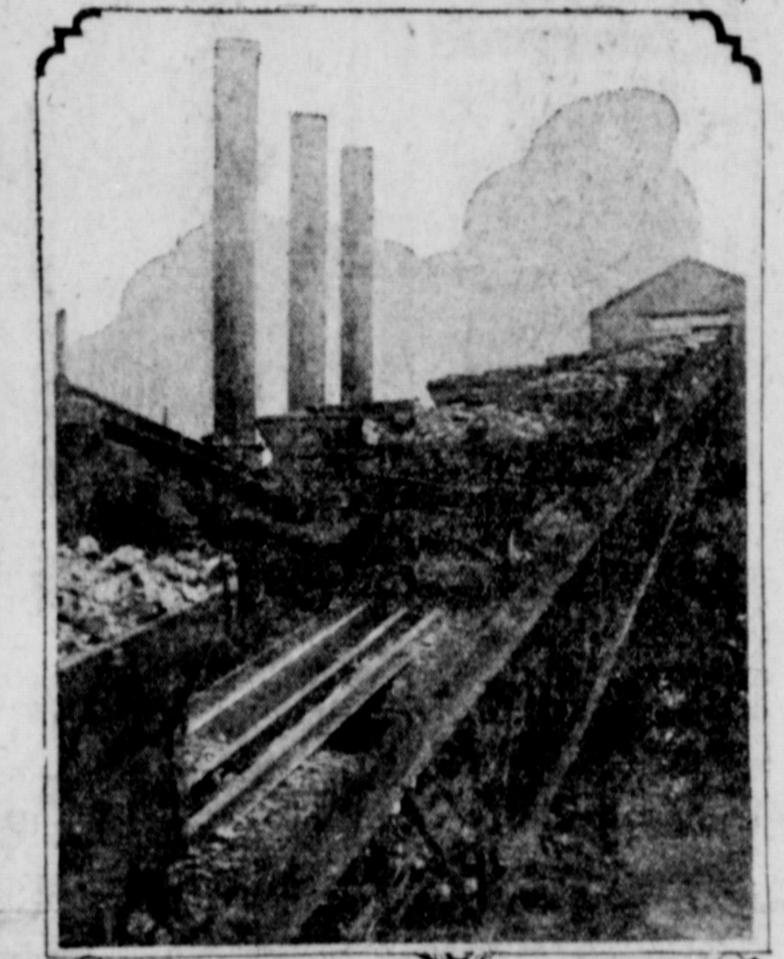
RAILROADS SAY THEY ARE NOT CONFISCATING

TEXAS ARKANSAS NO. 1 MAKING 1,400 BARRELS; ANOTHER HOLLEMAN 500

NEW WELL A WALLOWER. Magnolia's J. M. Turner No. 2, the first completion on the tract, nicked the sand at 3,502 feet this morning, started in at 2,000 barrels and now, according to reports from the Magnolia office at Olden, has blown into a 5,000-barrel well. It is making eight inches every quarter hour in the flow tank.

Texas Arkansas Oil company today kicked in fourth big well on the Brooks heirs, their No. 1, which is in the upper pay as yet, but is doing 1,400 barrels, and to 3,351 feet. Ranger Central Oil company, with the well immediately preceding the Tex Ark, found the heavy pay at 3,542 feet, after getting 800 barrels from the upper pay. The tract, which is subdivided into eight and ten-acre making better than eight thousand barrels. Air Tex Oil company, on the Brooks, is drilling black lime at 3,310 feet, not yet into the upper pay, and is making 100 barrels.

# TRAVELING WEST, YOUNG MAN? THEN PREPARE TO ANTE A QUARTER OR A DIME AT RANGER'S TOLL-GATE

Until the city fills in the morass which exists on West Main street, near the Eureka Tool company, it will cost you a dime to enter or leave Ranger on the west, a quarter if you drive a truck, or a dollar for a permanent pass.

The operators of the scheme say that the contribution is voluntary, but drivers who have had occasion to pass say it's no more a free will offering than the income tax. But for their ingenuity, they deserve no criticism. They deserve, rather, appreciation for taking advantage of Dame Nature's kindness and the laxity or poverty of the city administration and the street commissioner.

A toll bridge is in operation in Ranger. If you cross you are asked to pay a dime. It's a fact, as many persons, who have had occasion to cross this bridge in the past two days will testify. Since the repeal of the famous toll-gate law of Kentucky, this most open and frank of all hold-up schemes has fallen into disrepute. But some citizens of Ranger revived it and are now doing a thriving business.

Persons trying to enter Ranger from the Eastland road find Main street, a couple of blocks west of the postoffice, impassable. A car driver dare not venture down Pine street, south of Main, if his car is heavy enough to sink. Part of Pine street resembles a lake, and in fact it is a lake of mud and water. The alley leading south to Mesquite street is not navigable. The only way to get into town is to go north, through Hodges Oak Park addition, and turn east through the Rice addition.

