SIN AND SINS

Recently, I read the following thought provoking sentence: "What lies behind us and what lies before us are tiny matters compared to what lies within us." It is that "what lies within us" that bothers me most. When we preachers speak of "sinners" our congregations doze gently into another world until we have passed to thoughts like "he's a real good guy, anyway." For no self-respecting, church-going, sermon-listening person believes that he or she is a "sinner." The word "sinner", to the average listener, means "the town drunk, a prostitute, a boot-legger, the Devil, a bank robber, or a murderer. But, there is not one of us that has not had trouble with that "what lies within us" business.

When you got out of bed this morning and looked in the mirror to shave or re-arrange that rag mop of hair (or no hair) you were looking right into the eyes of the person that the Apostle Paul called "the sinner." "For all have sinned, some short of the glories of God." (Romans 3:23). He was speaking to the preacher as well as to the crap-shooter in the back alley. He was speaking to the members of the Official Boards as well as the Saturday night drunk (in some cases the same). He was talking about that "what lies within us".

This brings me to point out the distinction between Sin and so-called sins. Sins are the symptoms of sin. Gossip, slander, thievery, murder, adultery, drunkenness, etc. are the results of this "What lies within us". A man gets drunk because of the inadequacy of the soul to cope with the average everyday ordinary problem. There is Sin within his heart and life.

Sin is that "within us" which causes us to miss the mark, even when we can see the mark. Sin is that which keeps us immature and spiritual babies even though we want complete maturity. Sin is that which keeps us non-productive and (Continued On Page Two)

Car Mishap Fatal To Carol Ann Hill

Miss Carol Ann Hill, 16, popular Eastland High School senior, injured in an automobile accident near Eastland Thursday afternoon, died at 7:40 a.m. Saturday at Eastland Memorial Hospital. She had never regained consciousness.

Miss Hill and Allen Lynn Miller, son of Mr. and Mrs. Cyrus Miller, also an Eastland High School student, were out riding between Eastland and Cisco when the late model Ford car, driven by young Miller, struck a rock or chug-hole, skidded and overturned two or three times, virtually demolishing the car. Other than shock, young Miller apparently was unharmed. Injuries suffered by Miss Hill included skull fractures, a broken collar bone, a severe arm injury and numerous cuts and bruises.

A popular leader among the young people at the high school, Miss Hill was especially prominent in the "Y" there. She was a member of the Sub-Deb Club and had been elected senior cheerlead-

er for next year at the high school.

Miss Hill was a member of the Methodist Church and its junior choir. Prior to the accident she had been practicing a vocal solo which she was to have sung at the church Sunday.

Miss Hill was a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Russell Hill. Her father is vice-president of the Eastland National Bank.

Beside her parents, she is survived by her grandparents, Mrs. Sally Hill and Mrs. Willis Barton, both of Eastland.

Hammer Funeral Home, in charge of arrangements for the services, announced that the last rites will be held at the Methodist Church at 3 p.m. Sunday, with the pastor, Rev. Richard R. Smith, officiating, assisted by the Rev. Roy Turner, pastor of the First Christian Church. A group of high school senior boys who were her classmates will serve as pallbearers.

Interment will take place in Eastland Cemetery.

Little League Indians Take Second Straight; Yankee Juggernaut Rolls On

The Indians staged an uprising Thursday night in Little League Play as they dropped the Dodgers 19-8 for their second consecutive win of the season, and enabled them to move from the cellar for the first time this season.

It was a perfect week for the Indians, who lost their first four contests in earlier weeks then stormed back to take the Giants Monday night and the Dodgers in the more recent contest.

However, the game was closely contested until the fifth inning when the Indians scored 11 runs in their half of the batting order after curfew time had expired.

The Indians win, coupled with the first place Yankees 25-6 victory over the Giants, was a combination to move the Giants into the cellar.

In the Yankee-Giant affair, James McGee and Gary Bradshaw combined to hold the Giants to six hits while their teammates were collecting 20, the heaviest hitting barrage that has been recorded this year.

