

An oil well which is attracting considerable attention and which promises to be one of the best in that part of the Ranger field was brought in shortly before noon Thursday by O. H. Chapman on the T. J. Adams farm, seven and one-half miles north of Ranger on the Caddo road. The first showing of oil was found at 3,565 in a black lime formation. Drilling was continued through alternate stratas of black lime and sand until at around 3,600 a black sand was encountered, from which the well is now flowing by heads of thirty minutes duration, each flow being good for around 400 barrels, according to reports of interested parties just in from the well. The exact production cannot be judged accurately as yet, but every indication points to an extra good one. Mr. Chap-man has other wells drilling on this tract of 328 acres. The Gladstone company has a well close on the west, also the Sallie Lane is close by, a comple-tion by the Humble people.
