Meantime, Germany continues to concentrate a military force near the Russian Ukraine, which may have a two fold purpose: 1, to force Russia to give the Reich badly needed oil and wheat concessions; uninformed, Johnson said, proving if she will now agree to a peace, Germany will turn its attention to the Soviet. Observers last night said Hitler is already waging a war of nerves on Moscow.

British and Free French at noon continued their slow but steady advance in the British program to take over Syria, and thus keep the Germans from using it as a springboard for an attack on Suez.
