New Nazi Campaign Seen

Two Trips Tomorrow

Be on time.
All go together.
Be sure to get hatbands.

That sums up the latest word from the leaders of the two motorcades that will roll out of Dalhart tomorrow morning for neighboring celebrations.

Charlie Coombes and the XIT band, under direction of C. W. Beene, will lead a delegation to Perryton's 22nd birthday party. It must leave at 7 a. m. in order to be in Perryton in time for the 10 a. m. parade that will be headed by Gov. Coke Stevenson.

W. L. Wanser will head a motorcade to the first annual Sheriff's Posse rodeo and celebration in Tucumcari that will open tomorrow for three days.

The Tucumcari group will leave at 9 a. m. The Tucumcari parade will be at 10:30 Tucumcari time, which is 11:30 Dalhart time.

Both groups will leave from in front of the chamber of commerce on West Third St. They are not asked to wear XIT regalia, but everyone is asked to wear a hatband. They will be available at the chamber office while the motorcades are forming.

Persons planning to attend either celebration tomorrow are asked to join the delegations and not go separately. Perryton and Tucumcari have requested delegations, and besides Dalhart will be unable to fill a section in the parade unless its folks go in groups.

26 Americans Leaving Japan

TOKYO. — The Japanese NYK steamship line today announced bookings for 26 Americans who will sail Aug. 26 for Shanghai. There they will take another ship for the U. S.

The bookings evidently were accepted under foreign office prodding. The Japs recently refused 100 Americans permission to leave for the U. S. The U. S. promptly accused Tokyo of holding them as hostages. Tokyo denied it, but U. S. Secretary of State Hull says Japs have never given any satisfactory explanation.

Rita Blanca Dam Given Sharp Boost

Rita Blanca draw, ordinarily dry, has dumped tons of water into Dalhart's Rita Blanca lake since early yesterday afternoon.

The rise, occasioned by heavy rain and considerable hail in an area north and west of Dalhart Tuesday night and yesterday morning, crossed the U. S. Highway 54 spillway, a mile and a half southwest of Dalhart, yesterday about 2 p. m.

It reportedly reached a peak of about seven feet across the spillway; was still four feet deep this morning.

The dam just before noon reportedly gauged 39 feet. In terms of acre feet of water it is half full at 40 feet, contains 6000 acre feet.

Only a sprinkle fell in Dalhart yesterday evening, but Childress got a 2.6 inch soaker. Shamrock and Miami each got an inch and a half. Dumas got .15, Spearman .08, Pampa .45, Amarillo .43.

More Taxes Are Not Needed, Says Babson

Gloucester, Mass., Aug 22.—The chief discussion in Washington and Ottawa today is over taxes. Even "price control" is secondary, as one purpose of taxation is to keep people from now rushing to buy goods. Some change from a few years ago when governments were urging us all to buy more! Guess if the politicians let us alone at all times to learn by experience the nation would be better off in the end.

Increased Taxes Unnecessary

My purpose this week—however—is not to discuss the pros and cons of proposed tax bills, but to show readers how much they are already paying in taxes. I must, however, say that the proposed "joint husband and wife tax return" is vicious, unmoral and unfair. If \$300,000,000 more is needed it should be raised by higher excise taxes on things responsible for crime. Crime alone is costing the U. S. and Canada \$18,000,000,000 a year.

A serious offense is committed in the United States every 21 seconds or a total of 1,517,026 major crimes. This averages one for every 87 persons, includes a felonious homicide every 44 minutes, a robbery every 10 seconds, an auto theft every 3 minutes, a burglary every one and two-thirds minutes, and a larceny every 35 seconds. Fifty per cent of the criminals are under 25 years of age. Let us also remember that the fire losses alone last year would have purchased 45 great cruisers for the U. S. Navy and 5 for Canada. In other words, if we all would get busy to eliminate crime, our taxes need really not cost us anything.

Taxes Which Everyone Now Pays

Already NOW 35 per cent of what we pay in rent goes to taxes. When buying a loaf of bread NOW, 20 per cent goes for direct taxes and 25 per cent for indirect or a total of 45 per cent. From every \$100 we NOW pay for clothes, the tax collectors take 52 different kinds of taxes. U. S. taxes averaged last year \$109 for every man, woman and child. According to the Committee of Americans, 122 East 42nd St., New York City: Every time we pay an electric light bill we are giving \$1 out of every \$6 of it toward taxes. . . . An average of \$13 is paid yearly in taxes by every telephone user. . . . The housewife pays \$1 in taxes out of every \$4 she spends. . . . There are over 140 different taxes figured in the cost of a pair of shoes—even for the baby. . . . The cost of the average car is paid out all over again every four years by taxes the motorist pays in operating it. . . . In drugs—a bottle of milk of magnesia carries 378 different taxes. . . . Railroads' taxes have more than doubled since 1916—now about one-third of our fare is taxes and so on.

