There were no definite details. But apparently return of troop trains, burdened with wounded, was having an unfavorable effect on the German populace.

> The German high command in a patent attempt to reassure the home front, gave today an impressive list of Red losses in men, planes, tanks, etc., but gave no figures on Nazi losses. They said they were "moderate", even in the Smolensk sector where fighting has been heaviest.

A German spokesman said the ratio of Nazi losses in the Russo-German war are no higher than those in previous campaigns. Totals are more, he said, because more men are involved.

Moscow and London have estimated German losses at up to a million men. Some German source have claimed Red losses reached four million. Neutral sources generally believe Red losses have been the heaviest.

Some observers saw significance in the fact that the German high command's recapitulation of the seven-week Russo\_German war, which it began releasing yesterday, still claims no new territorial gains, even today.

This significance is sharpened, they said, by the fact that the Germans yesterday insisted the Reds were beaten at Smolensk, yet today DNB, official German news agency, reports that fighting is still under way there.

Reds say the Smolensk fighting has slowed down. Some correspondents believe this indicates Ger mans can make headway there only at terrific cost and will not risk any more major losses until the home front problem is settled.

The rosy Nazi claims yesterday concerning the Smolensk sector conceivably could have been an attempt to placate the home front.
