They left Dalhart only a few months ago when Cantrell was recalled to active service in the U. S. Navy. He was aboard the Utah, one of the ships destroyed in the Pearl Harbor debacle, according to relatives here.

His parents are Mr. and Mrs. W. T. Cantrell. It was the first word from Cantrell since the U. S.-Axis war broke.

Scout Leaders To Meet Tonight

Deputy Regional Executive Earl McClure of Dallas will discuss the Boy Scout's part in the national emergency at a meeting of the district scout leaders at 7:30 tonight in the Dalhart chamber of commerce office.

Scoutmasters, assistant scoutmasters and patrol leaders of the Dallam-Hartley district are urged to attend. District Commissioner R. H. Campbell has announced.

American forces today broke up two Jap land sorties on Luzon Island. Dutch and Allied troops got the jump on Nippon around Australia and Borneo. British slowed the invaders in Malaya, and pushed Axis forces backward in the Derna area, far west of Tobruk in North Africa. Russians lengthened their stride in pursuit of Nazis on the Eastern front, and said German resistance was weakening.

Japs today attempted to strike out from their toehold on West Luzon and from the Aparri sector, but were smashed back. The column out of Aparri was mechanized.

Dutch and Allied troops got the jump on Japs by taking an island north of Australia that Tokyo wanted as an air and naval base; and by bombing a concentration of Jap battleships and transports off north Borneo. At least two raids were made, the latter one setting a troop ship afire.

British have set up a new and apparently stronger defense line in northeast Malaya; and are battling heavily in flooded rice fields on the west side of the mainland to stem a Jap drive on Penang.

Observers say the Jap drive in northwest Malaya is losing intensity and are predicting early counter blows that may set the invaders on their tails.

British forces crashed into the Derna area after crushing Nazi mechanized resistance in a five-day battle somewhere east of there.

Red commanders said their troops are sweeping ahead with gathering speed and will pursue the Nazis indefinitely or until a knockout blow can be administered.

WASHINGTON.—A congressional battle threatens over ages of men eligible for military service.

The House thinks it should be 21-44 inclusive and has sent a measure providing that to the Senate.

The Senate may try to make the ages 19-44. The House refused to lower the age to 19 because it said 4,000,000 men can be secured in the 21-44 bracket.

HOW YOU CAN HELP WIN THIS WAR!

Present-day conditions are similar to the situation of a girl who has been accepting the attentions of a boy, and suddenly declines an invitation to go out with him.

If it is because she has turned against him, or prefers some other fellow to him, then he has a right to be sore. BUT if the reason is that Papa says that she must go to Sunday school at the time the boy wants to take her to a show, he should not blame her for it. The responsibility lies with Papa, who has authority and is exercising it.

Today, and rightfully so, Uncle Sam has virtually commandeered the services of industry for the defense program, and has the authority to enforce same. When machines and materials are hard to get, no one should be criticized for trying. But if you meet with a "No" here and there, remember that the man who says it may be a better friend of yours than another who says "Yes" when he should say "No."

To the United States Department of Agriculture we should say "Yes" to the plea for increased production. And when the Department makes the following statement we should be prepared to say "Yes":

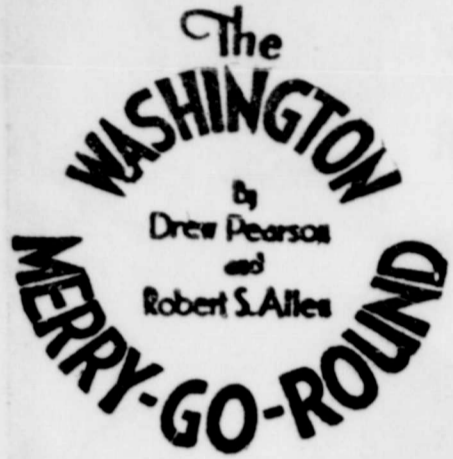

WASHINGTON. — There was a stirring unrecorded incident preceding the speedy vote for war against Germany and Italy by the House of Representatives. It was a dramatic illustration of the kind of national unity that should prevail throughout the nation in these critical days.

An hour before the House met to vote on the war resolutions, three southern and one western congressman decided to obtain time for a speech by the lone negro member of Congress—dignified Representative Arthur Mitchell of Illinois.

The three southerners were Representatives Bayard Clark and Carl Durham of North Carolina, and Carl Vinson of Georgia. The westerner was Representative Orville Zimmerman of Missouri. Durham initiated the idea while talking to colleagues about the earlier congressional debate on the declaration of war against Japan.

"There was one thing wrong," said the North Carolina Congressman. "Spokesmen from all sections and creeds spoke, but Arthur Mitchell was not called on. National unity should mean unity of all Americans regardless of religion, color, sex or party. American negroes are fighting in this war for their country like everyone else. I think Mitchell, whom we all respect, should have been asked to speak."

