## Japs Prepare Drive On Russians

Russia, already sorely pressed by Germans, Rumanians, Finns, and small forces of Spaniards and Italians on its 2000-mile Western front, may soon be in trouble with Japan on its Siberian front.

The en masse resignation of the Japanese cabinet yesterday apparently was forced by Japan's military clique which today is in the saddle.

It was announced from Tokyo today that Japan is mobilizing its entire military strength. Observers said this means another million men will be put under arms at once, in addition to the million already mobilized as a result of the war with China.

Prince Konoye, prime minister, is reported forming a new cabinet which assertedly may wield a sort of semi-dictatorship over the Japanese armed forces.

Japan assertedly will strike at Russia in Siberia as soon as it acquires desired French bases in French Indo-China. Presumably Tokyo will try to get these by ultimatum, but will resort to aggression if necessary.

Many competent observers feel that if Japan hazards a stab into Indo-China it will be committed to a program that will include attempts to take over the Dutch East Indies and probably the Philippines.

In that connection, the U. S. Senate today heard suggestions that the U. S., if necessary, segregate the estimated 35,000 Japanese in Hawaii if requisite to prevent sabotage of the U. S. Pearl Harbor base.

There was some talk of deporting the Japs, but most senators apparently felt such a drastic move unnecessary at this time.

It was clear that Japan today was maneuvering to prevent getting hurt from a U. S. order freezing its funds which it evidently expects.

Secretary of the Treasury Morgenthau today bluntly warned congress and the nation that non-defense manufacturing must be sharply curtailed now if the defense program is to move on schedule.

He pointed to the automobile industry as a glaring example. It is still pushing production of vehicles for civilian use. More and more of its facilities, he said, should be shifted to defense production.

General George Marshall, U. S. Army chief of staff, again warned congress today that the U. S. is not facing — it is already in — a grave emergency. In the public welfare, he said, all factors in this grave situation cannot be disclosed.

He did tell congress that if the U. S. Army is to be saved from demoralization a law must be passed by August 1 permitting selectees, reservists and national guardsmen to be held past their scheduled year of training.

### Delmer Pope And Wife Are Hurt In Crash Last Night

Delmer Pope, 25, manager of Pope's Shoe Shop in Dalhart, and his wife were hurt last night about 9:30 when their motorcycle was struck by a speeding car on U. S. Highway 87 five miles northwest of Dalhart.

Pope and his wife, riding double were just out for a spin. "I know I was driving about 30 miles an hour," Pope said, "because I was trying to get maximum performance out of the generator and was watching it and the speed closely.

"We were going northwest," he said, "when the car, apparently running at a tremendous speed, pulled up behind us. Another car was about to pass us from the other direction.

"We heard the brakes screaming on the car behind us. Then the back of our motorcycle was struck a glancing blow and the car slithered by us on the right. Some part of it struck my leg. The driver then jammed the car into second and sped away."

Pope said he and his wife and motorcycle were hurled along the highway 20 to 25 feet. Occupants of the southbound car heard the crash, came back and took the Pops to a doctor.

Pope's right leg is bruised, and may be broken or fractured below the knee. Mrs. Pope has severe bruises on both legs, her right hip and left elbow.

A fender skirt, maroon-colored, was torn from the hit-and-run car and was found near the motorcycle. The rear stand of the motorcycle was torn off and a fender bent.

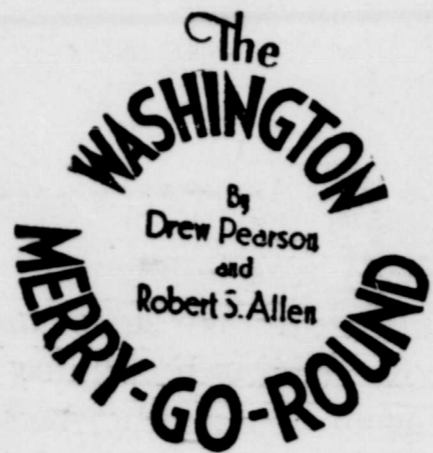

WASHINGTON. — The Administration had a hard time making up its mind to go into Iceland. Actually the Navy had orders four different times to prepare for the trip, and three times the orders were cancelled or held in abeyance.

