If German claims, made today, turn out to be correct, Russia is doomed and Britain faces a onefront war this winter.

Germany said panzer forces, supported by parachute troops, are within 125-130 miles of Moscow, and that the two-pronged drive on the Soviet capital has trapped a million Red army troops. These, Berlin said, are being progressively annihilated or

Britain frankly admitted the crisis was the most grave since Dunkirk. It added that it did not have material for a counter blow in the West even though German garrisons there have been drastically reduced in order to give Hitler enough troops for the big Rus-

A report from the German-controlled Finnish radio said the Soviet capital is being moved to Stalin-

Germans said Russians were stalemated in the Leningrad sector; and that Nazi forces had virtually taken the Donets basin and stood at the gates of the vital Caucasus

Russians claimed to hold the offensive in the Leningrad and Lake Ilman sectors, and neutral observers said the Red army on the central front, though it might be encircled, was still fighting fiercely.

There were no details of the fighting in the Donets basin, before the Caucasus or in the Crimea at which Germany has been hammering a fortnight.



Continue stirring and cook 30 seconds longer. Remove from heat and stir in remaining 2 teaspoons vanilla. Cover and cool thoroughly With sharp knife split cold cake into 2 layers. Spread bottom layer with the cooled pudding mixture. Cover with second layer of cake. Sprinkle top with powdered sugar. Serves 6.
