WASHINGTON, Nov. 19 .- A letter from President Wilson advising administration senators to vote against ratification of the treaty with the foreign relations committee's reservations was laid before a conference of the administration senate forces today by Senator Hitch-

The committee program, the president wrote, would provide "not for ratification" but rather "for nullification of the treaty.

The conference was called to decide upon the final tactics of the administration for ratification of the treaty. After the president's letter was read there were indications that unless some compromise was effected the administration senators would line up solidly against ratification.

The decision of the Democratic friends of the treaty to vote against ratification resolution was confirmed at a conference of the Democrats immediately after the

Senator Lodge presented a resolution for ratification containing fifteen reservations, adopted by the senate majority.

"And as long as the governments stands they will not be prevented from getting it by anything the operators or miners may do," Mr. Garfield added.