It was last May that some of the Marines were embarked at Quantico. They sailed down the Potomac to Norfolk, then to Charleston, S. C., were kept in suspense regarding their destination until about two weeks ago.

As far as naval officers could ascertain, there was no particular reason for the frequent changes in plans except that the President was not quite sure of American public opinion. Naval officers flew several times to Iceland in advance of the landing, conferred with the British about all details of the occupation. The Navy was completely prepared.

There is no question that the President has made all the decisions regarding Iceland, even down to such details as whether newspapermen should be permitted to visit the island AFTER the landing of American troops.

The State Department approved the idea of American newsmen going to this new American outpost. So also did Secretary of the Navy Knox. Both felt that just as American newsmen were in France during the last war and reported on the actions of American troops, so newsmen had a right to keep the public informed about American troops in Iceland.

But apparently some of the Admirals did not agree with their chief, the Secretary of the Navy, and tipped off the White House. The President intervened personally and said that no newsmen could go to Iceland.

There he set the big ship down on its belly without damage to it or injury to his passengers.

by the Axis, keep their radios operating while in American ports or American waters. It is highly unlikely that they fail to note the presence of British vessels or U. S. transports loaded with American Marines.

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### CAPITAL CHAFF

Among other aids to Great Britain, you can look for the lease or lend of more submarines. About one-third of the original U. S. submarines sent to Britain exactly a year ago now have been sunk or put out of commission. Greece, Crete, and Atlantic warfare took the toll. . . . The Navy is sore at the State Department for not doing a little warming up to Russian commanders in Siberia. If Russia falls, it will be good to have an in with the Red Army in this neck of the woods opposite Alaska, but apparently we are letting the Japanese do the warming up. . . . Henry Morgenthau, who prides himself on running one of the most efficient Treasury Departments in history, has kept a customs official in Maryland who has not been out of bed for seven years. The Government pays him \$5000 annually.

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### U. S. RUSSIAN EXPERTS

The job of being Ambassador to Moscow is considered the toughest on the entire roster of U. S. diplomatic posts. The weather is either torrid or below freezing. Recreational facilities are almost nil. Food and sanitary conditions are nothing to rave about. And constant surveillance of the OGPU makes mingling with the Russian people impossible.

Therefore few American diplomats have relished being stationed in Russia.

However, the United States is lucky to have as its Ambassador to Russia Laurence Steinhardt, one of the best men to hold that post in years. No career diplomat, Steinhardt is a New York lawyer who got his job through pure politics. He was the nephew of the late Sam Untermyer, staunch political supporter of FDR.

Steinhardt first got a job as Minister to Sweden, then was promoted to an Ambassadorship to Peru, then got what most other diplomats did not want, the thankless but all-important job as Am-

In that job Steinhardt has been friendly but tough. He has stood his ground against Soviet diplomatic straight-arms, and has won their respect probably more than the friendlier attitude of British Ambassador Sir Stafford Cripps.

The United States is also lucky to have as the State Department's chief Russian expert Loy Henderson, a man who also thoroughly understands Russia. For years, the State Department's Russian expert was a man who had never been to Russia, hated all things Russian and was close to prominent churchmen who lobbied against the Soviets.

Henderson, on the other hand, has lived not only in Russia, but in the countries bordering Russia. Son of a Midwest preacher, he was born in Arkansas, raised in Kansas, and unlike many U. S. diplomats knows that there is a part of the United States west of the Mississippi River.

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### TEXAS POLITICS

Rear Admiral Ben Moreell, popular chief of the Navy's Bureau of Yards and Docks, was commiserating with young Representative Lyndon Johnson about his close, and questionable, defeat in the recent Texas senatorial election.