"You are absolutely right," echoed Clark also of North Carolina.

"Yes," said Missouri's Zimmerman, "and I propose we do something about it. Let's make sure that Mitchell is called on today."

Zimmerman immediately got in touch with Vinson of Georgia, Chairman of the Naval Affairs Committee, who enthusiastically approved the proposal and volunteered to speak to Mitchell about it. Beaming with pleasure, the negro congressman said he would be

very happy to make a speech. "That will be easy for me," he said. "I've been a strong supporter of the President's foreign policies all along."

At the last moment, however, the plan was abandoned. For propaganda purposes in Europe, in view of the grandstand staging by Hitler and Mussolini in declaring war against the U. S., government leaders decided to act on the war resolutions without any discussion.

LITVINOV'S BEVERAGE

When Maxim Litvinov held his first press conference as Soviet Ambassador to Washington, there was a dramatic stage setting. . . . Before he entered the room, flood lights were set up, spotting the Ambassador's desk, on which rested a shiny silver thermos jug and glass. . . . Behind the desk, a bronze bust of Lenin. . . . On the walls, oil paintings of sleigh scenes, dark forests, and bright-eyed peasants. . . . The Ambassador entered, the newsmen rose. . . . He sat, and two stenographers prepared to take his every word. . . . Before speaking, he removed the stopper from the bright thermos jug to pour himself a drink. . . . He poured—but instead of water, a stream of yellow fluid filled his glass. . . . All during the press conference he sipped with the relish of a man who, after days in the desert, has reached an oasis at last. . . . It was orange juice. . . . In the Soviet Union, oranges are so rare that most peasants don't know the word.

SPECULATION ON THE PHILIPPINES

Ten years ago in the Army War College, the basic principle regarding war in the Pacific was surrender of the Philippines after about 30 days of battle. It was estimated that Corregidor, the fortress outside Manila, could hold out for several months, if necessary, but the rest of the Islands would be taken by the Japanese.

In the last two years, however, thanks to a Philippine army and the assiduous labors of General MacArthur, the situation has improved considerably. And it was estimated that the Philippines had a fair chance to hold out much longer—perhaps indefinitely.

However, the attack at Hawaii has changed the situation. The injury to the fleet at Pearl Harbor may mean not only that no U. S. ships could go to the rescue of the Philippines, but also that it would be difficult to convey ammunition to beleaguered Manila.

Furthermore, it would be difficult to get new airplane reinforcements to MacArthur because the island stepping stones of Guam, Wake and Midway are in jeopardy.

Therefore the American public should reconcile itself to the possibility of the eventual fall of the Philippines, when MacArthur's supplies of ammunition and airplanes are exhausted.

This would not be a major calamity, since American naval forces can always base on Singapore and the Dutch East Indies. But it would be a big blow to American prestige. Furthermore it would remove the Philippines as a base for harassing Japanese troop ships en route to the major war theater—Singapore.

NOTE.—Much more important effect of the Hawaii raid was that it could diminish Japanese fear of attack from us. As a result the Japanese would need to keep few

CAPITAL CHAFF

The White House has ordered night and day work on the construction of an underground bomb shelter. It will permit the President to work underground during air raids, and will also have a connection with the Treasury for the benefit of Secretary Morgenthau. . . . The State Department will soon issue a new Black List of firms doing business with the Axis. On it will be some American citizens who failed to heed repeated warnings. . . . Heavy-browed "Denny" Lewis, brother of John L. and head of the United Construction Workers, is taking no chances since the slugging his henchmen staged at the recent CIO convention in Detroit. "Denny" has a hulking bodyguard close at hand in his Washington office. At Detroit, "Denny" was always surrounded by a squad of strongarm men. . . . Insiders are crediting Federal Security Administrator Paul McNutt with an important victory in the appointment of Watson B. Miller as head of the Old Age Insurance Bureau of the Social Security Board. Miller, close friend of McNutt and former Rehabilitation Director of the American Legion, replaces John J. Corson, who was shunted to another job at \$1000 a year less pay.

