Core Pearson and Robert S. Allen S. Stamp Campaign Set

Merry-Go-Round And FDR Accused Of Big Frame-Up

Washington - Newsmen around the White House are accusing F.D.R., Drew Pearson and Bob Allen with secret collusion. On Monday morning The Washington Merry - Go - Round came out with the flat story that Francis Biddle would be appointed Attorney General and Charles Fahy would be made Solicitor General. Pearson and Allen made no reservations whatsoever. They went out on a limb all the way.

But they didn't stay there long. A few hours later, about twelve o'clock noon to be exact, President Roosevelt sent to the Senate the names sf Francis Biddle and Charles Fahy to be Attorney General and Solicitor General respectively.

Fighting On More Than One Front Is Good Strategy
