COAL STRIKE OFF U. S. ORDER OBEYED

McKenzie Attorney Says Paving Clause Satisfactory

RANGER WILL GO AHEAD WITH PAVING PROGRAM UNDER NEW STATUTES

Ranger will go ahead and pave under chapter 11 of the revised statutes, even if the bond election is invalid, but a new election authorizing the work will be ordered at the meeting of the city board of directors today.

George M. Field of the law firm of Short & Field of Dallas, the McKenzie Construction company of Texas, today stated that the McKenzie company would go ahead with the paving program on a dark day to the commissioners and others of the city administration, who were looking at the world yesterday through the smoked glasses of the opinion of the attorney general's department. It was held by the attorney general's department, that not only was the city bond election invalid, but that Ranger could not adopt chapter 11 of the statutes, providing for street paving, until the city board of directors had adopted the new statutes, after the city board of directors had adopted the new statutes, after the city board of directors had adopted the new statutes.

The attorney general's department has nothing to do with passing on whether a city may adopt statutes already passed by the state legislature," said Judge Fields. "In no way could he (the attorney general) be called upon to render an opinion in this matter."

"No attempt has been made to amend Ranger's charter," Ranger has adopted the state paving law and the city is in a position to take advantage of the provisions of that law."

According to a statement of City Manager Turner, a temporary contract with the McKenzie Construction company will be made, underwritten by prominent men of the city, guaranteeing the McKenzie interests against loss in the work which they will do, pending the reholding of a city bond election. The company already is shipping in supplies and preparing to start operations.

In the bond election, which probably will be authorized at the meeting of the board of commissioners, this afternoon, about the same amount will be asked for street paving as in the former election—\$250,000—which will cover the city's share of the work.

Other divisions of the bond election probably will be:

- Three hundred and fifteen thousand dollars refunding bonds to take up warrants already issued for public improvements, which mature at any time. This money has been spent.
- Twenty thousand dollars to build fire station and purchase site.
- Fifty thousand dollars to construct a city hall.
- Two hundred sixty thousand dollars for street paving.
- Sixty-five thousand dollars to build additional sewers.

Each question will be voted on a separate ballot, as it was on this point that the last election was thrown out.

Ranger is not unique in having a bond issue disapproved. On Friday of last week twelve bond issues were disapproved by the attorney general's department.

The board of commissioners meets at 4 p. m. today.

RETURN OF THE MINERS MAY BE A LITTLE SLOW

INDIANAPOLIS, Nov. 11.—Shortly after the conference had adjourned, Acting President Lewis and Secretary, Treasurer William Green held a long conference in the parlor of the hotel and later Lewis was seen pacing up and down the floor with his head bowed in deep study.

Developments following the conference came rapidly. The recall of the strike order will open the way immediately for the resumption of negotiations as the operators have announced their readiness to consider a new wage agreement at any time the strike order was withdrawn.

It is also understood that the question of arbitration entered largely into the discussions and the miners' position on this subject was not announced. The question of how many operators would obey the order is problematical. In some districts it is considered that the resumption of work will be general, others only partial and in some the return will be very slow.

The order calling off the strike, under the court order, must be on the way to the miners who belong to the union by 6 o'clock tonight.

POWER FAILURE DELAYS RANGER TIMES TODAY

Sand in the fuel oil for the engines used by the Ranger Light and Power company gave the company trouble at 10 o'clock this morning and entailed a shutdown of about three hours.

The Ranger Daily Times was prevented from going to press at once with an extra edition giving its readers the news of the recall of the coal miners. The situation was met by setting the news that the strike was off, in briefest form, by hand and printing it on a hand press, so that Ranger received the news with as much dispatch as any city in Texas.

After a three-hour shutdown, during which valves injured by the sandy oil were ground, the power company resumed its service and The Times, although late, was able to go to press with its regular edition.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Nov. 11.—An order calling off the nationwide bituminous coal strike was to be issued today following the decision of the general committee of the United Mine Workers of America early this morning to obey the mandate of United States District Judge Anderson issued Saturday.