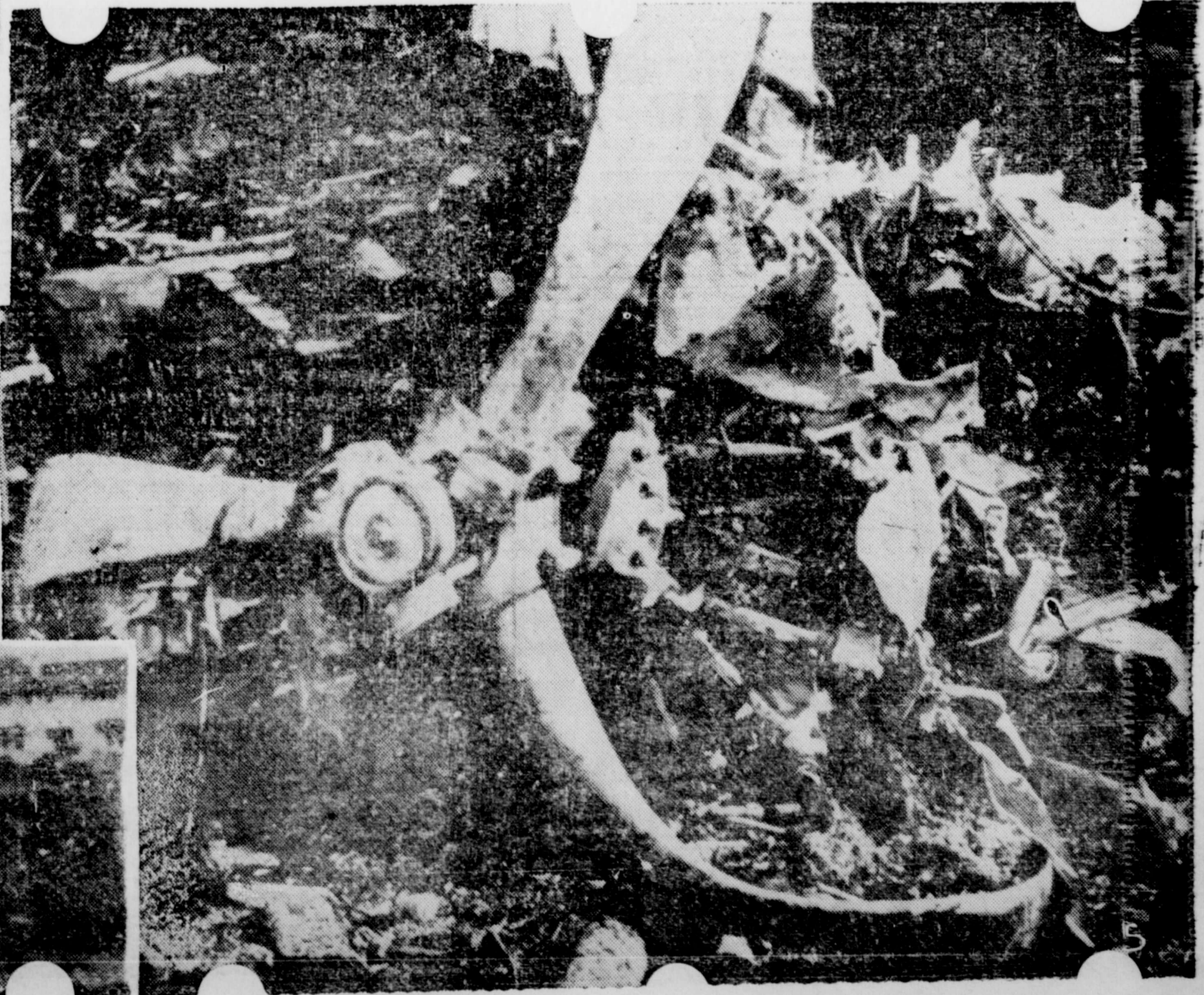

A high military spokesman today warned that Germany has 8,000,000 men under arms. No numerical restrictions, he said, should be placed on the War Department at this time.

WASHINGTON.—President Roosevelt today signed the \$10,000,000 supplemental war appropriation bill. It is third largest in U. S. history, exceeded only by the first war appropriation measure this year; and by a World War appropriation.

The new bill funnels \$1,500,000,000 to the U. S. allies, sends the rest of it into all branches of the war effort.

WASHINGTON.—After the current rush is over, volunteer Army enlistments will be closed and men thereafter will be secured under selective service, Secretary of War Stimson said today.

This will be done, he said, so there will be a minimum of disruption to the nation's economic and domestic life, and its industrial production.

WASHINGTON.—Secretary Stimson said today that the four U. S. Army Air Corps interceptor command headquarters over the U. S. would be made solely responsible for blackouts, air raid warnings and for cutting radio stations off the air. There must be a minimum of interference with U. S. production, he said.

WASHINGTON.—Secretary Stimson disclosed today that the commander of the First Army Air force at Mitchell Field, N. Y., has been missing since December 12.

He, with other officers of the General Staff and of Mitchell and March fields, were on an inspection trip. They were last seen south of Palmdale, Calif. March field is in California.

AUSTIN.—Col. E. O. Thompson, Texas Railroad Commission head, said today the war would last six years. Discovery of new oil fields and reserves will become important, he predicted.

HOLLYWOOD.—In times of war and worry folks like to get in huddles, which means the square dance is coming back, according to Arthur Murray, dancing teacher.




