MINERS ACCEPT PROPOSAL FOR NATION-WIDE SCALE AGREEMENT

RED CROSS DRIVE WILL EXTEND UNTIL NOV. 22; MISS CROSS AIDS WORK

Extension of the Red Cross campaign till Nov. 22 for towns and cities in the Southwest affected by climatic conditions to raise their quotas was announced this morning by Miss Mary Ann Cross, divisional headquarters representative, who is in the city to aid the campaign here.

Ranger's quota, which has been tentatively set at \$7,000, is lagging, only about \$2,000 having been raised up to noon today. The quota for the nation has been fixed at \$30,000,000. Fifteen lady workers were out soliciting for the Red Cross Saturday.

At a meeting of the committees at the Methodist church yesterday it was decided in the absence of the chairman to appoint Mr. Hansford, finance officer of the American Legion, as subcommittee of the "drive." He has already assumed his duties.

The headquarters of the local Red Cross campaign committee in the Texas Bank & Trust company will be moved to the McCleskey hotel Monday. Miss Cross requests that all persons who have not taken out membership in the organization do so at once in order to facilitate the canvass and bring Ranger's quota up to the top notch. Hundreds of persons in Ranger have not yet been solicited and other hundreds have not contributed, according to Miss Cross.

Miss Mary Ann Cross was sent here in the interest of the drive. She came Thursday from St. Louis. She will remain till Monday night, probably. Meanwhile she asks that all persons do their part by contributing to the worthy cause.

"I appreciate the cooperation of the ladies and the American Legion and all other forces which have been working to put the drive across here," she said this morning to a reporter.

Wants Volunteers. "We would appreciate a large number of volunteers to aid those already engaged in the drive," Miss Cross said. "This is a large city and the industries and camps are widely scattered, so that it is practically impossible for a few ladies to see all those who should subscribe. Therefore, I suggest that a number of persons who can reach these remote places and industries will be so kind and assisting to the Red Cross as to volunteer their services during the remainder of the campaign."

Speaking of the Red Cross's mission and activities in the past, Miss Cross said: "I do not think it necessary for me to try to tell the people of Ranger what the Red Cross is, what it has done, and what it will do in the future. The fact that the American Legion in every part of the country is taking upon itself actively to assist the campaign is sufficient evidence of the way of aid to make it common knowledge that the organization has never fallen down where humanity was to be successful and cared for. In the United States the efforts for the Red Cross are appreciated at every point—in the cities and towns, in the country, at junction points. It has been a great force for good in the welfare of every man, woman and child. We need the assistance of the American people to carry on, and the campaign at the present time is a means to that end. Every dollar invested in the Red Cross will bring about cheer and aid to some person."

Miss Cross is very well pleased with Ranger. She said it was a "dandy town." She finds the people here much like they are elsewhere—ready to aid any worthy undertaking.

MRS. BLANTON IS PAINFULLY INJURED TODAY

WASHINGTON, Nov. 15.—Mrs. Thomas L. Blanton, wife of Congressman Blanton, was painfully injured about the face and received other bruises when the automobile in which she was riding was struck by a street car here this morning.

Her injuries are not thought to be of a fatal nature.

12 ADDITIONAL MOONSHINERS ARRESTED IN KY.

CHICAGO, Nov. 15.—Hundreds of saloonkeepers have applied for a renewal of liquor licenses, transportation has been arranged for 20,000, 300 gallons of whisky, reservations have been made at downtown cafes, and all other arrangements are fixed for a celebration in anticipation of the "wet" decision of federal judges in the suit at Peoria of the Chicago liquor dealers' injunction to stop the enforcement of the wartime prohibition law.

RADICALS ARE BUSY CAUSING MEX. TROUBLE

MEXICO CITY, Nov. 15.—In connection with the charges of "red" propaganda going into the United States via Mexico, it is known here the Mexican government has been aware that radicals of various sorts have intended to include Mexico in their field of operations.

Officials of all ports of entry have been ordered to increase their vigilance against the entry of these undesirable.

The deportation of many radicals in the last few months is taken as evidence that the government is not inclined to temporize with an element which is regarded as dangerous.

News reports say a group of 130 radicals recently expelled from the United States and Argentine are expected soon at Tampico and Vera Cruz.

