\$1,000,000 Loss in Big Oil Fire FULL ENDORSEMENT IS

# ASHES--1 DEATH KNOWN: LIGHTING IS THE CAUSE

(By The Associated Press.)

WICHITA FALLS, Texas, Nov. 10.—Searchers for bodies delved further today into the ruins of Waggoner City, a small oil town near here, which was completely swept by fire yesterday, and it is believed that scores of persons may have lost their lives.

The property loss is estimated at \$1,000,000. The U fire was started when lightning, during a heavy downpour of rain, struck thirty 1,600-barrel tanks of oil and a stream of burning fluid with a mighty swish poured down the main street of the town, setting fire to everything with which it came in contact.

Men, women and children fled for their lives. The burning oil came down the hill into the town rolling in balls of fire and the terror-stricken population scurried to places of safety. For a time it was thought that every person in the town had perished, but reports today showed that so far as known there is only one death that of an aged man, who has not been identified.

According to the reports received here, the whole of Oklahoma permission to file town is in ashes. There was no means of fighting the fire, and it spread with lightning-like rapidity.

Homeless men, women and children shivered in the River cold at Waggoner City today, huddled in every available March 1. learn whether there is more than one loss of life in the spectacular fire yesterday.

All communication with Waggoner City is virtually severed except vehicle traffic.

# Communists at Berlin in Bad

(By The Associated Press.)

WASHINGTON, Nov. 10.—The American Federation of Labor stood today before the country as an unqualified endorser of the strike of the soft coal miners and as bitterly opposed the action of the government in attempting to end the strike through injunction proceedings, which action it characterized as "so autocratic as to stagger the human mind.'

Indorsement of the strike was announced last night in a statement by the executive council of the federation, which pledged the strikers the full support of organized labor and appealed to the citizenship of the country to give "like endorsement and aid to the men engaged in this momentous struggle."


