Says Huns Are Depotting Huns

BERLIN, Oct. 3.—The German government will shortly be presented with a bill for \$10,000,000,000 by former colonial subjects whose property has been handed over to the entente, together with the colonies themselves. How to liquidate this enormous claim after settling a staggering indemnity with France and Belgium is a problem that is giving the wise heads of Germany considerable worry.

A special committee of the national assembly is to be given the first opportunity to find a solution and it probably will recommend payments by easy installments. Meanwhile official Germany probably is hoping that some of the colonies will be handed back and the colonial office continues its existence, ready to receive them.

The Porosina company, the German Colonial Mining company, the German Diamond company, the East Africa company, the New Guinea company and the German South Sea Trading & Plantation company demand the lion's share of the colonial indemnity claims, according to Dr. Meyer-Gerhardt, chief colonial administrator under Minister Johannes Bell. Their demands are to include claims for future earnings that would have been realized if the colonies had remained German.

In addition to the large amounts of thousands of individuals engaged in commercial and agricultural undertakings in the German colonies will request reimbursement for losses. Southwest Africa alone furnishes a list of 17,000. East Africa has 6,000. Kamerun has 4,000 and Togo 1,000. Altogether about 70,000 Germans were domiciled in the last colonies.

Of these territories, Dr. Meyer-Gerhardt says, Germany expects to receive East Africa, Togo and Kamerun back.

"None of the entente nations are particularly interested in keeping them," he said. "The time will come when the entente will realize the fallacy of depriving us of all our colonial possessions. Germany simply cannot exist without colonies."

To the permanent loss of Southwest Africa and the South Pacific possessions Germany is reconciled, Dr. Meyer-Gerhardt said.

Dr. Meyer-Gerhardt shared the opinion of Austria, says the German press, that the annexation of these territories for us to expect their return," he said.

WACO, Oct. 3.—A party of 125 of Mexico's leading business men will visit Waco soon, probably during the Texas Cotton Palace, which is held October 25 to November 9, according to A. I. Bunge, general manager of the Waco chamber of commerce.

The purpose of the visit to Texas by these representatives of business and financial interests in the south-western republic is to study farming conditions in Texas with a view of improving agriculture in Mexico.

Other cities included in the itinerary of the party, Mr. Bunge says, are Dallas, El Paso, Fort Worth, San Antonio, Galveston, Texas, and New Orleans, La.

Livestock Loss in Coast Storm Heavy

FORT WORTH, Oct. 3.—Some indication of the damage to crops, ranches and livestock by the recent tropical hurricane which devastated Corpus Christi and other ports is shown in reports received by E. B. Spillers, secretary-manager of the Texas Cattlemen's association, from inspectors at points not far from the gulf coast.

Rainfall at Alice, the heaviest reported, totaled between fifteen and twenty inches in twenty-four hours. At Victoria eight inches was recorded, while at Beeville nine inches fell.

The Alice inspector reports that the greatest storm damage was to windmills, three-fourths of which were blown down. Half of the cotton still in the fields was a total loss. The Kingsville inspector reports that all windmills there were blown down and all crops ruined.

About 400 cattle and some horses were lost in the vicinity of McAllen. In many parts of the cattle country farther removed from the coast range conditions were greatly benefited by the heavy rains.

Rev. H. M. Peebles Resigns Pastorate; Leaves for Anson

His resignation having become effective October 1, Rev. H. M. Peebles, pastor of the First Presbyterian church, with his family, leaves over the Sunshine Special this evening for Anson, where he will become pastor of the Presbyterian church.

After a pastorate of eighteen months in Ranger, during which time the church has experienced a wonderful growth, he reluctantly tendered his resignation to the official board upon the insistent call of the Anson membership. Prior to coming to Ranger he was for six years pastor of the church at Baird. He has been identified with all public movements in the city since he embarked in Ranger's ministerial life. He was chairman of the public library board, president of the social service bureau and assistant scoutmaster of the Boy Scouts.

Rev. Peebles, particularly distinguished himself during the influenza epidemic in Ranger last winter, having been a tireless worker with physicians in comforting those who were ill. Not alone was he a leader in charitable work, but he was an assiduous worker in the church of which he was pastor. He conducted funeral services for fifty-three persons, married twenty-four couples and visited nearly all the sick of Ranger and vicinity during the last eighteen months. He was not so much given to mirroring with the well as to be present to comfort the ill. The members of the church has been treating his pastorate; the activities of the church have been more forceful and extensive and the lives of many have been transformed under his preaching and exemplary life.

The Anson church to which Rev. Peebles has been called, he believes, offers him a more resourceful work. The church has been well established. It has adequate plant and a six-room manse for the pastor's family. The membership is around 140 and the workers are zealous and cooperative in the work of the pastor. Rev. Peebles declared he had spent many pleasant hours in the office of his Master here and that he was leaving, but the church was not yet been selected. The place will be filled upon the resignation of the pastor to be subsequently filled. Mr. Call-Denton will supply the pulpit Sunday. He is recognized as an earnest preacher, a ready and gifted minister and a fearless, tireless church leader and pastor.

The Entire Leather Industry is Based on a "By-Product"

Hides are distinctively a "by-product," and do not follow the ordinary operation of the law of supply and demand.

It happens to be a fact beyond the control of the tanners and shoe manufacturers that during many years past the per capita consumption of beef has DECREASED, while the per capita consumption of leather has INCREASED. As the condition prevailed to a greater and greater extent continuously, it naturally threw the price of hides away up.

The Slaughter of Cattle Has Decreased

The accompanying table, compiled by the U. S. Government, very clearly shows how the slaughter of cattle has decreased while the population of the country has increased.

As hides become more and more scarce and the demand for leather products becomes more insistent, it is only natural that the price of hides should mount higher and higher. This, in turn, raises the price all along the line. It is an inevitable chain of unavoidable conditions for which no human agency is to blame.
