will not, however, clean up property, unless the owner pays them, and they will not haul trash from private property unless paid.

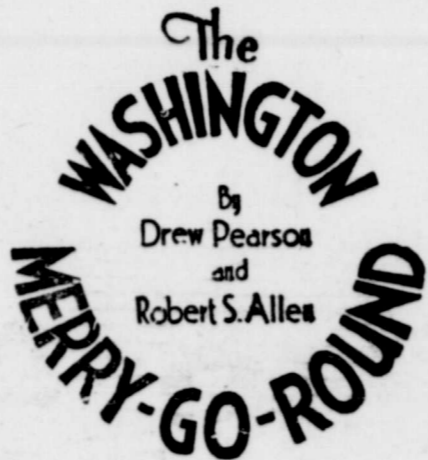
The Lions and the City made it clear that private owners are to clean up their own property and make arrangements to dispose of their own trash. They will not be permitted to dump it in the alley.

DAM GETS NEW FLOW

Water early this afternoon was pouring into Rita Blanca lake, two and a half miles southeast of Dalhart, from rains that fell northwest about mid-morning.

Water was crossing U. S. 54, at the extreme west end of the lake, in a stream 15 to 30 feet wide and a foot deep at 2 p. m., Bill Wadkins of the SCS reported.

A creek that runs into Rita Blanca draw in the Ware area, 15 miles northwest of Dalhart, was running four feet of water this morning, according to W. A. Blackwell, section foreman who this morning patrolled the Denver tracks from Dalhart to Texline, 36 miles northwest.

He said the rain seemed to be particularly heavy in the Ware and Perico areas, both of which are on the Rita Blanca watershed.

The fall in Dalhart this morning was .53 of an inch, the U. S. field station reported. The Canadian River Gas Co. booster station, two miles east of Dalhart, registered .61 of an inch from 4:00 yesterday afternoon to 1:30 this afternoon.

The federal government today pressed forward with plans for a two million ton shipping pool to aid Britain.

A meeting was called this afternoon to get 50 oil tankers for British use.

President Roosevelt called for \$20,000,000 for an Inter-American highway from the U. S. to the Panama canal. Army and Navy chiefs say it will be helpful in hemispherical defense, Secretary of State Hull reported.

Senator Joe Guffey of Pennsylvania, a New Deal supporter, called today for immediate U. S. convoys to Britain because of the "real peril" that now faces this nation.

Britain reported today that it had evacuated 48,000 of the 60,000 men it took to Greece, and also had evacuated some Greek soldiers who will now fight with the British in Africa. London claims German casualties were 125,000 to 150,000.

Germans today cracked the outer defenses of Britain-held Tobruk in Libya by an assault with planes, tanks and infantrymen. Plight of the defenders may be getting desperate, according to some observers, but England maintains they can be evacuated by sea if that becomes necessary.

The Axis columns apparently are afraid to push much farther into Egypt while Tobruk remains a constant menace to their flanks.

The German air force also blasted at Malta and the British base on Crete.

British prepared to meet an expected giant Nazi pincher campaign against the Suez canal. One arm of the pincher would be the Axis column now thrusting past Tobruk into Egypt. The other would be stretched out from bases in Greece via the Italian-held Dodecanese Islands to French Syria where Nazis have already succeeded in stirring up considerable discontent.

Observers are convinced that France cannot resist any Nazi demands on Syria which is also the key to Turkey's back door, to Palestine and the rich oil fields of Iraq.

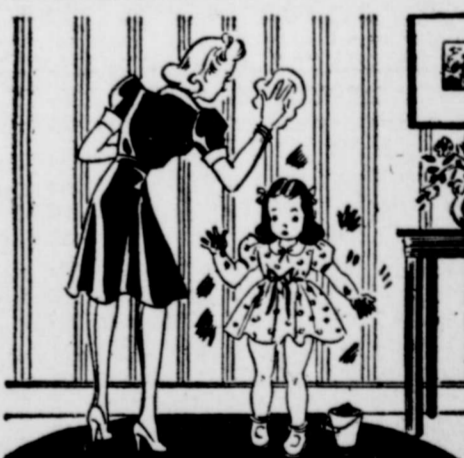

usually lying in nests of three or four, awaiting signals.

