, Sunray and Morse.

The Second Annual Hansford County celebration got under way today, but tomorrow will furnish most of the fireworks. They will include an amateur rodeo, street parade, featuring 15 Panhandle bands and numerous unique and beautiful floats. Later there will be a band festival.

The Power Farming Equipment show, which jumped into immediate popularity last year, is again being presented. John Snider, Amarillo barbecue king, will spread a feed tomorrow noon.

A highlight of festivities both tonight and tomorrow night will be dances, including both new and old-time steps.

The Dalhart motorcade probably will form a section in the parade, and will be led by the now widely-known XIT flag display. Three mounted riders participate. The center one carries Old Glory. The others flank him with the Texas and XIT flags.

any other recent development in Washington, is a tell-tale indication of the seriousness with which cabinet members view the desperate plight of the British and the very dangerous situation of the United States.

Real fact is that many military strategists doubt whether the British can hold out until September.

They consider the British situation far worse than last June, when France fell. Then there still remained a few European nations which might stand against Hitler. But today the map of Europe resembles that of 1804, when Napoleon had swallowed the entire continent except Portugal, Spain, Switzerland, Sweden and Turkey. Those same five countries are the only ones standing today.

Napoleon at that time was working with Russia. It was not until 1811 that he turned against Russia, and the tide later turned against him. Remembering that, perhaps, Cordell Hull has been wooing Russia, the country he hates, but the only strong ally to whom the democracies now can turn.

ROOSEVELT THE POLITICIAN

Inside the cabinet, Secretary Hull is not the only man worried about the war situation. Even more worried, at least more articulate, are Republican Cabinet members Stimson and Knox, Democrat Morgenthau, and ex-Republican Ickes. In some degree, furthermore, the entire cabinet shares this worry.

Some are greatly concerned at the President's inactivity. Though faced with a desperate catastrophe, they feel that he has been waiting for public opinion to catch up to him.

Roosevelt always has prided himself on keeping his ear tuned to political ground-swells, being able to feel the public pulse. He knows when it is dangerous to get too far ahead of public sentiment, and when he is in step with it.

But today, some White House advisers believe Roosevelt is applying too much smart politics to gauging public opinion, instead of getting out in front and forming public opinion himself.

BRITISH REVERSES

Specifically, here are some of the things they think the public should know:

1. That London has been as badly battered by recent air raids as Coventry; that the city is such a shambles that even the British, though as they are, heroic as they are, are beginning to wonder how long they can hold out without help.

2. That British airplane production, because of the raids, has fallen far below that of last autumn—probably under 1000 planes a month. Hitler is reported producing 5000 a month.)

3. That Britain has been so hard up for modern mechanized equipment that she could not fulfill her promise of tanks and aircraft to Turkey. This was why Turkey did not carry out her pledge to aid Yugoslavia.

That Turkey's new pact with Germany will reveal secret clauses permitting the Nazis to use vital Turkish railroads to get troops to Syria—a long step toward the Suez canal.

5. That the French in North Africa show signs of cooperating with Hitler in carrying supplies across the Mediterranean, thereby aiding Axis attacks on the British. In fact, Nazi munitions for the desert campaign already are reported

to have come via French Tunis (only 90 miles from Sicily).

6. That in addition to the attack on Suez, renewed efforts at invading England seem to be in the making.

These are some of the desperately discouraging reports that have been placed before the President—reports that make his cabinet members believe the conveying of merchant ships across the North Atlantic by the U. S. Navy is necessary immediately, or it may be too late.

They are equally convinced—and so is the President—that the first defense of the United States continues to be the British fleet; that once the British fleet falls, the United States plus the Monroe Doctrine would be open to simultaneous attack on two oceans with only a one-ocean navy to defend it.