"You know, Lyndon," he said, "that campaign had one bright aspect for me. I got a celebration out of it. I am an abstemious man, but I just couldn't resist the temptation to celebrate that first night when you were leading by 5000 votes and the experts said you were in."

"But when O'Daniel was declared the winner, my wife gave me a terrific razzing. She claimed I was using you as an alibi to get out of the house."

ing and similar units are made up of as high as 85 per cent selectees. To move them out wholesale at the end of their scheduled year of service would throw the Army into hopeless confusion.

President Roosevelt has been urging action enabling the Army to hold the three classes of men so long as the public welfare demands. He has repeatedly said that congress would not be breaking faith by such action, because the international situation has changed drastically since the first selectees were inducted.

Marshall implied necessity of removing restrictions against use of selectees, reservists and guardsmen anywhere except in the Western hemisphere.

He emphasized the fact that the Army could not, because of this restriction, send even 24 pursuit planes to Iceland, which U. S. forces occupied a few days ago.

He said the nation might as well face the fact that it is threatened with one of the finest armed forces in the world—the German army. Its men, he said, were trained as boys in labor battalions. Then they were subjected to intense military training and made skilful in the use of the most modern weapons. Now they constitute an army of war-seasoned veterans.

He said congress should declare a national emergency which incidentally would automatically give the Army the right to hold selectees, reservists and guardsmen past their scheduled year.

Germans today claimed capture of Smolensk, vital Russian city, only 235 miles from Moscow. Advance German forces, it was said, probably are within 100 miles of the Kremlin.

Reds admitted Germans had arrived before Smolensk, but denied its fall.

Germans said their men and Rumanians had captured the Besarabian capital, 35 miles from the Rumanian border. They said German and Finnish forces continue driving toward Leningrad but definite locations were not given. Reds merely claimed heavy fighting along the northern front.

Reds claimed a counter attack on the central front had carried Germans along considerable line backward by 30 miles.

Reds said fighting along the Ukrainian front is still 125 miles west of Kiev. Germans said the spearhead that reached Kiev several days ago and moved around heavy Red defense bunkers, is now supported by reinforcements that have smashed the bunkers and all other defenses before the city.

