Nation-Wide "Red" Plot Nipped in Bud by Arrest of 500 Radicals

ANNIVERSARY OF RUSS **GOVERNMENT BY RIOTS**

(By The Associated Press.)

Over 350 alleged radicals, who are said to have plotted violent demonstrations throughout the country today in commemoration of the second anniversary of the Russian Soviet government, were in the hands of federal authorities today awaiting deportation or such action as may be taken against them.

About 500 men and women are suspected of being implicated in the plot and were seized last night in a series of swift raids in fourteen cities.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 8.-The deportation of all aliens engaged in "Red" activities has been determined upon by the Department of Justice, Attorney General Palmer announced today.

Details of the widespread cleanup last night and today show that over 200 have been arrested in eighteen cities. Attorney General Palmer has asked the justice department to deport everyone of the alleged radicals.

Included in the material and literature seized in last night's raids were quantities of articles used in making bombs, a complete counterfeiting plant, a large supply of counterfeit bank notes and thousands of pieces of literature described as being of the most inflammatory nature and scores of red flags, rifles and revolvers.

Agents of the Department of Justice and the Bureau of Immigration have been collecting evidence as to these particular cases for two months, Palmer said. Practically all of those who have been arrested were Russians.

Operations were centered in Chicago, operatives of the bureau here today said. Over 200 prisoners were taken in the Chicago district and at the same time other hundreds were arrested elsewhere.

Most of the prisoners were arrested at their homes. Circulars, pamphlets and letters were seized which gave details of the proposed celebrations and tended to show that they were distributed from the headquarters of the Industrial Workers of the World here, operatives said.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 8.—Characterizing all strikes as "industrial barbarism" and declaring "there is no place in this country either for industrial despotism or labor despots," the Senate committee authorized to investigate the steel strike today presented its report covering hearings in Washington and Pittsburg.

Criticism of both workers and employers in the controversy which resulted in at least a partial disruption of the steel industry is contained in the report of

The committee's main conclusion, concurred in by all members, is expressed in this statement:

The public has the right to demand that capital shall not arrogate to itself the right to determine in its own way those industrial questions and it is the same as to labor and the duty is on Congress to provide some way of adjusting the difficulties."

As a permnaent preventive against strikes, which the committee concedes "are apparently the only way for labor to secure even just demands in employers refusing to grant them," it is recommended that Congress authorize the establishment of some such mediation agency with well defined powers such as the recently

dissolved war labor board possessed. "This board should have the power of compulsory investigation," the report adds, "but not to the extent of

cempulsory arbitration.'

"A just decision of the board would be endorsed by the public," the report goes on to say. "There's good sense enough in the American people to bring about as adjustment of these difficulties."

The committee members were fairly unanimous in the report, leaving open the points on which they could not agree. The report is signed Kenyon, chairman; Sterling, Phipps, Republicans, and McKellar and Walsh,


