# SEIZE OIL LANDS OF ALL

WASHINGTON, Sept. 20.—Further testimony intended to show Mexico's determination to force forfeiture of oil lands owned by foreigners was given today by Ira Jewel Williams, a Philadelphia lawyer and an offi cial of the Panuco Oil company, before the senate com mittee investigating the Mexican situation. Two of the company's properties have been denounced by Mexicans under provisions of Carranza's oil decree. Williams declared that Americans who remained at work had realized the necessity of maintaining uninterrupted flow of

the oil for the allied navy. "Eleven of these men," he said, "have paid the supreme sacrifice.

Government patrols as well as rebel bands contribute to the disorder of the county, Williams said. Before shipments of money for the payroll are sent an xact statement of the amount is demanded by the gov ernment officials. There have been cases, he said, where the amounts demanded by the bandits were exactly the same as those reported to the authority.

# ROCKPORT STILL CUT OFF

CORPUS CHRISTI, Sept. 20.—With all relief measures progressing smoothly it was declared today that probably two weeks would find the storm-devasted area of Corpus Christi cleared of wreckage left by last Sunday's tidal wave.

Search for the bodies of additional victims continued today across Neuces bay in the White Point section, where presons directing the work believed many bedies will be found under the wreckage on and near

The only hope officials see of the death list not exceeding 500 is in the probability that there have been a number of duplications due to more than one report made on bodies found and buried in a certain section. The known dead, according to the official list compiled by the relief committee, stood at 386 today, as there were no reports from searchers since last night. Results of today's hunt will not be available until evening. Efforts to ascertain the probable number of northern and eastern persons visiting here when the storm struck has brought out the fact that there probably were 5,000 fewer people here than there were at the height of the summer tourist season. The winter season had not set in and this accounts for the preponderance of names of Corpus Christi's prominent citizens. This, too, increases the burden upon the city, as most of the destitute have no other place to go and must stay here.

> It would be a discouraging occupation, this survey of our physical disabilities, if it were not for the fact that in most instances they result from carelessness or ignorance rather than necessity.

This is obvious, for instance, in the case of defective teeth. There may be some excuse for the vacancies in one's mouth, but certainly there is none for the neglect of one's teeth. Tens of thousands of men were disqualified for this cause. Many of them had more decayed than good teeth. Many mouths were filled with snags and blackened disintegrating stumps and diseased gums.

Bad teeth are not only a source of great discomfort but are an actual menace to health. They cause innumerable troubles, both near and remote. Bad teeth prevent proper mastication of food which is the first requisite of good digestion. The teeth are placed in the vestibule of the digestive apparatus and were not intended entirely for their cosmetic effect. Many people use them like the girl in the tooth-powder advertisements-only for ornamental purposes. A great number of us bolt our food whole washing it down with water or coffee or milk forgetting that if we do not use them our teeth will not always be an ornament. Disuse brings indigestion and dental decay.

One hears of focal infection quite often now even in general conversation. Figuratively speaking, pyorrhea seems to be in everyone's mouth Bad teeth are a common cause of focal infection, because the pus which forms about their roots is absorbed and causes much general disturbance, not the least of which is arthritis, or inflammation of the joints. It is not at all unusual nowadays for one to go to his dentist to be treated for rheumatism. Even apparently good teeth may be infected at their roots, causing many forms of severe but obscure illness.

In these days, when dentistry has become a fine art, and in the United States, where it has reached nearer perfection than in any other country, specific directions for the care of the teeth may not be considered necessary. In general it may be said that they should be used, should be kept clean, cavities should be filled, defects removed - and finally that they should be discarded when they become useless and a menace to health .- Saturday Evening Post.

The call for the meeting, issued by F. C Weinert, state warehouse and market commissioner, called attention to the "demoralized condition of mar keting" which has existed "since the food administration relinquished su pervision over cotton seed and cotton seed products."