When the submarines attack, one usually acts as a decoy and draws the British warships off to one side, other Nazi subs drive in for the kill. That, plus the fact that 20 or 30 merchant vessels now travel in a convoy train, is one reason why ship casualties have been so heavy.

From their vantage point above the water, airplanes can look down upon submarines lurking below the surface, and if the weather is clear, can spot them miles away. The Navy has some airplanes especially equipped for this type of patrol work, carrying eight depth bombs each.

Some planes also carry a new submarine detector which can pick up the sound waves from undersea motors. A few of these planes, sold to the British, were used in the Mediterranean and partly explain why the British Navy suffered so little damage from submarines in that area.

The Navy and Coast Guard plan to use this aerial technique in the western Atlantic leaving the eastern Atlantic to British patrol. Patrolling the eastern Atlantic from the air is not difficult for the British, since they can base their planes on land, in fact have been operating such patrols for some time.

Big question of course is: "How far out at sea will American planes and ships patrol?" Judging by the hints President Roosevelt dropped last week, the 1,000-mile limit will be subject to considerable stretching.

POWER FROM URANIUM

The most closely guarded defense secret in the country today is the scientific work in progress on U 235, a uranium isotope, which if successfully produced in sufficient quantity will revolutionize world sources of power.

This fabulous substance, discovered two years ago, is produced by subjecting metal uranium to a process of atom-smashing. One pound of it, combined with ordinary water, would release energy enough to take the place of millions of gallons of oil or millions of tons of coal. So far, however, it has been isolated only in minute quantities.

Laboratory research on a method of producing U 235 in amounts large enough for practical use is going on 24 hours a day behind locked doors at Columbia University and the University of California, which are equipped with atom-smashing cyclotrons. In rushing their secret experiments, U. S. scientists know they are in a race with the Nazis.

German researchers also are working day and night to produce the same magic element. In fact, military experts are convinced that one motive for Hitler's seizure of Denmark last year was the experiments being carried on by Dr. Neils Bohr, Nobel Prize winner of the University of Copenhagen. He did the original work on U 235.

In this fateful race, the United States and Canada fortunately have an abundance of raw material. They possess almost inexhaustible quantities of uranium bearing ores, such as pitchblende. The Great Lakes region of Alberta abounds in pitchblende, while large deposits are also found in Utah and Colorado.

However, Hitler's occupation of Czechoslovakia provided him with an abundant supply, too. It was pitchblende ore from Bohemia that was used by the Curies in their research leading to the discovery of radium.

PARADOXICAL BRITISH

Paradox in the new North Atlantic patrol belt is that the British will benefit from something they once protested so vigorously—stretching the three-mile limit for Prohibition enforcement.

It was just eleven short years

ago that the Coast Guard—which now will hunt Nazi submarines 1000 miles at sea—shot down and sank the Canadian rum-runner "I'm Alone" 250 miles off the Louisiana coast in the Gulf of Mexico.

Immediately a terrific howl went up from British. The Canadian Government protested, exchanged a long series of notes with the State Department, and in the end the sinking of the vessel was submitted to international arbitration. Supreme Court Justice Van Devanter was the arbiter for the United States, and joined with the Canadian jurist in finding that the Coast Guard had exceeded its authority in chasing the "I'm Alone" beyond one hour's cruising distance from shore.

So Canada got a monetary award, and the ship's captain got damages, despite the fact that the "I'm Alone" was found to have been owned by American, not Canadian, bootleggers.

Better Check Up Security Account

The Amarillo Social Security Board field office has on hand a supply of post cards, already addressed to the Social Security Board, bearing a printed request on the opposite side with space provided for the sender's signature, his social security account number, and post office address. This card, when signed and mailed, will bring to the individual signing the card a statement of all wages credited to his old age and survivors insurance account. Dewey Reed, manager, said today.

"Every worker should be interested in knowing the status of his old age and survivors insurance account since the amount of his insurance benefits are based on wages credited to his account. To obtain a statement as to his wage credits, a wage earner must only secure one of these post cards, fill in the blanks as indicated, attach a one-cent stamp, and place it in a mail box. Within the time necessary for the card to go to Baltimore and come back to his mailing address, he will be in possession of the information requested."