FDR Expresses 8-Point Views

WASHINGTON.—In a brief but vigorous and pointed congressional message, President Roosevelt today said his historic Atlantic conference with Prime Minister Churchill would greatly increase effective U. S. aid to the democracies.

He said, upon his return from the parley, that it did not bring this nation any closer to war.

His message today said that any U. S. opposition to the 8-point program enunciated jointly by him and the British leader would be an open invitation to the Axis to extend their blood-stained hands over the Western hemisphere.

Any peace, he said, that did not include all eight points would simply give Germany a needed breathing space during which it would prepare for complete domination of Europe, Asia and the Western hemisphere.

He again flayed Germany's written and spoken vows as utterly no good, and labeled it the "principal aggressor" of the modern world.

He said two other points might well be added to the eight: Freedom of religion; freedom of information.

Perryton Begins Its Birthday Fete

PERRYTON. — Preliminaries in Perryton's 22nd birthday party opened this afternoon, but the main show starts tomorrow morning at 10:00 with a parade.

Events today include the first go-round in the amateur rodeo; the first of two baseball games between Dumas and Perryton; and four big dances tonight.

The parade tomorrow probably will be the biggest ever staged in the Panhandle on a preparedness and patriotic theme.

Headed by Gov. Coke Stevenson, the parade will include more than two miles of bands, Legion color guards, uniformed men, horses, riders and visiting delegations.

A Dalhart delegation, led by Charlie Coombes and the XIT band, under direction of C. W. Beene, is to leave Dalhart at 7 a. m. tomorrow and be in Perryton for the parade.

Gov. Stevenson will speak at noon from a stand in the main street and over a public address system ar-

Though its Russian campaign is apparently far from finished and in opinion of many observers may drag through the winter, Germany reportedly is massing troops and planes in Bulgaria for a strike through Turkey at British bastions and rich oil and other needed supplies in the Near East.

Travelers out of Rumania said in Istanbul, Turkey, that 200,000 Nazi soldiers are massed close to Turkey's borders in the Balkans. They said German war vessels, including submarines, are moving into position to support a blow through Turkey against the Near East.

These travelers said if Turkey resists determinedly there will be serious anti-Nazi uprisings throughout the Balkans.

Rumania, they said, feels that it has been betrayed. Even the strongly pro-Nazi Iron Guard which forced the abdication of King Carol and paved the way for the bloodless German domination of the country, are accusing Premier Ion Antonescu of selling out to Hitler.

Hospital trains from the Russo-German front are dumping tens of thousands of wounded Nazis into Rumania. So many schools have been commandeered for hospitals that regular terms may not be able to open this fall.

Rumanians also are embittered because their oil fields are being destroyed by Red raiders, despite vaunted Nazi air strength, the travelers said.

This destruction and resultant fuel shortage is also hampering Nazi mechanized forces within Russian borders and may be one spur that is driving Hitler toward the Near East.

Bulgarians are said to be increasingly anti-Nazi. The Croats, part of old Yugoslavia which was crushed and dismembered by the Axis, are reportedly fiercely resisting Italian occupation attempts. During dismemberment of Yugoslavia, Croatia was promised Italian and German recognition as an independent state.

Rumanian travelers brought back one report indicating that Hitler is being exceptionally hard pressed in his war with Russia. They said (Turn to Page 10, Column 1)

au, plus OPM's Knudsen and Hillman, plus OPAC'S Henderson. Chairman will be Henry Wallace, which makes the second big job given him—quite a change from the days when a Vice President's sole duty was going out to dinner or striking blows for liberty round a Senate refrigerator.

PAN-AMERICAN-PRIORITY

Wallace was selected as "impartial chairman" because he is a great roofer for Pan-American friendship, and Nelson Rockefeller has been complaining that a \$1-A-Year Men completely ignore the demands of our Good Neighbors for steel, copper, and other raw materials.

For instance, the son-in-law of the President of Brazil was in the United States recently, pleading for 30 tons of ferro-manganese to finish a building for President Vargas. But although Brazil sends us hundreds of thousands of tons of manganese ore, the OPM would not send back to Brazil a mere 30 tons of the processed metal.

