Early Tax Paying Would Help City

Persons who can pay their city taxes immediately will be conferring a big favor, said Mayor Herbert Peeples this morning.

The City last March refunded its total indebtness of \$357,000, lowered the interest rate \$2,000 annually and substantially cut down the size of the annual bond payments. This has enabled the City to operate on a cash basis.

However, there are several reawould confer a particular lavor unis year:

The refunding will save Dalhart taxpayers an estimated \$50,000 in. interest eventually. It also spreads the annual bond

There's a big strike on in New York.

Some seventy thousand workers are striking every afternoon.

Some thirty-odd ball players are striking at a white pellet.

Hundreds of school children are striking against afternoon classes.

This "strike" occurs once annually and regardless of wages. hours, or laws to the contrary it can't be prevented. In fact they even start the world baseball series with "The Star Spangled Banner," the newspapers and radios tell the world verything that takes place, and heroes and bums are made while the "strike" is taking place.

Over in Europe they are having a strike, too.

There are millions of human beings involved.

Some are being struck with bombs that fall in the cover of darkness, others by machine gun bullets. thousands by long-range guns. It is the most terrible, most tragic "strike" in all history.

That this country is so far not involved in this tragedy is something for which all of us are grateful.

Over here at our establishment we are having a "strike," too. It has nothing to do with wages or hours of employment, for we are working all hours and doing the best we can for wages. But the "strike" is the sound of hammer against steel, the tightening of nut to bolt, the cranking of a tractor, the sound of farm machinery being set up ready for the big harvest, the "strike" of farmers against outmoded and worn-out farm equipment.

And with our "Late-Frost Department" we are also striking against a frost of any kind during October. We have hopes of having a friendly settlement with Old Man Weather, but this week we thought he was going to let us down. In fact we can't say he made us feel too well, but then the frost hasn't come yet.

Ford, Mercury Will Be Shown Friday At Scott Motor Co.

Automobile enthusiasts in the Dalhart area will get their first view of the new Ford and Mercury tomorrow, when they go on display at the Scott Motor Co.

The 1942 Ford will offer a choice of V-8 or 6-cylinder engines in all models and body types except the "Special" line which is available only in the "6", while the Mercury has captured the design of the airplanes which Ford is building extensively for the Government.

"Beauty" is a word that must be used extensively in describing the Ford Motor Co. products—new exterior beauty; new interior beauty; new streamline beauty. The popular massive design has been captured from nose to tail, with lights blended into the body design, combined with lower chassis and wider tread.