Reed explained the importance of securing wage statements in cases where workers have been or expect to be inducted into the military service and persons change from covered to non-covered employment. "It's just like a savings account," he said, "and anyone possessing a savings account wants to know how much he has put away for a rainy day."

The Amarillo Social Security Board office will be glad to furnish these cards to individuals or employee groups in such quantities as desired, upon request by mail or in person.

Voice of the People

Dear Ed Aches:

You have always had a word of encouragement whenever I wrote you about juvenile crime, and I am deeply grateful for giving me space in your column.

We are happy that the fine picture, "Men of Boys Town" will be shown here at such an early date. Everybody should see it. It is the complete answer to the reform school angle of the subject. It reminds me of Warden Lawes' classic, "If you want to make a bad boy worse, send him to the reform school."

To me Crime Prevention is the most important problem in America today, even greater than world peace. The sad part about it is we still pay a 15 billion dollar crime bill every year and fail to reduce crime. Why do we fail? We shall continue to fail and must fail until we work the problem from a crime prevention standpoint. We shall never solve the problem working at it backwards.

There is so much to be said on this subject and so many wonderful articles are being written on it. A fine series has been running in the Rotary magazine—especially interesting are the experiences of the judge of the juvenile court of a city over 300,000 who has never sent a child to the reform school, but has found in every case some adult more guilty than the child. This judge gives the adults the works and shows mercy every time to the misguided child. Every child is given medical aid, financial aid, and in every case, put on the right track. He claims the child has this right as a citizen of this country and society has a duty to perform regarding this misguided youngster.

When I wrote Father Flanagan some time ago about the real cause of our juvenile problem in Dalhart, that of buying stolen goods from children, he gave me this answer: Texas has a fine law covering this, but it is not always enforced. The law reads—Any person found guilty of contributing to the delinquency of minors are liable to a fine of \$500 or imprisonment for one year. Too often our juvenile courts are but a joke. . . They should get after the real trouble makers.

There is a great deal more to be said, and if you want me to write again, let me know. Somehow I can't stand the pitiful cries of young children crucified on the cruel crosses that are made in the junk yards. Can you? A young man going to the electric chair the other night told his audience, "You came here to see me put to death, but the state should put to death the man who started me on the road to crime when I was a lad of 7." Wasn't he right?

People tell me, "Men of Boys Town" made them cry and cry, but why, instead of crying, don't people do something about crime prevention? Hitler has always said, "America will be easy. She is weak. Look at her crime bill. It is just equal to my war budget." Will America always be weak? Will America always produce criminals by the millions.

Will America always lead the world in crime production? Will crime break America financially and morally? Will Hitler take America?

