

Prince Konoye and his entire cabinet-after a life of only three months, one of the briefest governments in recent Japanese historyresigned in toto. They have been for several weeks under pressure of militaristic extremists who have been clamoring for a showdown with the U.S. and Britain.

Konoye, a modernist, about two months ago personally opened negotiations with President Roosevelt in an effort to straighten out tangled American-Japanese relations. Roosevelt answered Konoye's note, but nothing concrete ever developed from the exchange. Contents of the notes were never revealed.

The cabinet overthrow, in view of U. S. officials, has collapsed whatever progress had been made in the negotiations opened by Konoye with Roosevelt.

13/4 cups all-purpose 1 cup light brown flour sugar, lightly 1 teaspoon cinnamon 3/4 teaspoon salt 1/2 teaspoon soda 1/2 cup seedless raisins, halved

sugar, lightly packed 1 egg 1/2 cup Pet Milk

1½ teaspoons vinegar 1/2 cup soft butter or other shortening 3/4 cup shredded

Turn on oven and set at moderate (375°F.). Sift flour before measuring. Resift with cinnamon, salt and soda. Fold raisins into flour mixture. Put soft butter in mixing bowl. Add brown sugar gradually, mixing until light and fluffy. Beat in egg vigorously. Add flour mixture alternately with mixture of milk and vinegar. Begin and end with flour mixture. Beat until smooth after each addition. Drop by teaspoons onto greased baking sheet. On half of cookies, sprinkle tops with equal portions of coconut. Bake on oven shelf slightly above center for 15 minutes, or until cookies are brown. Remove from baking sheet at once. Makes about 5 dozen.