In the road leading through the Rice property, and it is not a public highway, is a deep ditch. Trucks and cars have been sticking in this ditch at all times of the day and night and waking the inhabitants or nearby residents of the neighborhood. Some look the matter into their own hands and put a narrow bridge across the ditch and stationed a man at the bridge to collect from all who passed. Some were willing to give R. Hazelwood, Hugh H. Russell and A. Rice, one of the Rice land, sponsored the "cement."

### Cisco Postoffice Needs More Room

CISCO, Nov. 5.—Postmaster R. A. St. John of this city says the business of his office is increasing each day and with the number of clerks and other help furnished him the work is compelled to lag. The Cisco post office is new, and has been for a number of years an all night office arranged for the purpose of taking care of large amount of registered mail that comes to this office in transit to be locked an ever night for day transportation to destination. This and other work assigned to the Cisco office requires two night clerks who go off duty at 7 a. m. The mail received here since the oil boom has simply swamped this office. Postmaster St. John is continuously petitioning the department for more help and increased wages in order to be of good help. The last request needed

by the department was for the expense of a janitor to clean the post office and keep building in a sanitary condition. St. John is keeping his 20,000 for a new post office building constantly before the Washington officials.

## Much Interest at Cisco in Opening of Leeray Town

CISCO, Nov. 5.—The formal opening of the first new townsite at Leeray twelve miles northeast from Cisco which will be due next Monday November 10th, is attracting much interest among Cisco people.

Leeray townsite will be located in Stephens county, a very prosperous agricultural section of that county and within a few miles of the edge of the big Stephens oil fields. This will be the first town to be built up anew on the new Cisco-Northeastern railroad which is being rapidly built from Cisco to the Caddo and Breckenridge oil fields.

R. Q. Lee, president of the new rail road of this city, says that he feels confident that trains will be running from this city as far as Leeray by December first this year. Lee says that he is receiving new equipment every day. Ties and steel rails are being shipped as fast as present railroad congested traffic conditions will permit. A large representative bunch of citizens from this city will visit Leeray next Monday to witness the beginning of the new neighbor city.

### DR. GREGORY'S MEDICAL OFFICE

CISCO, Nov. 5.—Dr. Joseph Gregory of this city was sworn in as City Health Officer of Cisco a few days ago. The doctor was recommended to the City Commission by the local board of health some weeks ago, but did not accept the position for a time awaiting the final adoption of sanitary and health ordinances that the City Commission and local health board were formulating.

Dr. Gregory has been a citizen of this city for eight years and was chosen to this health office by the city commission and health board upon the record he has made since his citizenship here for a clean and beautiful city. The newly sworn health officer outlined a course which will govern him in his official duties. He promises many improvements in the sanitary and health lines as soon as he can get the legal machinery being now arranged ready for work.

### FAMED MONUMENT OF SHIKELLIMY MUST GO

HARRISBURG, Nov. 4.—Again the Indians must make way for the trend of civilization. At one time he was free to roam over all of this country—it was his—but now even his monument must go. the memory of Shikellimy, who helped the tribes of the Susquehanna Valley.

### CISCO RE-FONDS FAST TO RED CROSS APPEAL

CISCO, Nov. 5.—Local Red Cross workers began work to raise this city's expected allotment for the annual donation to the American Red Cross Society Monday morning. The workers report a hearty response from the part of the citizens. The workers are stationed at many public places where people assemble and a pedestrian would be called extremely lucky to miss being approached by one of the solicitors should the pedestrian be inclined whatever to dodge the issue.

### BECOMES WATER SUPERVISOR

CISCO, Nov. 5.—J. T. Starvo, who has been night watchman in this city for the past three years has been appointed as General Water Service Supervisor by Mayor Williamson and has assumed the duties of the office. Stamps will have charge of several departments in the water service recently erected since the boom came to this city.

### DAILY TEXAN WILL BE A MORNING PAPER NOW

AUSTIN, Nov. 5.—The Daily Texan, the official newspaper of the University of Texas students, will change to a morning paper as soon as arrangements can be made. The sheet has been printed afternoons. The action is taken following the decision of the students' assembly of the university.

