These are the times when business men must listen to amateurish lectures on their duty to the nation. Every strap hanger strategist and tabloid economist can tell the world just where the real "bottlenecks"

"Now, there's the car shortage that's tying up transportation"—that's a line as familiar to Main Street as Broadway. "Why didn't the railroads get ready for this situation? Anybody with eyes to see might have known it was coming." How godlike, how splendidly perfect hindsight can be!

An incident related in Nation's Business helps to assay the proportion of dross in this "beef" against the railroads. A Washington newspaper man went to the Association of American Railroads to inquire about a "car shortage," which was preventing the United States from shipping millions of cans of tomatoes to Britain. He had the story from someone in the O. P. M., he said, and before printing it he wanted to check its accuracy.

The railroad people hadn't heard anything about such a "shortage," but together with the reporter they phoned the

government agency which was supposed to have lots of tomatoes and no cars.

"No cars!" the responsible official snorted. "Got all the cars we need, and more, if we have to have them. What we haven't got is the tomatoes."

SEE WITH YOUR EXPERIENCE

A NATURALIST in Bryce Canyon, Utah, gave some sage advice to those who are out to see things. "See with your experience, not just with your eyes," he said. "If you just see with your eyes you may come home and remember that you've seen some trees, some rocks, a bear, and a squirrel, but what you've seen will have little significance."

How many different kinds of trees can you identify? How many different colors can you see in the rocks and what creates the colors? What is the history of the section? What are the names of the wild flowers? Reading up on the section you are traveling through adds interest to the trip. Keeping a little notebook enables you to relive your trip when you return.

The old rancher saw with his experience when he looked down into Bryce Canyon with its maze of buttes and towering rocks and exclaimed: "What a hell of a place to lose a cow."
