2 MORE ARE CLEARED IN THEFT CASE

CHANNING.—A Hartley county district court jury in Channing last night acquitted I. E. Wasson and Oscar Martin of cattle theft charges.

After the State concluded its testimony, Attorney R. E. Underwood of Amarillo won from Judge James Witherspoon an instructed verdict of acquittal for Collins.

Trial of Wasson and Martin, represented by Frank M. Tatum of Dalhart, took its normal course, resulting in acquittal last night.

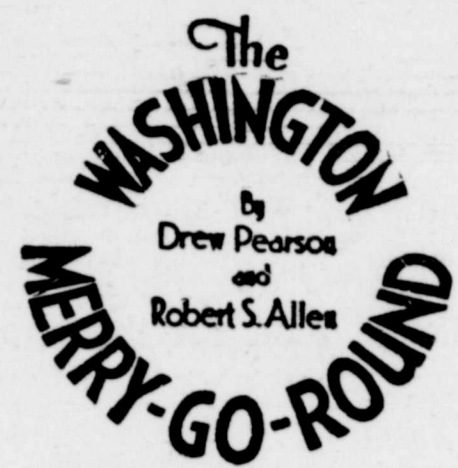
Two Teachers Have Resigned Positions

WASHINGTON.—The crumbling Russian front has caused some very cogent questions to be asked in high places regarding the efficiency of both the United States and the British.

Uppermost question is transportation, without which supplies cannot reach Russia.

Most desperate area in which Russia needs supplies is in the South. There the Hitler drive has progressed disastrously near the oil fields of the Caucasus. However, the only route to the Caucasus is via the Gulf of Persia to the port of Basra, thence by a shaky railroad through Iran to South Russia. This railroad is in such bad shape that almost no supplies of any consequence can be transported.

To bolster it, American railway experts are being sent to Besra. However, the stark tragedy—completely unexplained—is why the British did not begin long ago to whip this road into shape. The Russian war has been in progress for three months. The British knew even last June that this route would be all-important. Two or three thousand men could have revamped the railroad in quick time. But nothing was done.

Meanwhile the French and Germans have been working feverishly to build a railroad from Casablanca, in Morocco, to Dakar, the French naval base opposite Brazil. And in about the same length of time, they have almost finished it. But in Iran the British did nothing.

Meanwhile, also, the Nazis feverishly have been relaying one rail (Turn to Page 4, Column 1)

The U. S. today faced a new threat of war in the Pacific, while Germans advanced ten miles closer to Moscow. Overthrow of the Japanese cabinet precipitated the new Pacific threat. It also caused American commodity markets to break badly, and may hasten congressional modification of the Neutrality Act to permit arming of U. S. merchant vessels.

Backward, turn backward, Oh Time in your flight, And tell us who started this Dust Bowl to write. We don't want to hurt him; we'll call him our friend, We just want to show him good crops without end. So help us to search for this word-coining man, And deliver him to us as soon as you can.

The Dalhart Texan is still looking for the man or woman who coined the term, Dust Bowl, and will still pay \$50 cash to anyone for information leading to his positive identification. We'll give him round trip transportation to Dalhart, regardless of where he lives. We'll take him out to Everett Bates' place, where sudan grass is so high and thick that Bates' son, even on horseback, can't find milk cows being pastured in it unless they carry bells around their necks. The sound guides him to them. The sudan is 10 to 12 feet high. Mr. and Mrs. George Walker, Dalhart residents since the town was founded in 1901, are among those who know about Bates' sudan grass.

We'll also show him 100 acres of red top cane on the W. L. Mitchell farm, 11 miles south of Dalhart, that yielded 650 bundles per acre. Another 78 acres turned out 500 bundles per acre, and a field of hegar did the same. . . . We could also take him to the Dallam county shallow water belt, just east of Texline. Irvine, Cottom & Brown have about 225 acres of potatoes that will yield 175 hundred-pound sacks per acre. Brown had a 40-acre patch last year that (Turn to Page 4, Column 2)

Prince Konoye and his entire cabinet—after a life of only three months, one of the briefest governments in recent Japanese history—resigned in toto. They have been for several weeks under pressure of militaristic extremists who have been clamoring for a showdown with the U. S. and Britain.

Konoye, a modernist, about two months ago personally opened negotiations with President Roosevelt in an effort to straighten out tangled American-Japanese relations. Roosevelt answered Konoye's note, but nothing concrete ever developed from the exchange. Contents of the notes were never revealed.

The cabinet overthrow, in view of U. S. officials, has collapsed whatever progress had been made in the negotiations opened by Konoye with Roosevelt.

