

MINERS AND OPERATORS REFUSE ALL PROPOSALS AT MEDIATION MADE BY THE SECRETARY OF LABOR

FIVE COMPLETED WELLS TOTAL 2,350 BARRELS BOYD NO. 3 IS DUE SOON

Markham and Tidal Oil company's Copeland No. 21 is making 500 barrels from the lime from 3,370 to 3,380 feet.

Texas Pacific Coal & Oil company's Butler No. 11 is producing 500 barrels, with twenty feet of sand, from 3,430 to 3,450 feet.

Sinclair Gulf's W. T. Davis No. 2 is now at 900 barrels, only three feet in the lime and drilling is held up.

Magnolia's Connellee No. 8 is a recent addition, making 200 barrels. The sand about parallels that in No. 4, which runs from 3,424 to 3,440 feet.

The Texas company will have a fourth well on the W. T. Boyd within a week; No. 3 is running 6 1/2 inch casing on top the lime at 3255 feet.

Cody No. 6, in the South Caddo district, which was shot through a shallow pay from 2261 to 2291 feet, will go ahead.

J. E. Barnes No. 1 of the Sinclair, an old gasser, which later blew into a small producer, will be drilled this afternoon.

OBREGON AND CARRANZA ARE NOW ESTRANGED

WASHINGTON, Oct. 24.—General Alvaro Obregon, candidate for president of Mexico at the election next year, has a working majority in the House of Deputies, according to Mexico City advices today, and the movement to withdraw from President Carranza the extraordinary powers granted him, has drawn the line definitely between the Obregonists and the Carrancistas.

Obregon is claiming 120 votes against fifty-six Carrancista votes. The attitude of thirty members is not known.

TRENCH GUNS USED BY TROOPS NOW AT GARY

CHICAGO, Oct. 24.—Federal troops at Gary, Ind., today patrolled the streets with trench guns of the sawed-off shotgun type. They were equipped with them after Colonel Mapes, commanding the strike army under military control, received reports that infantrymen had been armed by strike sympathizers.

## HUMBLE CO. HAS A MODEL TOWN NEAR CISCO

CISCO, Oct. 24.—Construction work is being pushed at a rapid rate at the Humble Oil & Refining company's Cisco plant. Several big buildings of various designs are completed and a large crew of carpenters are engaged in erecting sixty modern bungalows which will be equipped with every known convenience to be found in such buildings in the heart of a big city. These bungalows will be occupied by employees with families. Single men who work for the company will be furnished accommodations in commodious well ventilated houses also provided with such accommodations as are being built for the married employees. A standard sewer, gas and electric light system is being built as rapidly as scores of workmen can do the work. This new city which is known as "Hambletown" is situated on a towering eminence one and one-half miles east of the city and a splendid view of this city is had. An abundance of excellent artesian water has been found and pumps are running day and night furnishing necessary water for the new city. Gas will be furnished from the company's Sheer well eight miles south of this city. A ten thousand dollar weekly pay roll is maintained at this time. Much landscaping has been done and within the next few months a real beautiful city with concrete walks, curbs and paved streets will be completed for the enjoyment of the hundreds of employees and their families.

## THREE NEW PROJECTS REPORTED AT DESDEMONA

Five was located in the Comanche Northern Oil and Development company's D. R. Carruth No. 2, at 2730 feet and the well has been closed down for orders. It is said the well is making forty million cubic feet of gas and 250 barrels of oil, which is increasing.

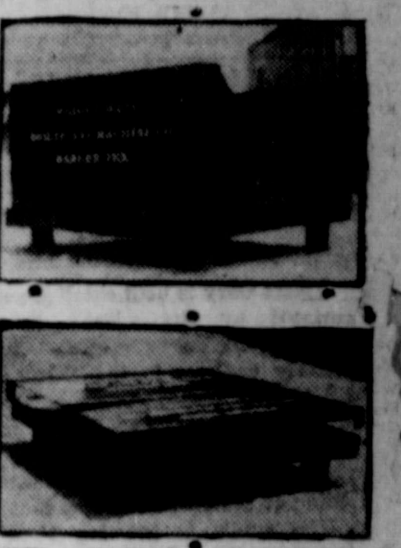

\$40,000 WORTH OF LOTS SOLD IN THIS CITY

Eff Perry Butler yesterday announced at the third day of lot sales in Mountain View addition that more than \$40,000 worth of lots had been sold in the three days that the sale had gone on, despite the fact that the first two days were inclement and the crowds restricted. Yesterday probably two hundred persons were present.

Eff Perry Butler announced from the stand that in the three days, despite very bad weather, \$40,000 worth of lots had been sold. Some of these have already advanced in price, but new owners refuse to part with them.

Auctioneer Dayfield was again on the job yesterday. He is on the staff that exceptional commercial enterprises are made of. In a brief talk he assured his auditors that they could afford to make an investment of a few hundred dollars in Mountain View property.

The company has just sold a long line of blocks facing Terrell Boulevard—the cutoff between the Sinclair Oil company's headquarters and the Caddo road—on which the purchasers purpose to erect at once a large number of beautiful and attractive dwellings. Property on the east side of the hill paralleling the Caddo road and opposite the main properties of the Mountain View addition has been recently sold. The hillside is clad with beautiful oaks and winding trails to the apex. A rockcrusher is working on top of the hill.

Quite a contrast was to be noticed between the mud of the downtown district and the packed sand at Mountain View. One could walk about anywhere in the new addition with impunity and not soil clothes or get clinging, oozy mud on the feet. With the exception of a small clump of live oaks at the northeast corner of the tract and upon the hillside to the west, the tract of land is treeless. The sand slopes to the east with a gradual sweep which precludes the accumulation of water on any part of it. The grade of the Wichita Falls, Ranger and Fort Worth railroad may be seen just north of the addition, running into the picturesque cove to the northwest through which there will be immense traffic on both railroad and highway. The latter is one of the arteries of the county upon which \$21,000 a mile is to be expended, making it one of the best highways in the entire state.