The general committee, composed of the international officers, district presidents, and members of the executive board and scale committee, reached the decision at 4:10 o'clock this morning after seventeen hours of discussion and adjourned five minutes later to reconvene at 2 o'clock this afternoon.

"Gentlemen, we will comply with the mandate of the court. We do it under protest. We are Americans; we cannot fight our government. That is all."

This was the statement of Acting President Lewis of the United Mine Workers, announcing the decision. Other members of the conference, apparently worn out by the long hours of discussion, declined to add anything to the statement of their chief and soon dispersed.

The general committee had been in session since shortly after 10 o'clock yesterday morning, taking only a brief recess for lunch and dinner. The proceedings were interrupted during the afternoon by the appearance of a United States marshal and deputies, who served the thirty-three officials with copies of the temporary injunction issued Saturday and returnable Dec. 1. Writs in the restraining order were made returnable Nov. 20.

During the day approaches to the entrance of the conference hall were carefully guarded by a sergeant at arms, and during the recesses the man remained on guard in the hall, but in the later hours the sergeant disappeared.

Speeches of the mine officials were at times impassioned and rose above the hub-bub of the hotel where the conference was being held, but only a word was now and then distinguishable. The meeting of the officials was behind closed doors. It is understood that all phases of the question were argued and the effect that various actions might have on the organization entered into the discussion, but according to the members, no vote was taken on any subject until the action early today was decided upon.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 11.—Government officials here received with undisguised relief the news of the announcement at Indianapolis that the executives of the United Mine Workers had voted to call off the strike.

In his mandate issued Saturday Federal Judge Anderson demanded that the miners take action on the calling off of the strike by 10 a. m. today and that the order actually be issued to the miners all over the nation by 6 p. m. today.

OIL MAN IS SHOT AT DALLAS: WIFE SOBS OUT STORY

DALLAS, Nov. 11.—Glenn W. Towles, 35, superintendent of a local oil and refining company, was shot and killed at his home here today. His wife, Marguerite, has been taken into custody.

In the county jail, where the woman was taken, pending the filing of murder charges, she sobbed this explanation:

"He said he was going to leave me and before he went away, he intended to kill me. I shot to save my own life."

Towles came here last night from Oklahoma city.

ORDER CALLING OFF THE STRIKE IS APPROVED

INDIANAPOLIS, Nov. 11.—Judge Anderson in Federal Court at 10 o'clock this morning approved the order for the executive board of mine workers calling off the strike. At 11 o'clock for the miners promised to try to have it in the mails by 6 o'clock tonight.

The text of the order follows:

"Dear Sirs and Brothers: In obedience with the mandate issued Nov. 8 by the United States court for the District of Indiana, Judge A. B. Anderson presiding, we, the undersigned, hereby advise you that the order of Oct. 15 directing cessation of operations in the bituminous coal fields under our jurisdiction is withdrawn and cancelled. Yours fraternally, William Green, secretary-treasurer; John L. Lewis, president."

Judge Anderson characterized the order as "good faith" in an effort to comply with his mandate.

OPERATORS AND MINERS ARE TO MEET AT ONCE

WASHINGTON, Nov. 11.—"I shall immediately call the miners and operators together to negotiate a wage agreement," Secretary of Labor Wilson said today after the meeting of the President's cabinet.

Cotton growing is becoming a great industry in this section. The cotton, a superior grade, is being shipped to Japan, where it is made into imitation silk.

Today Epochal in U. S. History

Developments in the strike of 100,000 bituminous coal miners since the first meeting of President Wilson's cabinet Oct. 25, when the first realization came that a walkout was threatened have come thick and fast.

The first meeting of the cabinet was called hurriedly and the question as to what should be done if the miners fulfilled their threat and called the strike Nov. 1 was thoroughly discussed but no aggressive action was taken.