If Konoye is asked by the emperor to form a new cabinet, modernists may still have a large voice in Japanese foreign policy. But if Konoye is not given that chance it will be fairly certain that extremists are in the saddle.

That, observers said, will bring Japan to a showdown with Russia and the Axis as well as with the U. S. and Britain.

Japan months ago became a junior partner in the Axis and Germany has since then been trying to get it to strike at Britain and the U. S. to lessen Anglo-American pressure on the Axis. Konoye's government has hesitated, apparently not wishing to risk an Anglo-American war.

Germany today renewed its efforts to get Japan to strike at the U. S. and Britain. It also is emphasizing to Japan that now is the time to force a deal with Russia which Nazis say is tottering under Axis blows on its European front.

If Japanese belligerents get charge of the government, Tokyo may try by force to stop the flow of U. S. aid through Japanese waters to the Russian port of Vladivostok. Japan has several times asked and warned the U. S. not to send supplies to Vladivostok, but has not gone further. Such shipments must traverse Japanese waters.

Study Farm Production Goals

The Dallam County USDA Defense Council yesterday approved the tentative Food for Freedom production goals set for the county, with exception of those relating to beef cattle and vegetables.

The tentative goals had been set by the State USDA Defense Council at College Station. They call for 300 farm gardens, an increase of 19,000 dozen eggs, 220,000 pounds of milk and a 10 per cent hike in hog marketing and slaughtering.

The State USDA Council also asked for an 18 per cent increase in marketing of beef cattle, including calves. The Dallam Council pointed out that farmers have a banner row crop that cannot be sold advantageously for cash and that in the long run it would be better to market this feed through beef

cattle even if that meant trimming the proposed cattle marketing goal.

The State Council also asked for 400 acres of vegetables, excluding Irish and sweet potatoes. The Dallam Council said 50 acres probably would be more reasonable.

5 Per Cent Tax On Railroad Tickets

Uncle Sam last weekend put into effect a five per cent defense tax on transportation of persons, F. D. Daggett, general passenger agent of the Denver lines at Fort Worth, announced today.

The tax, he said, applies on all items of passenger transportation amounting to more than 35 cents and must be collected in cash by the railroad agent at the time the ticket is issued.

McNeill, Peeples Are Defense Chiefs

Austin — Appointment of 254 County Defense coordinators and 617 Municipal Defense Coordinators for the state has been announced by Governor Coke Stevenson, acting upon recommendations of the national defense committee of Texas.

Dallam County Judge Floyd McNeill was designated as county defense coordinator; Mayor Herbert Peeples, municipal defense coordinator for Dalhart.

Local organizations, local defense councils, clubs, societies, and individuals will be given full opportunity to participate in the program under leadership of the county and municipal defense coordinators.

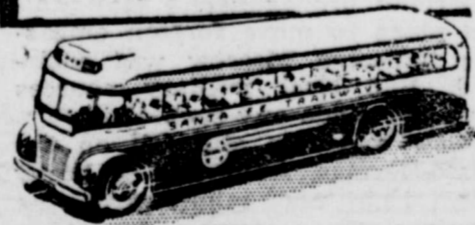

on all the Russian railroads. This is because the Russian built their tracks the widest in the world to prevent an invading nation from using their railroads. However, Hitler has had labor gangs relaying the rail line so rapidly that today narrower gauge Nazi trains go right up to the battle front.

This is the secret of Hitler's amazing transportation feat, by which 4,000,000 men have been supplied with an average of four tons of supplies per man—shells, artillery, food, clothing, tanks, gasoline—all hauled over 1,000 miles to a battle-front 3,000 miles wide.

Yet only in the past few days is an American railroad mission being sent to the Gulf of Persia.

There are two other routes to get supplies into Russia. One, by way of Vladivostok, means a two-week rail haul over the Trans-Siberian.

To strengthen this road, the United States will send 300 locomotives. However, we haven't yet found the ships to carry them, since locomotives are too big to be lowered down the average ships hatch. But even more important we have to revamp the locomotives, perhaps even manufacture them altogether, for our locomotives don't fit the wide Russian gauge.

Meanwhile, most U. S. supplies are going via Archangel which has turned out to be better than expected, but the Nazis are pretty sure to begin bombing it.

FDR SPEEDS SUPPLIES

While the British have been inexcusably slow in regard to transport, both Britain and the United States have been equally slow in allocating supplies to be shipped. For weeks after Churchill and Roosevelt decided to send a mission to Moscow, the two governments backed and filled as to who should be in the delegation and whether China should be invited. Meanwhile precious weeks, vital to Russia's chances, were lost.

