ATLANTA, Ga., Nov. 7.—Three lives were lost and a score of persons injured, several seriously, in a fire at the Wilson Hotel today.

HELINGSFORS, Nov. 7.—A Bolshevik report through German sources says that 630 of 1,969 of the inmates at Kresny prison at Petrograd had died of starvation.

### Allies May Seek to Solve Russian and Turkish Cases

PARIS, Nov. 7.—It now seems generally agreed that the Supreme Council cannot take definite action looking toward a settlement of the future of Russia and Turkey, but the opinion is held that a special conference will be called later to dispose of the Turkish question.

### Main Holds Up Street Paving and Grading Plans

It has stopped the work of laying out Main street, which had been as far as the intersection of Main and Austin streets. The tar has been spread up to the intersection.

Work grading city streets also has been held up. Since Monday teams have been at work, and the road to the Airie Oil & Gas company offices and the Sinclair Gulf office, have been in good shape. City Manager Turner said that teams would have started today on filling the hole on East Main street, near the Eureka Oil company, but rain held up the work.

The sanitary company's problem has been complicated by the unwillingness of W. W. Wallace to take care of garbage from cafes. He has been hauling this refuse, for use for fuel. The practise of the cafes of using broken glass and crockery for fuel has made the garbage un-usable for feeding. The sanitary company has the end of the waste problem.

Work is at work and the committee every effort to get on, City Manager Turner.

## James J. Jenkins Jr. Charges and Collects \$150 Rental for American Legion Quarters

Philanthropy and public spiritedness, according to accepted theory, bring only the reward of a contented spirit. Money sacrificed in helping others brings richer rewards in peace of heart, the story goes.

But here's one who can put philanthropy on a dividend paying basis. Part of the building at Marston and Mesquite streets, owned by James J. Jenkins Jr., was offered to the American Legion for use as a meeting place.

The ex-service men have used it. They showed their appreciation by making James J. Jenkins Jr., an honorary member of the legion.

James J. Jenkins Jr., was strongly instrumental in the organization of the legion and in a tag day which netted the boys something over \$300. Half of that amount was paid yesterday to James J. Jenkins Jr. for rent.

"Why shouldn't I get it?" queried James J. Jenkins Jr. "The boys have got it and I helped raise it."

Anyway, the bill was paid, and this letter was dispatched with the check: "We, the undersigned members of the executive committee of the American Legion, have decided that in view of the high rental asked by you for our present quarters, we cannot, in the best interests of the membership, continue to use the room as permanent quarters."

Signed: George T. Hemmingson, R. H. Hansford, R. W. Knobelsdorff, W. E. Skinner.

The legion has used the room for its weekly meetings two months since James J. Jenkins announced the rental idea, and two months before. At \$75 a month, the charge amounts to \$18.75

a meeting; at \$37.50 a month, \$9.37 1/2 a meeting. The same room was offered for use of the Ranger Public library, which James J. Jenkins Jr. was largely instrumental in getting started. Through his efforts, volumes from the state library, board and the American Library Association, were secured. Now Mr. Jenkins asks that \$75 a month be paid to James J. Jenkins Jr. for the room.

The same room also is used by the city free clinic. For this, James J. Jenkins Jr. receives \$20 a month.

James J. Jenkins has received approving comment for his public spiritedness in offering the use of his building for the American Legion and for the Ranger library. But in addition, he apparently has plans for a neat financial return from these excursions into the land of philanthropy.

### 17 Locations Are Made at Sipe Spgs.

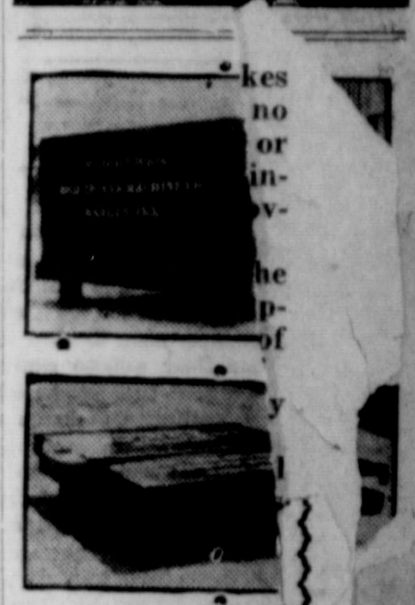

# Salvation Army Drive for \$30,000 to Build Local Community House and to Support Army Corps, Starts Nov. 17

The postponed "community house" campaign of the Salvation Army will be carried out in the period between Nov. 17 and 22, when the sum of \$30,000 will be sought to found such a community center institution here and to provide a fund for the maintenance of a corps of army workers, according to announcement made Thursday by State Organizer Evans, who will remain in the city to superintend preliminaries and oversee the solicitation work.

**Corps Coming.**  
 Upon insistent request of local citizens that a corps of army workers be sent here, Col. George Wood, in charge of the "drive" in several southwestern states, has announced that such a group of workers will be dispatched here during the drive to facilitate the work. The scarcity of trained workers has necessitated postponement of the campaign for the community house.

"During the period between Nov. 17 and 22 the corps with assistance of citizens will raise the sum of \$30,000 for the community house and to support a corps of aggressive workers in this city," said Organizer Evans yesterday.

**Ranger Needs It.**  
 "Ranger needs such an institution. No one doubts that it is a fertile field for such an establishment. A place for the people to go and read, rest and enjoy light games, and divisions will be provided. Most of the citizens with whom I have spoken

in regard to the proposed building are very enthusiastic and declare that it is just the thing for Ranger, that it would fill a need here that nothing could so amply fill," declared Mr. Evans.

**Starts Great Work.**  
 "In connection with the community house which will be built from the offerings of the people, we propose to maintain here every day in the year a group of live Salvation Army workers, who will see after the community house and will conduct services daily in the auditorium of the new institution. Every service the Salvation Army can render to the people, to the homeless, to the stranded, to the drunkard and to the friendless will be done, so that its work will remain gilded in the hearts of the people.

**Offerings Wanted.**  
 "We trust that the people will get ready for the campaign and will contribute as largely as possible to the efforts which are being made to make Ranger the first city in West Texas to get a modern community house. No other investment of the people could be made with promise of greater dividend. This city stands in need of it, and we purpose to give it to them if they will only do their part by the Salvation Army, where, as yet, no funds have been collected for the work.

"Every dollar entrusted to the army during the drive will be employed in making possible the new institution and in supporting the corps of workers for Ranger."

**Was Postponed.**  
 The campaign to raise a small sum of money in Ranger a few weeks ago in the national Salvation Army drive was postponed because of adverse weather conditions, inability to secure S. A. corps, and the waging of the campaign in other parts of the county. The new campaign is for Ranger solely. All money raised to be expended locally.

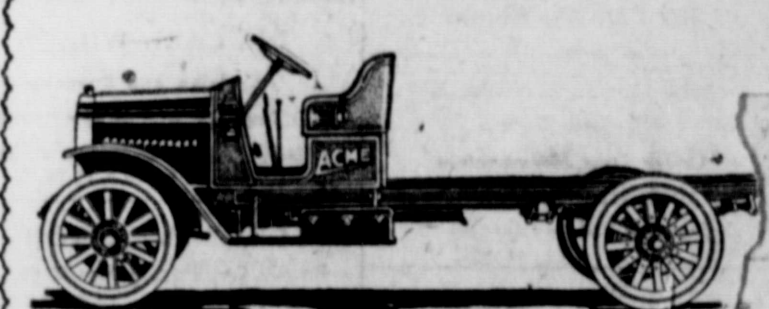
