WAR REFERENDUM.

The Tulsa World takes William
Jennings Bryan to task because the
great "commoner" advocates the
adoption of a law requiring a referen-
dum on all questions of war. It
belittles the female constituents of
the nation because it intimates that
Bryan must needs present the "novel
idea" before them to get a sympa-
thetic audience.

However great the opposition
against Bryan, it must be said to his
credit that numerous innovations
suggested and advocated by him un-
der the preponderance of opposition
have now become part of the polit-
ical fabric of the nation. Even the
constitution of Oklahoma—the
state in which the World is pub-
lished—was framed by him. The
state guaranty bank law of Texas
and of other states, upon which we
all look with sanction and praise,
were evolved and given to the people
by Bryan.

Bryan has been declared dead a
number of times; but he has man-
aged to "resurrect" himself when-
ever occasion required. When he is
"most dead" he soon proves to be
"most alive." Therefore, whenever
he comes out with a new idea it is
quickly snatched upon. It was de-
clared that he "killed himself politi-
cally and influentially when he was
brave enough to stand by his convic-
tions and get out of the cabinet. His
action is commendable. Most of
us under the allurements of the of-
fice would have remained in the
portfolio, regardless of whether or
not our convictions were to be de-
spised; but Bryan was too much
man to usurp a place in which he
realized he did not fit. The man
himself is spotless, immaculate, and
doubtless the most capable states-
man in America today. Wilson and
Bryan are not enemies, as many
would wish us to believe, but they
are fast friends and, if anything,
Wilson does not condemn the action
taken by Bryan in removing himself
from the cabinet even during the
crisis.

The Tulsa World has a Republican
record to maintain. Bryan is a
Democrat. Moreover, he has the
"golden rule" sort of government
that not only arouses the ire of Re-
publicans, but goes against the grain
of many Democrats. He hews to
the right, regardless of where the
chips may fly. If the largest chip
must strike a Democrat in the eye,
it matters not to Bryan. Therefore,
the prejudice of the World against
Bryan is a convincing point against
it in trying to stultify the efforts
of Bryan to bring about the adop-
tion of a referendum on all ques-
tions of war. The idea is not con-
trary to our democratic form of gov-
ernment, but rather is consonant
with it. A democracy is a govern-
ment of the people, for the people
and by the people. Therefore, in
Mr. Bryan's stand he is not seeking
to put anything over the people. He
has stood for the people to run their
own business. He seeks to wear
some of this war-making power from
a few individuals and to place it with
the people. Mr. Bryan has been
called a pacifist. He was, as we all
know, opposed to the war; but after
war was declared he was one of the
principal workers throughout the na-
tion to stimulate action. He threw
his hat into the ring.

The people should decide whether or
not war should be declared. All the
facts with reference to it are treated

conflict should be given fearlessly
to the people. They should be the
judge as to whether the conditions
warrant armed conflict. If the citi-
zens—instead of the rulers—of all
nations were granted this power, this
thing of war would soon be a matter
of ancient history. History plainly
reveals that wars start with crowned
heads and men high in power.

The World says a referendum
might uselessly precipitate the nation
into a war. Granted; but wouldn't
the people be ruling; wouldn't the
democracy speak instead of a few
dignitaries? Where the people would
plunge the nation into war
once, the war-making powers-to-be
would plunge it a dozen times.

The Times sees no argument what-
ever on the side of the World in
the matter of the referendum. The
World was against the League of
Nations. It still maintains a pugna-
cious disposition. It does not care
to receive slight rebuffs to national
life in accordance with the divine
Golden Rule. Just such things as it
opposes are the means to drive us
into useless wars. Its jingoistic rant
would spur us into Mexico, to spend
millions of the people's money, wage
a several years' guerilla warfare, and
have achieved only an extermination.

It were better to use peaceable means
to overcome the ignorance and degra-
dation of Mexico, even should it re-
quire a century to do it.

The world is weary of war. It is
seeking means to express that fact.
It needs a league of nations. It
needs that its people shall speak,
rather than its few chosen rulers
should govern.

Poinsett Oil and Gas company, on

Producers Must Secure Permits of Commission

AUSTIN, Nov. 21.—The oil division of the railroad commission has issued the following circular letter to the pipe line companies and the producers which are on the mailing list. It is intended as the ultimatum in the matter referred to:

Section 5 of the acts of the thirty-sixth legislature, approved March 31, 1919, provides that "pipe line companies shall file with the commission a list of five per cent per annum payable annually for the purpose of constructing and equipping public free school buildings of brick material and of purchasing additional high school sites within said district and if there shall be annually levied and collected on all taxable property in said district for the current year and annually thereafter while said bonds or any of them are outstanding a tax sufficient to pay the current interest on said bonds and provide a sinking fund sufficient to pay the principal and maturity."

C. C. Chenoweth is hereby appointed manager of said election which shall be held as nearly as may be possible in conformity with the general election laws of this state.

No person shall vote at said election unless he is a qualified voter under the Constitution and laws of this State and a tax-payer of said Ranger Independent School District.

Those in favor of the issuance of the bonds and the levying of the tax shall write or print on their ballots "For Bond and the Tax" and those against the issuance of the bonds and levying of the tax shall write or print on their ballots "Against the Bonds and the Tax."

Public notice of said election shall be given by publishing notices thereof signed by the president and attested by the secretary of the board in the Ranger Independent School District by order passed on the 6th day of November, 1919, and this notice is issued pursuant to said order.

panies shall not connect with oil or gas wells until the owners or operators thereof shall furnish certificates from the railroad commission that the conservation laws of the state have been complied with, provided this act shall not prevent a temporary connection with any well or wells in order to take care of production and prevent waste until opportunity shall have been given the owner or operator of said well to secure a certificate showing compliance with the conservation laws of the state."

The railroad commission feels it has been very lenient in the enforcement of this article of the law and its regulations enacted thereunder, and feels that the provision in special cases permits a temporary connection and will protect pipe line companies in very few instances where they now have connections, against the imputation that article five is not being strictly complied with, either by the pipe line companies or by the operators. Most connections heretofore made have long ceased to be temporary connections.

Article 7 of the act referred to above is as follows: "In addition to any penalty that may be imposed by the railroad commission for contempt, any firm, person, corporation, or any office, agent or employe thereof, directly or indirectly violating the provisions of this act or the orders of the regulations of the railroad commission made in pursuance thereof, shall be subject to a penalty not

more than \$5,000 to be recovered by any court of competent jurisdiction, each suit to be brought in the name of the state of Texas, and to be instituted and conducted by any county or district attorney, on the direction of the railroad commission."