So Wallace will protect Pan-Americanism.

Duties of the seven-man board will be to make policy on all priorities. It will decide what is to be done and who is to do it. But how well it will solve the administrative dispute remains to be seen.

NOTE—The recent magazine publicity on Judge Sam Rosenman, former Roosevelt Brain Trustee, reorganizing the national defense set-up, was the result of confusion with this priorities question. Roosevelt has not yet got around to the defense reorganization. Details of the delay will follow in this column shortly.

CAPITAL CHAFF

Under Secretary of War Patterson is impatient with the failure of Army brasshats to disperse defense orders through subcontracting, is quietly readying plans to compel it. One move will be a compulsory requirement in all big contracts for a fixed proportion of sub-contracting. Patterson will also appoint Maury Maverick, scrappy ex-mayor of San Antonio, as an assistant to see that the brasshats give small business men a break.

BRITISH SPEED PRODUCTION

W. Averell Harriman, hard-hitting railroad executive who winged his way to Washington after the floating Anglo-British conference gave OPM officials a glowing account of British war production.

Harriman has been handling the London end of the lend-lease program, and is familiar with every airplane engine and barrel of potatoes needed by Britain. He reported that British production, despite bombing raids, had continued to increase and that it might even surpass the stupendous goal set by the United States.

Harriman sat hard on rumors

that the British had been using some of the planes turned over to them from U. S. commercial airlines to establish new British commercial airlines.

"I have flown in British transport planes to the Middle East and I know what I'm talking about," Harriman reported. "Not one American plane has been used for anything except strict war needs. Of course, they are used on commercial lines, because any warplane landing at Lisbon would be seized. Only commercial ships can land in neutral territory.

"But the British commercial line carries only passengers essential to prosecution of the war. All other kinds of British flying were stopped long ago".

Harriman also reported that the British are making excellent use of American food, and that there is no profiteering. Naturally, he said, food is distributed through grocery stores, just as our grocery stores handled food under the AAA card system.

MERRY-GO-ROUND

Governor Gene Talmadge has fulminated noisily against certain Georgia liberals who made trips abroad for prominent U. S. Foundations. However, Talmadge's son, Herman E., and his wife, made a trip to Japan in 1939 as the guest of the Japanese Government with all expenses paid. Young Talmadge is now an ensign in Navy Intelligence. . . . Lady Astor, Virginia-born leader of the once-famous Cliveden set, is not likely to visit the U. S. for some time. The British government, taking no chances with her temperamental temperament, will not give her a passport. Supreme Court Justice Stanley Reed doffed his judicial aloofness to make a speech for the Council for Democracy calling for united support of President Roosevelt's anti-Hitler policy.

Nicest compliment Representative Ross Collins has received in his campaign for the seat of the late Senator Pat Harrison of Mississippi came from the powerful railroad brotherhoods.

Collins asked the Railway Labor Executives Association, which represents more than a million organized railroad workmen, for an endorsement. Next day J. G. Luhrsen, secretary of the Association, phoned Collins' office that the railway union chiefs were "more than glad" to grant his request, and that an endorsement was already in the mail.

"By the way," said Luhrsen, as an after thought, "who is Mr. Collins' opponent in the senatorial race?"

The girl clerk who answered the phone was so overcome with pride that the rail unions had endorsed her boss on the strength of his liberal record, without even bothering to learn his opponent's name, that all she could reply was:

"Oh, thank you, sir. Thank you very much."



**IN THE ARMY NOW!
WHY AND HOW**
By S. T. Williamson

The newest unit in the United States Army won't be found shuttling over roads or creeping through woods, or wriggling on its gizzard across fields in war maneuvers. On the War Department's tables of organization it is down for "one truck, hydrogen gas generating, and a lot of other things; including balloons; and when it knows its job it will have (perhaps) all of these things and 49 officers and 257 enlisted men to mind them. It is the 301st Barrage Balloon Battalion, it belongs to the Coast Artillery, and its temporary and present home is Camp Davis, N. C. A barrage balloon is more vulnerable than a couple who have won the one game in a rubber of bridge. Unlike the bridge fiends it hasn't any more fight in it than a mushroom, but it can be even more of a pest. Any plane which tangles with it is zero plus as an insurance risk—and same goes for the balloon if it's set on fire. Use of barrage balloons in war does not prevent hostile air raids, but a cluster of these "fat friends", as airmen call them, bobbling around in the atmosphere at different levels are extremely discouraging to bomber pilots. Bombers must therefore fly higher, their aim is more inaccurate, and the result in London, for instance, is that Nazi planes may have hit almost everything else but such vital places as key electric power stations.