MERRY-GO-ROUND

In addition to making a bare-knuckle reply in Collier's to Colonel Lindbergh's recent "Letter to Americans", which urges an appeasement policy toward the Axis, Wendell Wilkie also will take the stump in the Midwest against other isolationist leaders. He will use Rushville, Ind., his campaign headquarters, as base of operations. . . President Roosevelt has just completed his own landscape design for the new Naval Hospital, outside Washington. He worked on it with a large wooden drawing-board, like a professional draughtsman, concentrating especially on a pattern of roads connecting the hospital's twelve buildings. All had to be accessible, yet the grounds could not be cut by too many roads. . . Popular source of hand-wrought iron ware for Washington antique lovers in Collins' Forge, in Farmington, Conn., operated by Laurence Collins, college graduate and former newspaperman. . . Just before sailing for South America, Douglas Fairbanks got some straightforward advice from Alzira Vargas de Amaral Peixoto, daughter of the President of Brazil.

MAIL BAG

We have had more mail from readers on the question of strikes in defense industries than on any question in several years. Almost without exception, our readers have recommended legislation to outlaw strikes, many want to know the opinion of government officials.

One answer to this question comes from an official of the OPM, himself a leading industrialist, William L. Batt, president of SKF Industries, who says:

"Where there is delay but to strikes, I doubt if the solution can be found through legislation. We have pretty well proven that law can't compel a man and woman to live happily together; law didn't take the liquor problem off our shoulders; law hasn't stopped murder; law won't stop strikes. Even in England, where they are at war, there were over 900 strikes in 1940. It is interesting to see that most of the leaders in industry who have spoken on the subject agree that end is not realistic."

MILLIONAIRE BUYER

The New Deal has brought a lot of professors to Washington, but not many millionaires. Will Clayton belongs to that smaller company.

His office is on the top floor of the Lafayette Building. Jesse Jones put him there with a title, "Deputy Federal Loan Administrator", but forgot to give him a salary. Will Clayton didn't say anything, so he works for nothing—not even a dollar a year.

At the beginning, he tried to spend the \$500,000,000 that Congress handed the Export-Import Bank last year. But Latin America wouldn't take it. Will Clayton says we did such a whopping business with Latin America last year that they don't need credits any more. So now he's buying rubber and other strategic materials.

Clayton comes from Houston, where he owns about as much property as Jesse Jones, which is saying a good deal. He's tall, lithe and

soldiers to North Africa.

They admit there is a possibility of General Sir Archibald Wavell, chief of the Middle East command, getting more Greek and British soldiers out of Greece than the total of British soldiers he brought in.

If he can do that, the Germans will really have been the losers in the Greek campaign. They have assertedly lost from 50,000 to 80,000 dead and a quarter million wounded. Rumania hospitals are gorged.

However, the new British line will have to hold fast for several days to permit evacuation and German pressure is terrific and may be increasing. Observers pointed out that the Dunkirk evacuation took nine days to save 335,000 French and British soldiers and approximately one thousand craft of all descriptions took part.

There probably isn't nearly that many craft available at Greece, but at Dunkirk all embarkation had to be along a ten-mile strip of shore. In Greece there are many good embarkation points. However, at Dunkirk the RAF finally established almost complete control of the air, while in Greece the Nazi flyers do not have a lot of opposition and they are relentlessly pounding roads and ports in an effort to forestall evacuation.

British have one more advantage in Greece. German troops so far are being held at a greater distance than at Dunkirk.

British East Africa forces today punctured the outer defenses of the most recent Fascist stand and were pursuing the Italians toward their main fortifications.

Germans last night pounded Plymouth and Southwest British coast for the third successive night. However, two daylight Nazi raiders were shot down this morning. A British sub sank a 10,000 ton German oil tanker; and the RAF last night claimed a direct hit on one of the two surface raiding Nazi battleships at Brest. The other, they said, has been damaged. Havre was also blasted and a vital power station inside Germany received a direct hit.

Prime Minister Churchill of England, indirectly answering Australian criticism of the Greek campaign, told Commons today that critics should not lose their sense have been a devastating toll of life is closed.