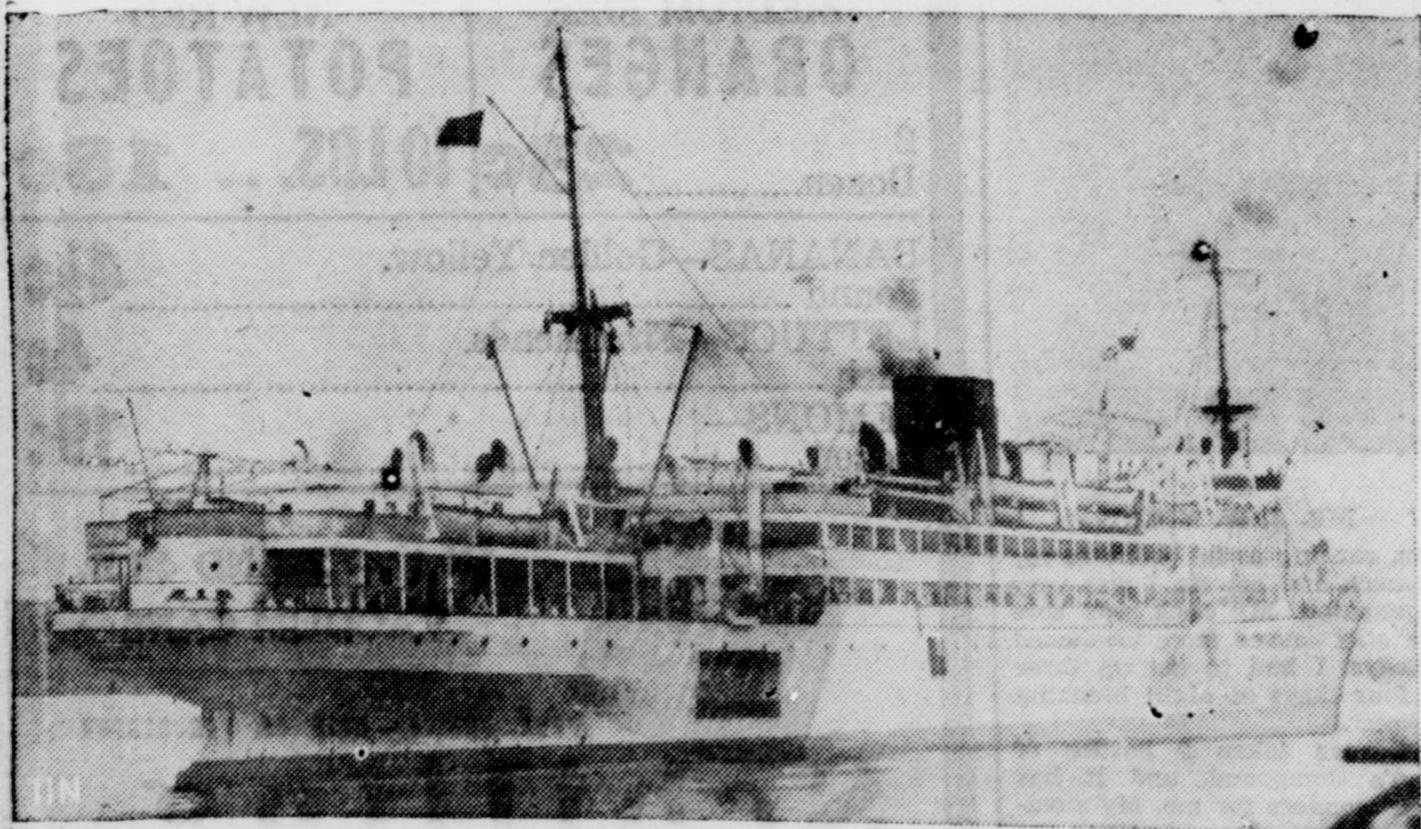

# Small Towns Coming Rapidly Into Picture

(By ROGER W. BABSON)

Babson Park, Mass., July 17.—Map-makers had better get busy laying out the new industrial picture of the U.S.A. and Canada. For generations, the tides of population and business enterprise have been flowing from farm to town and from middletown to metropolis. Some ten years ago, this swing hit its peak. The tide turned in favor of the small town. Now comes the wartime era, giving seven-league boots to the development of localities of from 5000 to 20,000 population. It is a modern wave of migration. As our ancestors went forth to reclaim the wilderness, the pioneers of today will seek new homes and fortunes in small towns with big futures.

### Frontiers of '41

This rejuvenation of the little old-fashioned city has been sharply speeded by the necessities of defense. Against the threat of the bombing plane, only a partial answer is provided by camouflage, air-raid shelters, anti-aircraft batteries, or even a vast air force of our own. We need overwhelming air superiority, but our other basic defense against aggression is to decentralize our vital industries, spreading them in relatively small units throughout the entire country. In this way, the vast expanse of this continent becomes a military asset instead of a military liability.

Development of our smaller cities provides defense, not only against human invaders, but against the powers of depression, unemployment, calamity, and epidemic. Nations, as well as individuals, can safeguard themselves by diversifying risks. Everything is right for small town expansion. Entertainment and education are broadcast by press, radio, and television. Communication has expanded; electrical energy is transmitted overhead; while the underground pipe lines improve the distribution of oil. The small town already has been re-made by the automobile and may get another transformation with the growth of air traffic in passengers, express, and freight. The small town's day of isolation has ended.