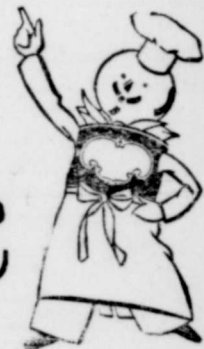

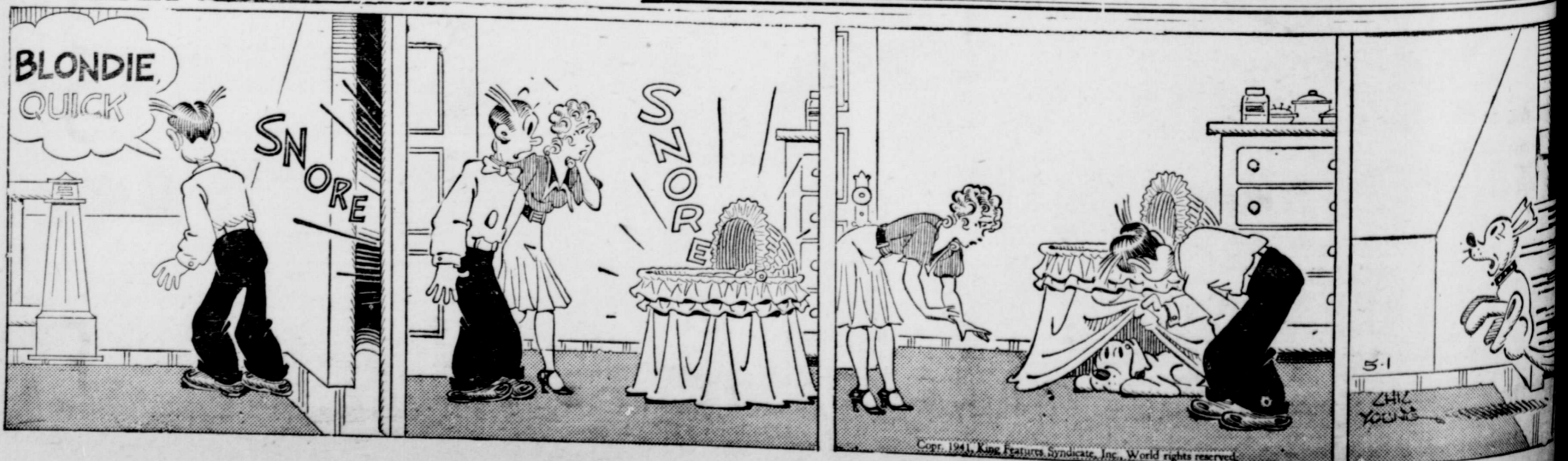

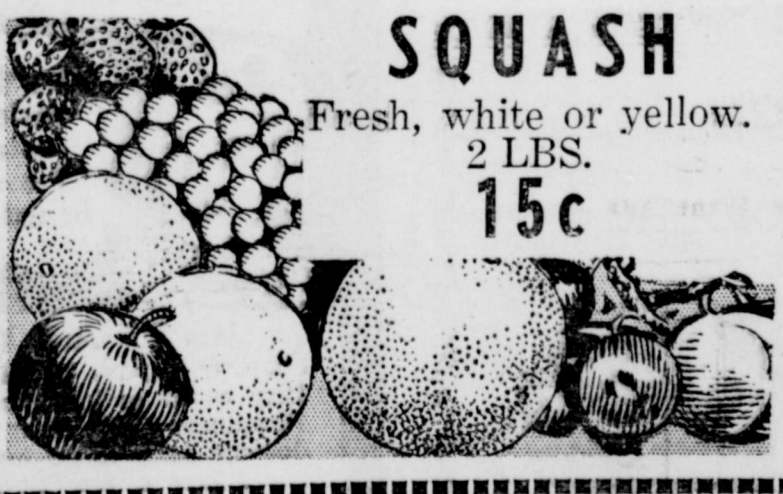

General Picture Is Bright, Says Babson

By ROGER BABSON

Babson Park, Mass., May 1. You can't judge the nation by statistics only. Feelings are as potent as figures. Hence, I spend a great deal of time traveling throughout the country, talking with people in all walks of life. I travel in day coaches as well as in Pullmans and airplanes. I talk with small-town officials and bankers as well as those of large cities. Here is what I now learn from them:

Defense and Cost of Living

Without question, aside from the effects of certain strikes in manufacturing centers, the program of production for defense purposes is reaching present capacity limits. The construction of new production facilities, however, will enable the volume of business to expand enormously in months to come. Business activity as a whole already exceeds that of 1929 by some 8 per cent and the rise is by no means reaching a limit. Mayors and other municipal officials in many cities outside the normal defense areas are renewing their efforts to attract labor-supplying industries in an attempt to reduce relief loads. This is a commendable effort and should receive encouragement and help from Washington.

The greatly increased business activity in most sections of the country has raised commercial loans 25 per cent, carloadings 30 per cent, and pushed up weekly payrolls. In spite of this, and some jacking up of rentals, food, and clothing prices, the cost of living is up a bare 2 per cent over last year. My readers need not yet be concerned over rising prices. The administration is watching the picture closely and will do everything possible to keep living costs down. Labor leaders as yet cannot give "increased living costs" as an honest excuse for wage raises.