And only this past week did large scale supplies really get loaded up in U. S. ports for Russia. Prior to that the Army had hemmed and hawed, done little. It was only after a week of Russian retreating toward Moscow, that Roosevelt shook the big stick and the Army came across. Why he didn't act in July remains a mystery, for the U. S. Army was telling him even then that the Russian situation would be desperate.

Today airplanes are finally being loaded for Russia at the rate of about 300 to 400 per month. Also tanks are being shipped in about the same quantity.

However, it will take about 40 days for them to reach Russia. And in forty days, anything can happen.

PROTECTING CONSUMERS

Here is a three-act drama entitled "Defense Expansion".

Act I—Mid-April, the Office of Price Administration and Civilian Supply comes into being. Its duty is to keep prices down, protect the consumer. Its chief, Leon Henderson. Its staff, 20 persons. Its home, the Old Blair mansion at 2000 Massachusetts Ave.

Act II—Early summer, OPACS takes on industrial committees, research assistants, lawyers and economists—all to protect the consumer. The staff of 300 outgrows the Blair mansion and moves to a new apartment building on Q Street.

Act III—Autumn, OPACS has 300 workers. Reorganization splits it into two groups—Office of Price Control and Office of Civilian Supply (under OPM). The apartment building takes them to a new office building which is too small, and another move

Kenneth Curry, chief clerk to E. B. Herdman, superintendent of the Rock Island in Dalhart, gave us a bad scare yesterday morning. "I'm going to collect that \$50 reward," he announced, "because Albert Law coined Dust Bowl in his story on the Guymon, Okla., drought meeting in 1933." We denied everything because court isn't the only place where they can use what you say against you. But, after Curry left, we sneaked out the files with the firm intention of burning them if he happened to be right. But he wasn't, so we don't mind saying that the story was written June 17, 1933, and that anyone who wants to look at the files may do so.

And the drama is still going. Soon a fourth act can be written, in which the staff will number about 2,000. And they will probably move again, if anybody can find a building large enough.

GOP SMART POLITICS

Inside reason for the big jump in House Republican votes for the new \$5,985,000,000 lend-lease bill was that party floor leader Joe Martin paved the way for it at a secret pow-wow in his office one day before the vote.

The GOP caucus, held the same day, got all the publicity, but it didn't hold a candle in significance to the unadvertised meeting in Martin's suite. It was attended by the fifteen Republican members of the Appropriations Committee and Martin frankly told them that he expected them to head off, if possible, a recurrence of the GOP fight against the original \$7-billion lend-lease bill last February, at that time the GOP voted almost 6 to 1 against aiding Britain.

"I was one of those who voted the first bill," said Martin, "but I intend to vote for this one, and I don't think it is good strategy for us to go on record so overwhelmingly against British aid a second time."

Martin made no reference to Wendell Willkie or his sharp attack on Republican isolationism. But he made it clear that he had reached the conclusion that the party's isolationist course wasn't "smart politics."

"We ought to get this straightened out now so we will know where we stand at the caucus this afternoon," he said. "I'm not going to tell anyone how to vote. However, with the congressional elections corner, I don't think it is wise for the party to leave itself open to attack on this issue."

Martin added that, since aiding Britain to defeat Hitler was the established policy of the government, the patriotic thing to do was to "go along" but to oppose any legislation "which might get us into war."

The only one present who didn't back up Martin was Representative Harold Knutson, bull-voiced Minnesota Roosevelt-hater and Lindbergh-admirer.

NOTE: While many Republicans reversed themselves and lined up for the bill on the final vote, all the crippling amendments offered during the debate came from GOP members.

the gravest view of the new Japanese crisis. President Roosevelt this morning cancelled a special cabinet meeting and called a session of what might be called an emergency war board. It comprises Hull, Stimson, and Knox, secretaries of the State department, Army, and Navy, respectively; also Army Chief of Staff Marshall and Chief of Naval Operations Stark.

Speaker Sam Rayburn of the House said today that the new Jap crisis may mean trouble for the U. S. He predicted the House would authorize arming of U. S. merchantmen by tomorrow night and that the new Tokyo upset might lessen isolationist opposition in the Senate.

Nazis, fighting on a great 350-mile arc before Moscow, have apparently advanced about ten miles on one of the three sectors in the past 24 hours.

Russians have admitted a breakthrough on one sector, but have not said which one. However, language of the communiques indicated it was on the western sector, directly in front of Moscow, as distinguished from the flanking sectors north and south of the capital.