SHERMAN REFINERY TO INCREASE CAPITAL

SHERMAN, Nov. 15.—The capital stock of the Merchants & Farmers Refining company of this city will be increased from \$100,000 to \$300,000 as the result of action taken by stockholders of the refinery at a meeting held at the Chamber of Commerce.

The purpose of the increase in capital is to provide funds for building a 4-mile pipe line connection between the refinery in south Sherman and the Texas pipe line pumping station at Calton, and also to enlarge the capacity of the plant at least 1,000 barrels per day.

SHALLOW OIL SAND FOUND AT BRECKENRIDGE

BRECKENRIDGE, Nov. 15.—An oil sand estimated by drillers to be good for 40 barrels a day was estimated at 1,225 feet recently in the well of the Law-Tex Oil company of Oklahoma City, drilling in block 28 of the townsite of Cotton Plant. The sand was about 20 feet thick and was cased off.

Levy and Evans Did Not See the Election Ballots

Levy & Evans, incorrectly held responsible for the error in the ballots in the city bond election, are cleared from all connection with the mistake which led to the declaration of the attorney general's office that Ranger's vote on city bonds was invalid, by an investigation which showed that this part of the election details never came into their hands. Leonard M. Levy and William L. Evans, who have acted as advisory counsel for the city on several matters, were not consulted on the ballot.

"Levy & Evans are capable attorneys, we have found," stated Mr. Turner today. "We have found no complaint with their work."

D'ANNUNZIO SPEADS OUT TO DALMATIA

PARIS, Nov. 15.—Capt. Gabrielle D'Annunzio, who attracted worldwide attention by his seizure of the Italian port of Fiume, is engaged in another adventure along the Dalmatian coast, according to advices to the peace congress.

Few Miners Return Today; U. S. Suffers

CHICAGO, Nov. 15.—Virtually no change in the number of bituminous miners returning to work was looked for today, Saturday being regarded as a half holiday in at least half of the many mines of the country.

"JIM CROW" LAW STANDS IN SOUTH

WASHINGTON, Nov. 15.—By a vote of 14 to 12 the house today refused to incorporate a provision into the Esch railroad bill which would compel the abolition of the "Jim Crow" cars for southern railroads. This pertains to the use of separate cars by negroes and whites.

Child Labor in U. S. Decreases Since April 15

WASHINGTON, Nov. 15.—Child labor in the United States decreased over 40 per cent since the child labor provision revenue act went into effect April 25 last.

Woman Candidate Votes for Herself

PLYMOUTH, England, Nov. 15.—Lady Astor, candidate for parliament, voted for herself today. She was one of the first women at the polls.

Alabama Miners Vote to Stay Out

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Nov. 15.—The coal miners of the Cahaba district voted not to return to work at a special meeting last night, according to reports to the local coal operators' association.

W. C. T. U. in World Move on Tobacco

ST. LOUIS, Nov. 15.—An intensive worldwide campaign to teach "the bad effects on health of alcohol and tobacco" was advocated at the Victory convention of the National Woman's Christian Temperance Union here today.

Berliners Storm League Meeting

BERLIN, Nov. 15.—Demonstrants last night stormed a meeting arranged by Matthias Erzberger, vice premier and minister of finance, at which speeches favoring the League of Nations were made.

Paris Deputy Is Arrested as Enemy 'Spy'

PARIS, Nov. 15.—Deputy Paul Meunier has been arrested by the military authorities at Aix en Otre charged with having intelligence with the enemy. His residence was searched in his presence.

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60 PER CENT INCREASE DECLARED BY MINERS' LEADER TO BE NEEDED

WASHINGTON, Nov. 15.—Acceptance without qualification by the mine workers of Secretary of Labor Wilson's proposal for the negotiation of a nationwide scale agreement was announced today by John Lewis, acting president of the mine workers, following a conference.

Lewis sharply denied the charges of bad faith made against the miners in the coal strike negotiations.

Secretary-Treasurer Green of the mine workers, taking exception to Secretary Wilson's statement yesterday that 60 per cent wage increases were impossible, said that the federal government should see that the miners got that much increase to allow them to meet the American standard of living.

LONG WRANGLE OVER WAGE SCALE

WASHINGTON, Nov. 15.—After a long and acrimonious wrangle, representatives of the coal operators and miners in conference here today agreed to take up a settlement of the wage and labor conditions in the central competitive fields, after they had failed to agree on considering a national scale, as first proposed.