Individual Spending

The winter resort business in Florida was off some 15 per cent this year, while California suffered as a result of consistent rains. Many men accustomed to a month or two off during the winter were this year chained to their desks in defense work. The Southwest resort areas—notably in Arizona—had the best winter for many years. The same rains which hurt California brought out the desert flowers, tempered the climate, and kept down the dust. What is "one man's poison is another man's meat!" The resort areas of the Northwest, Colorado, New England, and New York may benefit greatly from an active tourist season this coming summer. This should also be true of Canadian resorts.

Thus far, people are spending

freely. This is especially true of workers. Many have a steady job for the first time in years. The rich are spending because they believe their wealth may be confiscated; while the poorer always spend all they get. We of the middle class think we need so many necessities, plus the luxuries of a new car, radio, etc., that we are putting out cash faster than we are taking it in. This is witnessed by mounting instalment sales. Little thought is being given by anyone, anywhere, to the coming "rainy day."

General Impressions

The unemployment situation has markedly improved throughout the Midwest, but relief loads there are still relatively high. This is in contrast to most other sections of the country. Emotionally, the population of our East and West coasts seems geared to a notch or two higher than that of the great middle agricultural areas. Farmers are still more concerned about the weather, crop possibilities, and farm aid than they are about Aid to Britain or World War II. Pig-headedness and poor marketing conditions, with which I sympathize, still prevent them from making a decent living.

Bankers and businessmen feel much the same the country over. They are heartily in favor of our preparedness program. Though they know that it will penalize their business, bankers are in favor of raising real inflation more than anything else. This is in spite of the fact that they contract to only take in and pay out "dollars," regardless of what the dollar is worth.

Retail sales are well ahead of last year in the larger cities and defense spending is filtering into the rural areas where the outlook for sales is bright. Cotton and woolen mills in the South and in New England are booked to capacity for months ahead. Shipyard construction, shipbuilding, and, of course, aircraft production, particularly in the West Coast area, are booming. Automobile output is again being handicapped with labor troubles. Federal housing and cantonment construction continue, particularly in the South.

In the industrial areas, steel production has passed its theoretical capacity, while the opening of the Great Lakes to spring traffic is stimulating activity in the inland ports. Petroleum and its products are entering a better period of prices and consumption. Livestock, including cattle and sheep, are enjoying high prices and owners are optimistic over the outlook. In fact, most Westerners and many East-

Conclusion

The picture I see from my own studios and trips and from the reports of my associates is one of very general prosperity. True, many cases of hardship remain with us and many individuals are not alive to changing economic and social conditions. My mail daily contains letters from men who still are very bitter toward Washington and the Stock Exchange crowd. However, in this great land, opportunities still exist. One has only to recognize the turn of the tide and to swim with it.

**IN THE ARMY NOW!
WHY AND HOW**
By S. T. Williamson

The Sam Browne belt is merely two leather straps, a broad one around the waist hitched to a narrow one passing over the left shoulder, but it is very distinctive. Only commissioned officers wear it in the Army. Elsewhere it is worn by elevator starters, policemen, soda jerkers, 3-year-old infants in playsuits, and by the boys down at the filling station.

Who was Sam Browne? The question strikes a glint of recognition in the fact of many a wearer of his belt. "Why-er," runs the usual answer, "he was an American officer who fought in Texas"—meaning perhaps Sam Houston, who did mighty things in Texas, or Jim Bowie, the Alamo hero who devised a long-bladed knife handy for carving either beef or enemies.

General Sir Sam Browne was a grizzled, bullet-headed British officer in the Indian Army. During the great mutiny of 1857-8, his left arm was sliced off by a rebellious Sepoy; and thus dismembered, Sir Sam couldn't handle his sword scabbard while on parade. Sheathed swords of those days dragged the ground, and unless they were held firmly but haughtily in the left hand, the scabbard got between one's legs and one went up-side-daisy in unsoldierly attitudes. Accordingly, Sir Sam designed a belt which held a sword scabbard securely at the hip.

Just as useful a sword-tamer for the two-armed as for the maimed, the Sam Browne belt, without any royalty to its owner, soon became regulation field service wear in the British Army. During the World War it was adopted and brought back by the AEF. And now, a belt which helped a one-armed officer carry his sword is regulation in the American Army, which has no one-armed officers and no longer carries sabres.