### SHAMROCK MAN SLEEPS FIVE DAYS; STILL ASLEEP

SHAMROCK, Nov. 5.—J. M. Woodley, a prominent pioneer of this section, has the sleeping disease. For five days and nights he has been asleep and all attempts to awake him have been without avail. ### SAN SABA FEELS CONFIDENT BIG WELLS ARE DUE

SAN SABA, Nov. 5.—Speaking of "Wild Cats," history proves that the greatest number of Millionaires in the world were Wild-Catters of some species, before they were millionaires. San Saba county has been very averse to this method of procedure all alone, protesting that there was enough wealth in sight or on the surface, if developed, to keep one busy, without delving into the mysteries of Mother Earth. This is perhaps true, at the same time geologists for years have conceded to this section great possibilities in the way of hidden treasure, retaining but the magical word of Commerce to reveal the abundant wealth.

That day has arrived and now is when "Wild-Catting" with enormous possibilities is developing all along the verdant valley.

There are several drilling companies in operation. These have been delayed by bad weather conditions, but with the coming of fair weather, business is going to be lively in the several respective localities.

The well that has attained the greatest depth, and in attracting most attention, is the one owned by the Royal Duke Oil Co. near Richard Springs in the northwestern part of the county.

This well has reached a depth of 1,000 feet, and the formations have been found, which look so encouraging to oil men, that it has caused an active raise in leases.

It is not possible as yet to give anything more than that the Royal Duke Oil Co. believe they are on a rich trail, and they have the reputation of getting what they go after.

At the Martin well ten miles north of San Saba where operations were closed down some time ago, preparations are being made to resume work. W. U. Campbell, a well known driller, has arrived, and is arranging to strike the first day that he can get over the roads.

From the Bend section on the Colorado river in the eastern part of the county, a section which has favorably mentioned in the Review of Texas Geology, 1916, page 45 N. B. "The lower Bend shale is a formation noted by Udden, immediately overlying the Ordovician in the region south and east in San Saba County."

A late report from this section says: "Oil interests in this locality are just now, owing to the fact that this is a bumper crop and next year, and upon scarce the Bend people were never quite so busy as now reaping the harvest already in sight."

The Russell Well No. 1, about 200 miles from here in Lampasas Co. has just finished setting casing to cut off water. Oil men are watching this well with interest.

Key Well No. 1 in Lampasas county, just across the river is shut down, owing to bad weather.

The ultimatum is if oil is found at these three angles, it would prove to the several geologists theories, that there is a large pool of oil in San Saba county.

The county is mostly Pennsylvanian formation, the river roughly marking the southern boundary.

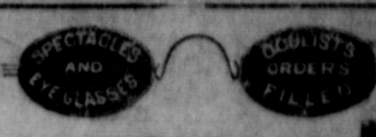

Dr. Carl Wilson; Treasurer, Dr.  
Rutherford.

It is the intent of the Ranger Medi-  
cal Society to work in cooperation  
with the Eastland County Medical  
Society, the Texas State Medical  
Association, the American Medical  
Association and the state and United  
States Public Health Service, and to  
be governed by the laws and by-laws  
of these organizations, which shall  
not conflict in any particular with the

associations. A committee, Dr. C. H.

# CONTRACT LET FOR CHURCH TO COST \$100,000

The contract for the new Methodist church building was awarded yesterday to Moore & Co. of Ranger, who are also contractors for the Baptist church, now under construction, and the Baptist church at Strawn. The building is to cost \$100,000.

The church will be located on Elm street, a half block west of Marston. The lot is 140 by 198 feet and the building will be 81 by 120 feet, of classical design and constructed of white brick with four marble columns in front.

The plans call for a social room in the basement, a beginners' department with an assembly room and three class rooms; a primary department with an assembly room and three class rooms, and a junior department with an assembly room and eight class rooms. A library and reading room, shower baths, a mothers' rest room and a kitchen and dumb waiter will be located in the basement.

On the main floor an auditorium fifty-two feet square will be located. An adult department with six class rooms and a young people's department with an assembly room and six class rooms and an office are features on this floor. The pastor's study, a sewing room, a dining room and a kitchen, with a dumb waiter from the basement complete the third floor.

On the third floor is the intermediate department, with four class rooms and the senior department with three class rooms. A ladies' parlor, a sewing room, a dining room and a kitchen, with a dumb waiter from the basement complete the third floor.

The building will have a seating capacity of 1,400. It will be so constructed that all partitions may be removed, giving an unobstructed view of the pulpit from all parts of the house. Nobody will be behind a pulpit or around a corner from the speaker.

The architect for the building is R. H. Hunt, of Dallas. According to Mr. Moore, excavation will begin this week. With reasonably good weather the church should be finished within six months.

We don't mean just stick it together—camouflage it—but to make the welded crank or transmission case as strong or stronger than a new one and not warp it. This has now been overcome. Modern science and welders who think while they work have conquered these difficulties so that a well equipped welder who never uses the expression can handle a transmission case that are wrecked and pulled out of chunks gone at the break when they are finished straight and stronger than when they were first made.

If you want a job of weld you want a good job. It don't pay to trust this amateurs—you know this.