### Cities at Work

Veteran investors will recall that many years ago street railway earnings began to go down. It was not

a minor decline, but the start of a "traction depression" in which the earning power of all electric railway companies was cut in half and many went out of business. Some of the more stubborn security holders laid it all on the automobile, to which they took a positive dislike. Now, however, they learn that the automobile has become the traction company's best friend. The parking problem generally has become so intolerable that now every additional automobile works to the advantage of the street railway.

We are witnessing a deep groundswell marking America's shift from vertical, or skyscraper, growth in congested centers to horizontal growth through development of small cities. It is most fortunate that our defense program is demanding the spread of production over large numbers of smaller concerns, each of which can handle some part of the primary contract. Wherever practical, new plants are being located in new industrial areas. This emergency defense precaution will prove to be sound peacetime policy. Furthermore, it is a constructive factor in the current business outlook, which I regard as highly favorable. At all times, we are stronger in every way when we have plenty of sub-contractors and plenty of sub-cities.

### Better Balanced America

Every investor who has been through fire can testify to the wisdom of diversifying his funds over a broad list of industries and companies. As investors in America—and this includes Canada—we may well be optimistic to see these countries headed toward a better economic and geographical balance. Whether for war or peace, the United States and Canada are most secure when every essential article can be made from dozens of substitute materials, fabricated by hundreds of different concerns, and produced practically anywhere in the land. If we need a two-ocean navy, we need a two-coast country. The fact that the Pacific Coast has become a great aviation region and that it is eager to develop its steel and other heavy industries should rejoice all regions. Every locality, whether seacoast or inland, can feel more confident with shipbuilding stretching from Alaska to the Gulf.

Here and there some locality

may be depending solely on artificial stimulus from a military encampment or a defense plant. If that is its only claim to existence, of course, the locality is just a mining camp and destined some day to sink back into a ghost town. The development I visualize is not a promoter's boom or speculative bonanza, but a fundamental trend. The defense program is merely hastening the inevitable. For many years, it has been apparent to economists that the pendulum was beginning to swing in favor of cities of from 5000 to 2,000. They are not war babies, but products of peacetime forces that long have been gathering strength.

### Free From Normal Bottlenecks

Naturally, in these days we think chiefly of "small town" development as a step toward security against invasion. In due time, we shall see the spiritual, economic, and social benefits of the movement. A modern small city under competent management should have minimum hazards with respect to conflagrations or other catastrophes. It should rate near the top in health conditions, school facilities, good churches, and prospects for getting a job or establishing a business.

Starting with a comparatively clean slate, such a small city has a splendid opportunity to resist political corruption and to support civic efficiency. It is ideal for

establishing a home, bringing up a family, and living as God intended we should live. A small growing city will carry you upward with its most powerful appeals of communities and the assurance of their continued progress.

The purchases give the nation the money with which to push preparedness.