Adjourning the conference, Secretary of Labor Wilson summoned the wage scale committee to meet at 2:30 o'clock this afternoon to negotiate a new scale.

\$50,000 MOVIE TO SEAT 600 TO BE BUILT HERE

P. Crown, a pioneer movie man of Texas, was in this city yesterday and completed arrangements with Beshgetorian and Cobelli, local architects, for the building of a new theater in Ranger, seating over 600 people.

The building will be located on Main Street, between the Guaranty State building and the Wilson hotel, now under construction. The operation will represent an outlay of \$50,000.

Mr. Crown is one of the veteran movie men of Texas. He was formerly owner of the Crown Theater in Houston and is now the proprietor of three moving picture shows in De Leon. Associated with Mr. Crown will be C. Comack, a local real estate dealer. The backers of the new show plan to build one of the best playhouses in the south west.

The theater will be designed in the modern Art Nouveau style, with a balcony and a rest room for ladies. Only first run pictures will be shown, according to a statement made by the owners.

HOPE VANISHES FOR SETTLING RY. SQUABBLE

WASHINGTON, Nov. 15.—Hope for an immediate settlement of the demands of the four great railroad brotherhoods vanished today when further sessions of the conference between Director General Hines and brotherhood heads were postponed indefinitely.

Omsk, Capital of Russ, Falls to the Bolsheviki

LONDON, Nov. 15.—Omsk, capital of the All-Russian government, has been occupied by the Bolsheviki, a Moscow official communique asserts.

To Arrest Russ Soviet Minister

NEW YORK, Nov. 15.—Ludwig C. K. A. Martens, ambassador to the United States from the Russian soviet government was declared to be in contempt of the joint legislative committee investigating the activities of radicals in the state of New York.

A warrant for his arrest will be asked.

Announce Liquor Decision "Some Time" Next Week

CHICAGO, Nov. 15.—Federal Judges Carpenter and Fitzhugh announced that their decision as to the injunction brought by liquor dealers to restrain the enforcement of prohibition will not be delivered until some time next week.

Dockstader to Tour Stephens County Field

FORT WORTH, Nov. 15.—Lew Dockstader, the well-known minstrel, is visiting Texas, and incidentally he will see the famous oil fields of the State. Recently when he was in this city, Mr. Dockstader said that he was going to return to Texas and reside here. Everybody thought he was just "joking," but now since he's returned, it looks like he might "move" here after all.

Dockstader was visiting his old-time friend John O. Eldridge of the King Midas Oil company, preparatory to making a tour of the Stephens county oil fields, where Eldridge and the Midas company have production, leases and acreage. Dockstader is understood to have invested heavily in Texas oil.

POLICE SMASH ANARCHIST MEETING AFTER FIGHT

PARIS—(By Mail)—The Union des Syndicats de la Seine made arrangements to hold a meeting recently in the Salle Wagram to demand an amnesty for everybody imprisoned on war charges, including deserters.

"This meeting," says the Echo de Paris, "was merely a pretext to begin an agitation intended to end in a call for a general strike in England, France and Italy."

Shortly before the time announced for the meeting the Syndicalist secretary received word from the government that steps would be taken to prevent the meeting being held.

The agitators then went to the Maison des Syndicats and held a meeting there, which was addressed by a notorious woman anarchist and a sailor from the French fleet which revolted in the Black Sea.

Very wild speeches were made, and when the secretary tried to address the meeting, preaching a counsel of moderation, he was howled down.

The meeting broke up in disorder and the agitators came into immediate collision with the police and stoned them. There were several short but violent fights, all of which ended in the dispersal of the anarchists.

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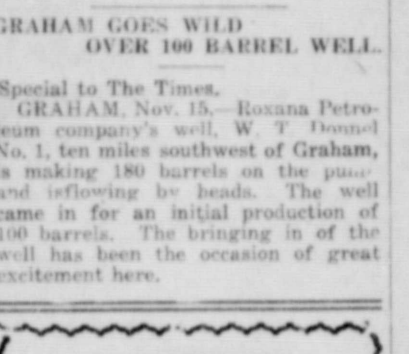

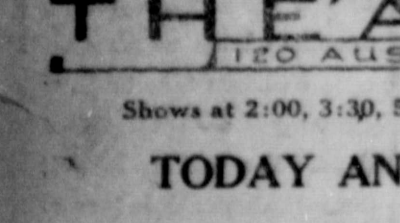