We have in the mail—
T. R., Tulsa, Okla.: A friend of mine got orders from his local board to report for induction into the Army within five days and he had to rush off with only part of his affairs put in shape. Most employers are required to give a week and sometimes two weeks' notice before they lay off. Why doesn't the government allow at least an equal amount of notice to be given?

It should and now it does. Recent changes in selective service regulations authorize ten days' notice. And if ten days are not enough local boards are authorized to increase the time limit to sixty days or more when they deem the circumstances justify.

Philadelphia (UP) — Dewey, the sulphur-crested cockatoo that weathered the Battle of Manila aboard George E. Dewey's flagship Olympia, is dead at 47. The bird died at the Philadelphia zoo, where it had lived since 1928.

Baker also urged farmers to put out poison maize just before planting time to eradicate the thousands of sand rats and ground squirrels that are a menace to row crops.

Reporting on an analysis of 37,132 physical examination blanks, Lt. Col. J. W. E. H. Beck, chief of the medical division, said that 70 per cent were qualified for full

military service, 12.72 per cent for limited service, and 17.28 per cent were classified as unfit for any military service.

Principal causes for rejection are eye defects, defective teeth, hernia, cardiovascular disease, tuberculosis, diseases of the nervous system and syphilis.

Texas' local boards have been requested to urge disqualified registrants to consult physicians and dentists at once.

"More attention must be paid to the prevention and cure of disease. It is hoped that improvement in the health of these young men of military age will tend also to better general health," Col. Beck said.

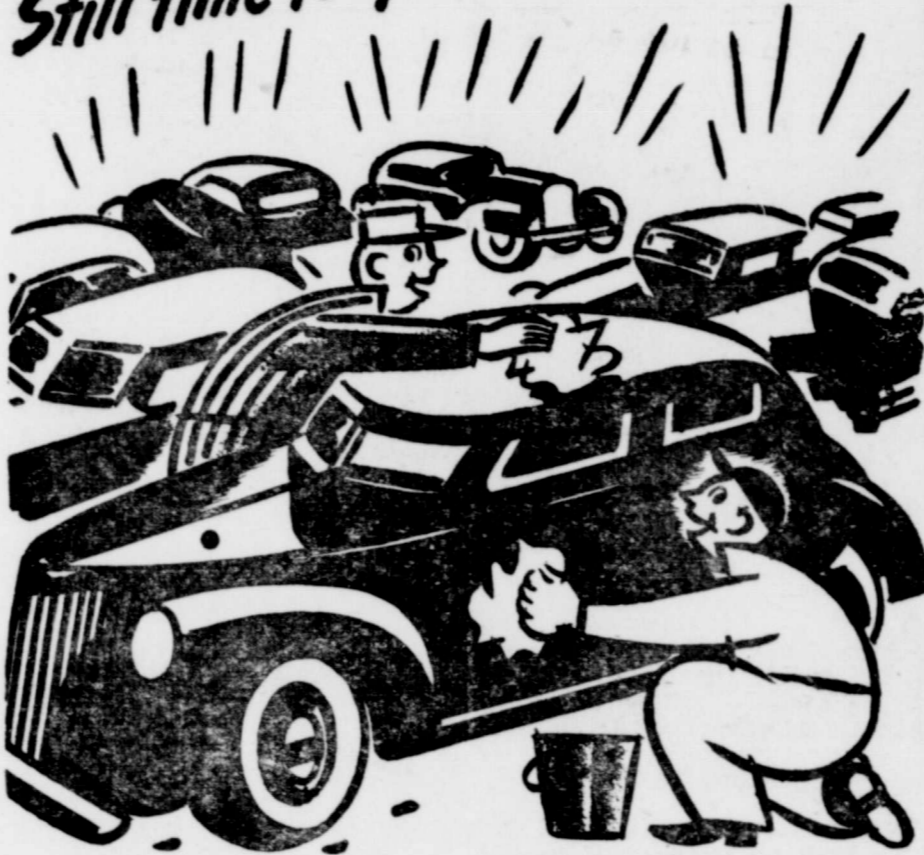