And then on Oct. 29, when President Wilson vetoed the prohibition enforcement act, the miners seized upon his action as meaning that the wage agreement under which they worked during the war was no longer binding and that therefore the strike was justified.

At this time Dr. Garfield, then at Williams College, was summoned to Washington to take charge of the situation which was then becoming acute, and upon his arrival at Washington and after conferring with government officials, he issued a statement in which he declared that the strike could be averted without a walkout.

On Oct. 31, the government, through Federal Judge Anderson, issued an injunction restraining the miners from striking. This action is considered without precedent in the annals of American jurisprudence, and immediately upon learning of this action, the miners through their officials declared that the injunction could not and would not stop the strike.

And then at exactly the time set by their officials, miners in every state in the union went out Nov. 1 and the country was face to face with the most serious situation ever known.

Coincident with the strike of the miners, the railroad brotherhoods issued a statement in which they declared that they heartily endorsed the strike, and that they would lend their best efforts to see it successful.

The government took further action against the striking miners Nov. 5, and the declaration was made that the injunction would not be vacated under any circumstances and that so far as the government was concerned it was a fight to the finish.

A coal famine of growing proportions faced the country Nov. 6. Trains were discontinued in many parts of the Midwest and cities and towns all over the nation began to appeal to the government for coal, saying that their supplies were diminished, and since the railroads were concentrating transit shipments having been ordered to do so by Fuel Administrator Garfield, the situation faced was one of the gravest possibilities.

This followed quickly on the issuance of a mandate by Federal Judge Anderson at Indianapolis Saturday that the strike must be called off by 6 p. m. today, it being stipulated that the officials of the United Mine Workers must take decisive action to that end by 10 a. m. today.

The most sensational developments in the strike came yesterday when it was announced that the officials of the United Mine Workers had agreed to accept the government's offer of a 10 percent wage increase.

And then the last chapter was soon to be written, for the officials of the United Mine Workers, obeying the order of Federal Judge Anderson, convened at Indianapolis and after an all-night session, the decision was reached to obey the mandate and call off the strike.

Nov. 11 stands as an epoch in American history, this being the day upon which the greatest war in the history of the world ended, and also the day upon which the strike, which held such grave possibilities for America, came to an end.

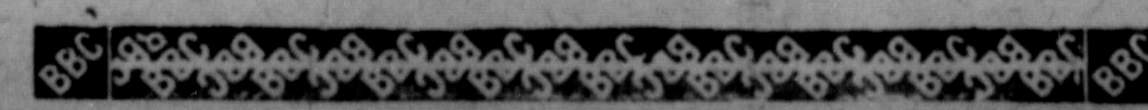

At a meeting of members of the
committee appointed to carry the
Salvation Army drive through Jan-
15 was set as a date for the beginning
of the drive. The meeting took place
in the city hall at 7 o'clock yesterday
evening. Besides city officials and
representative business men, A. J.
Evans of Dallas, state organizer for
the Salvation Army, was present.

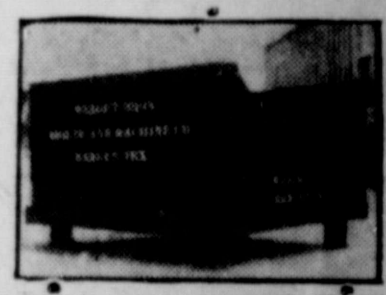

CAMPAIGN OF RED CROSS TO BE EXTENDED

The Red Cross campaign has been conducted in this city for the last several days, it was announced by James Jenkins, Jr., Tuesday. The ladies who have been doing the soliciting have been unable in the short time assigned them to thoroughly cover the field.

A total of approximately \$1000 has been raised. The banks, a number of hotels, cafes and other places are yet to be visited. It is hoped to bring the total between \$2000 and \$3000.

The fund should be swelled to the utmost in order that the local demands may be fully taken care of, said Mrs. Jenkins Tuesday. There is a great work which the Red Cross can do.

Bishop Moore is an able speaker, a renowned worker in the church. His message Sunday will be an uplifting one.