Churchill admitted that the British Expeditionary Force in Greece was too small to handle the massed German hordes, and that it had inadequate air support which forced it to fall back steadily through the Greek mountains. But, he said, they have taken a devastating toll of Germans.

The Vichy government still refuses to bow to German demands, threats and cajoling so today the Nazis withdrew their demands for reinstatement of Pierre Laval as vice-premier and foreign minister and will be satisfied if he is named the Vichy representative to the Nazi-government of Paris.

Albert and Bogart's kid sister fall in love. Bogart is furious, but he can't break it up by ordinary means so he resolves to send Albert in the cage of a killer lion.

Does he? Well, you know Bogart. It's a smash climax.

However, Bob and Bing and Dottie all finally start through the jungle. While Dottie is swimming, a leopard tears up her sarong and she improvises a fern leaf costume.

Cannibals finally capture them and to prove that they are white gods, the chief is going to put Bob in a cage with a gorilla and see if he can conquer the brute.

How they handle that problem is just one of the many screamingly funny situations in the show.

The picture also introduces five new hit tunes, "It's Always You," "Birds of a Feather," "You're Dangerous," "You Lucky People You" and "African Etude."

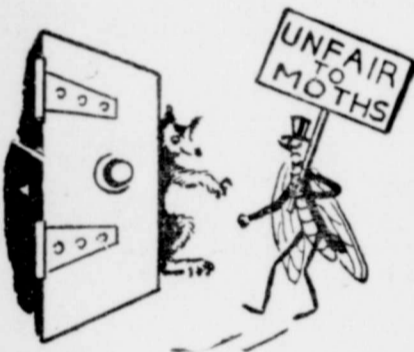

**IN THE ARMY NOW!
WHY AND HOW**
By S. T. Williamson

With nearly one-third as many men in the Army today as served during the World war, where, ask veterans of the A.E.F., are the uniformed welfare workers? Where are the Y-men and the K. of C. men who wore such nicely tailored serge uniforms that recruits saluted them as officers? Where are the Y. W. girls, the canteen workers and entertainers who wore those trim grey blue jackets and skirts? Where are the Salvation Army lasses and their famous doughnut buckets?

You'll find these organizations at work, not in the camps but in neighboring civilian areas, not in uniform but even as you and I. Welfare and recreational work among the troops in this defense emergency is under Army auspices and not, as in the last scuffle, under civilian agencies. The welfare groups willingly relinquish claims to take over activities in the camps; for their jobs are cut out for them in communities surrounding the army posts.

It's the Army which provides the libraries, staffs and runs the service clubs, operates the camp movie theaters and puts on or stage-manages the theatrical shows. It's the Army which holds athletic contests and recruits athletic instructors and referees from its own commissioned personnel. Today camp morale and recreation is as much the responsibility of a camp commander as a field maneuver and is as thoroughly planned. Each division has its Morale Officer who is the camp entertainment impressario. Each regiment has its recreation officer. This recreation business has become a new wrinkle in soldering.

What's new in the mail?
C. P., Chicago, Ill.: May a theatre or restaurant refuse to admit soldiers in uniform?

Most state laws forbid discrimination by hotels, theatres and eating places against any man in the uniform of the U. S. armed services. In the District of Columbia the penalty is a \$500 fine.

J. H., Boca Raton, Fla.: What is a "jeep?"

He is a selected service man during his first four months of Army life. Experience, minimum; bewilderment, maximum; routine, novel; pay, \$21 a month. At the end of four months training at the replacement center he is assigned to a regiment, he is still a recruit but no longer a jeep.

M. O. Y., Utica, N. Y.: Does the Army still give extra pay for men who make high scores on the rifle range?

No. That practice is now abandoned.