These advances have reportedly put the Germans within 50 miles of Moscow, at least at one point. On other sectors the Germans are as far away as 125 miles although most observers feel that the Nazis almost everywhere are now in contact with the city's main defenses.

Hitler claimed last night he was funneling tremendous reserve strength into a knockout blow.

Premier Stalin assertedly has told foreign embassies to be ready to leave Moscow, at a moment's notice, for some point to the east. Observers said he must also soon decide whether to stake everything on Moscow's defense, or withdraw his troops to new positions east of the capital.

German propagandists said Stalin's plans to move foreign embassies indicated Moscow was encircled. But Nazi military sources have not made any such claim. Snow and rain still fell on the Russo-German front and a heavy storm right now might give the Russians the necessary breathing spell.

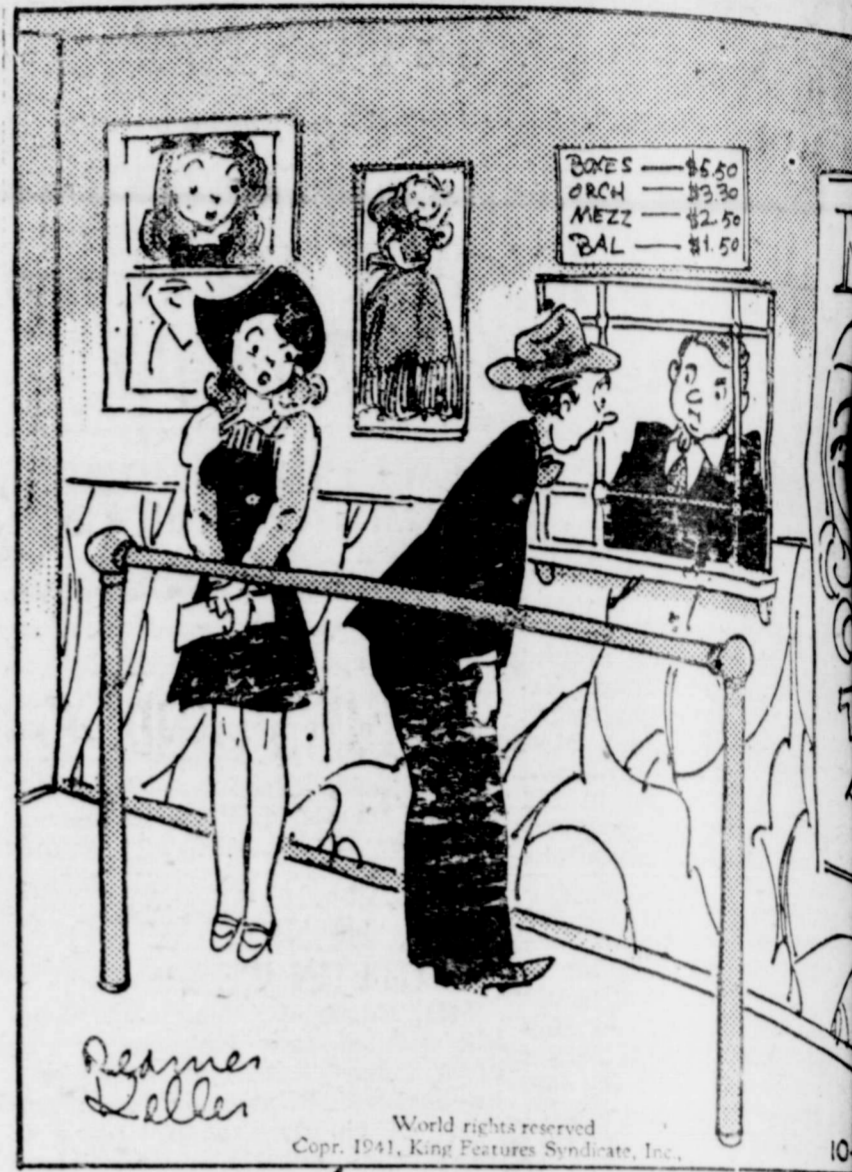
Rumanians said today they had reached Odessa's defenses in the far south. They said Reds had fired the city and were trying to evacuate it.

Hungarian troops claimed to have smashed into the Donets basin, but neither Berlin or Moscow confirmed these statements.

Occupied countries are apparently still seething with revolt. Authorized sources said today that 1,641 persons had been killed or executed Russo-German war started. In the occupied countries since the last two weeks 224 Czechs have been shot.

Premier-Marshall Petain of Unoccupied France announced by radio today that five former premiers, army generals and ranking French politicians had been imprisoned on war charges. They include Reynaud, Daladier, Gamelin, Mandel and Blum.