In all such matters, however, the 301st Barrage Balloon Battalion starting from scratch. 


 Holders paid an average tax per common share, or almost the amount paid in dividends. If these companies could pay taxes only on their property, these 7,118,000 stockholders could have received \$329 in dividends or else each could have received \$600 per year in salary. With lower taxes you would get more interest, savings accounts and lower insurance costs.

Not now asking that taxes be reduced, but I do say it is unfair to eliminate all "tax-exempt" securities. Existing state and local government securities total \$10,000,000 with over a billion dollars being issued each year. It is unfair not to tax all securities alike. If these were taxed—the new ones issued—this would be another solution to our problem.

More People to Work
 cannot have prosperity by building a ball and chain on employment. No sensible farmer puts a rein on a horse hauling a load. "We cannot lift wages building wage payers down."

Today a scarcity of skilled workers; but at least 6,000,000 people are still looking for jobs. Let us encourage more men to work by making it easier to get work. Instead of harder—for them. Elimination of tax-exempts help employment. Rich men would then quit burying money in tax-exempt bonds. They would put their money to building more factories, stores and other enterprises which give employment. There is enough money in the U. S. and Canada to give everyone of good character a living. One difficulty is money is in "tax-raid shell."

Spend More on Research
 Men would spend one-third of their time in developing new products—instead of increasing taxes—no increase in tax rates would now be necessary. As often said, the search for increased income and employment through research are the fondest dreams. It is only hope for preventing a national collapse.

Cotton is worth only 12 cents a pound; but put it into rayon and it is worth a dollar and. Petroleum is worth only 15 cents per gallon as fuel oil; but put it into dyes and it is worth 15 times this. Soya beans used as weeds; but today most sought for crop. Coal worth only a few dollars a ton; but it is worth several dollars per ton when used in rayon silk. Even sea shells becoming useful for magnesium and bromine.

The Solution
 The real way to raise the new money needed for defense is to increase the national income and tax rates as they are. This done by reducing crime, suppressing commercialized evils and creating new industries. Both the U. S. and Canada need more engineers and fewer politicians. Some say "this means a spiritual revival of the American people." Why not work for this? It is no short cut to either prosperity or security. The Ten Commandments and the Multiplication table give the answer to taxation.

snappy, well-trained troops used to parade in Rumania. They have been replaced with raw, awkward recruits, virtually youngsters.

Five million Red troops have been put out of the fighting in two months of war, Germany said today. These include 1,200,000 prisoners.

Russians said at least a million Germans had been killed, and more than a million had been captured.

Germans today said they had taken a key fortress in the Dnieper estuary area. They reported that Reds had failed in their attempt to blow up the main Dnieper river dam and halt or crush a part of the German advance with a huge flood. Several smaller dams have been wrecked, Germans said, expanding swampy terrain. This may temporarily delay German columns.

There is still no clear cut picture of progress being made by Marshall Budyenny in his efforts to withdraw men and materials across the Dnieper and form a new line on its east bank. Germans apparently have still not crossed the river at any point. They claim some bridgeheads.

Germans claim they are now battering at Leningrad's main defenses. Reds tacitly admit it. Their military leaders have called on men, women and children to defend the Soviet's second largest city to the death.

The central front picture, obscured last night by phenomenal claims on both sides, was a little clearer today.

Reds apparently have stalled the Nazis. Moscow, 230 miles eastward, is seemingly in no immediate danger.

Nazis last night claimed capture of 78,000 men on the central front, involving 25 divisions and two bridges of air-borne troops. Soviet casualties were also said to be heavy.

Reds said air-borne tanks, filled with infantry, were floated down behind the German lines in the central front. They knifed forward, and smashed the German thrust from the rear.

The RAF continues to carry out terrific raids against Germany and Nazi-held territory. Britain says it now has more planes over German cities each night than the Germans had over British cities in the darkest days last fall.

German sources acknowledged today that 10,000 Parisians, apparently mostly Jews, had been rounded up by Paris police and German troops. They are suspected of anti-Nazi and Communist activity. Two have been shot. Germans recently



Whine of the fiddle and strum of the guitar will be heard at a series of old-time dances. At least two will be held each night.