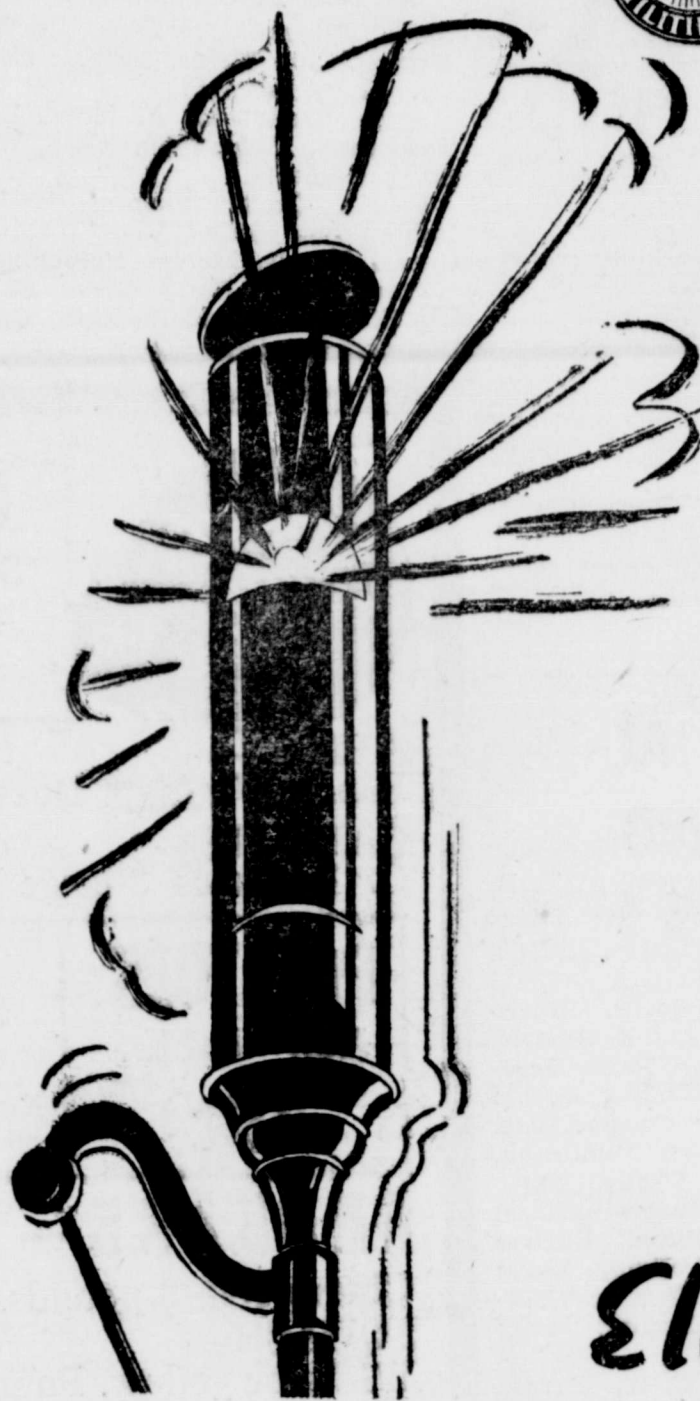
"But," he said, "we haven't been working that way. Each town and community has sent in its own brief and it hasn't been impressive enough. We've got to work together."

Accordingly a Panhandle-wide committee was named, including a representative from Guymon, in the Oklahoma Panhandle, to prepare a Panhandle brief. Each committee member was to prepare a brief of his own territory.

"Defense authorities think we don't have enough water down here to take a bath," said Col. Simpson. Recognized water authorities exploded that myth last Monday.

They also claim, Simpson continued, that defense industries cannot be located in the Panhandle area because of lack of raw materials. "They do not tell us," he added, "what specific raw materials they want, so the thing for us to do is present them with a full catalogue of what we can offer."

He pointed out that natural gas and all petroleum products are abundant, cheap and immediately available. Potash, he said, is in adjacent New Mexico areas; and zinc is now being refined at big smelters near Dumas in the Moore county oil field.