McGee was credited with the win, but both Yankee pitchers aided their cause. McGee collected two hits in three times at bat, scored four runs and batted in three more. Bradshaw got four hits in six times at bat and scored three runs.

Trustees Call Tax Rate Election Tuesday

Trustees of the Ranger Independent School District have called an election to be held in the hallway of the City Hall Tuesday, June 28, 1955, with polls to be opened at 8 a.m. and closed at 7 p.m.

The purpose of the election is to equalize the tax rate for the Public Schools of the entire district. In March of this year, the Bullock Common School District No. 35 was consolidated with the Ranger Independent School District by an election. The law stipulates that the same tax levy must be distributed over the entire district and since the tax levy in what was Bullock District is not the same as in the old Ranger District in order to comply with the law it is necessary for the tax election to be held.

The rate of \$1.50 per \$100 valuation which is the rate now in existence in the old Ranger District is to be distributed over the entire expanded District. This simply means that the tax rate in what was the Bullock District will have to be raised from \$1.35 per \$100 valuation to \$1.50 per \$100 valuation which is the existing rate in the Ranger District before it was expanded.

Requirements Listed For American History

A bill was passed by the State Legislature on June 15, 1955, directly affecting requirements of all state supported colleges that includes Ranger Junior College.

The bill states that no person, after July 1, 1956, shall be granted an undergraduate degree of any kind from any institution of higher learning supported or maintained by the State of Texas, or from any junior college receiving state aid, unless that person has taken and passed six semester hours in American History. Three hours of Texas History may, upon request of the student, be substituted for three of the six hours in American History.

The provisions of this act are in addition to existing laws requiring the teaching of state and federal constitutions in state supported colleges and universities.

Passing of this Act was deemed necessary when recent surveys disclosed a disturbing lack of knowledge and appreciation of the facts and significance of American History.

Dr. Price R. Ashton, President of Ranger Junior College, has been appointed to serve on the Auditing Committee for this meeting.

College Enrolls 200 Students In Summer Term

Dr. Price R. Ashton, President of Ranger Junior College, announced today that enrollment for the first six weeks of summer school has reached the 200 mark. Students are registered from Abilene, Albany, Breckenridge, Graham, Eastland, Mineral Wells, Gorman, De Leon, Strawn and Ranger.

Courses being offered the first six weeks include government, history, English, chemistry, economics, psychology, mathematics and agriculture.

Wheat Farmers Vote On Referendum 25th

Eastland County wheat farmers along with other similar farmers all over the state are going to the polls today to decide on quotas on a wheat marketing referendum.

The vote is expected to have an important effect on the marketing and price-support programs for the 1955 crop.

If two-thirds or more of the farmers voting approve quotas, then the plan will continue in effect for the 1955 crop.

Price support of the crop in the commercial states, includes Texas, will be available at 76 per cent of parity or at a minimum national average of \$1.81 a bushel.

If more than one-third of the voters add ballots against quotas, there will be no quotas or penalties on the 1955 crop but the available support price to farmers who plant within their farm allotment will drop to 50 per cent of parity as provided by law.

The Texas Committee says that wheat acreage allotments are not being voted on. Regardless of how the vote goes in the referendum, acreage allotments will continue in effect.

Also, the committee points out, that wheat supplies are now 66 per cent more than the normal supply and large enough to meet current needs for domestic and export use for the next two years. Marketing quotas, by law, must be proclaimed by the Secretary of Agriculture when the total supply of wheat exceeds the normal supply by 20 percent.

Health Officer Plans Mosquito Killing Project

City Health Officer Dr. A. W. Brada has requested assistance from residents here in ridding the city of mosquitoes and other insects.

He asked that weeds and grass on vacant lots be cut and kerosene be poured into standing water puddles.

The health officer also instructed city employees to place kerosene in ranches and ditches where water has accumulated.

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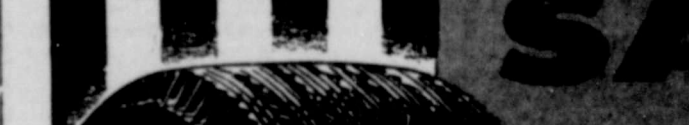