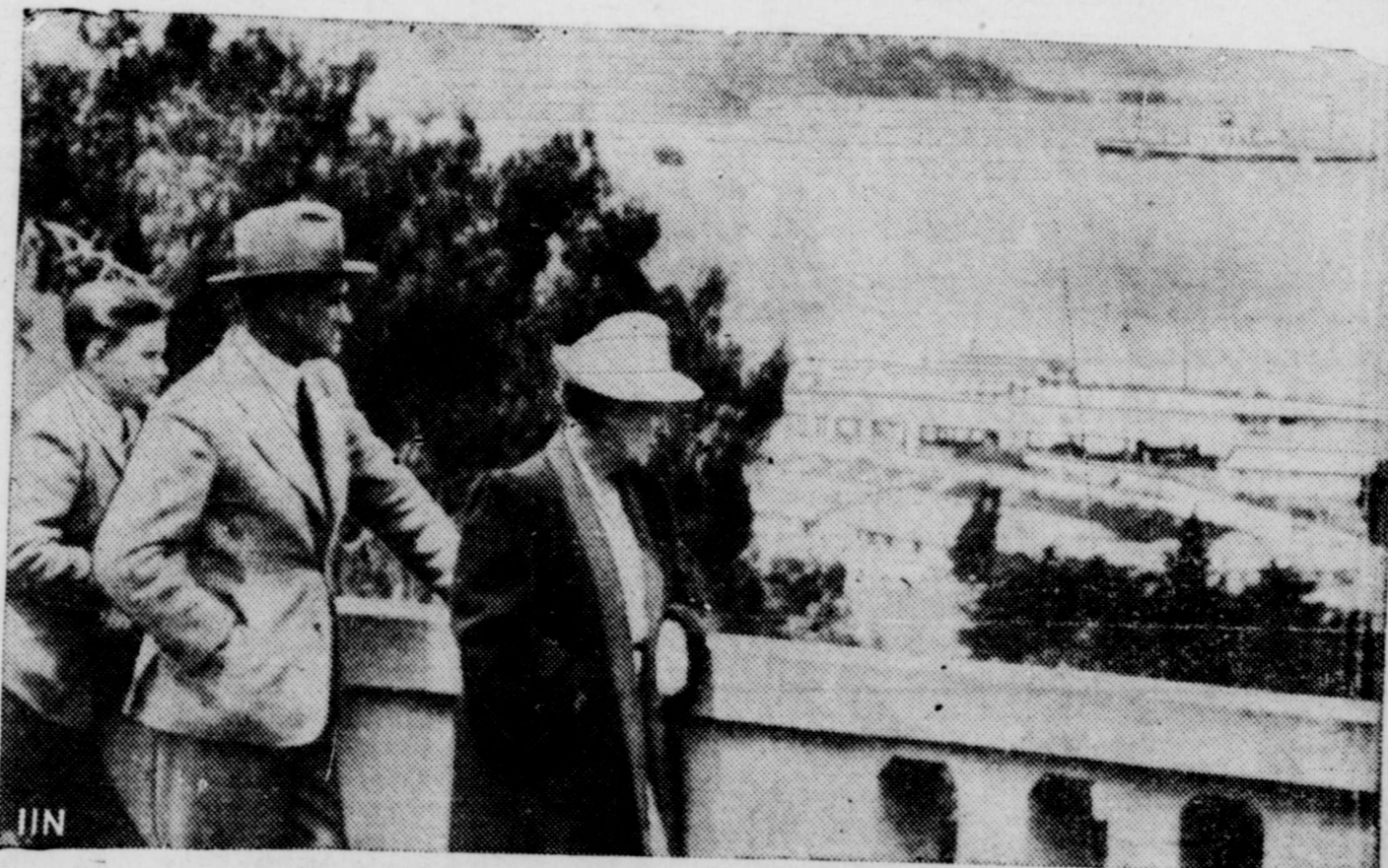

**IN THE ARMY NOW!  
WHY AND HOW**  
By S. T. Williamson

Today I stick out my neck and raise my thin, small voice in the babble of words about the 20-year-old controversy over a separate air force. Our naval and military flying folk had their troubles. In the past they bravely and usually vainly spoke out against Nineteenth Century minds which denied the airplane's importance in warfare. Everyone remembers what happened to General Billy Mitchell, who had the foresight, but not the tact, to view what was coming. The battle still rages over whether air-power can defeat sea-power—which seems to be a streamlined version of the old argument about what an irresistible force can do to an immovable body. Each side of the argument has so much in its favor that the logical answer seems to be that one needs the other; that

sea-power needs air-power and that air-power can't be decisive without sea-power.

After nearly two years of depressing example of the helplessness of ground troops beneath superior enemy air forces, the contention that our Air Corps should be independent of Army control has more justice than logic. After the way they have been hamstrung in the past, it would be justice to our foresighted air men to raise our flying services to equality with Army and Navy. But another lesson of World War II has been the close coordination between air forces and ground forces. That needs teamwork, not more argument. How victorious would be a football team in which backs, linemen and ends took time out to insist on being independent of the other?

That's enough preaching for one day; where's the mail?
