Rangers Open Pioneer Loop Action Against San Angelo

Season's Low of 15 Expected Here Tonight

A fresh norther blowing in here Wednesday was expected to push the temperatures down to 45 tonight, the lowest of the new season thus far.

Moving in to this area around noon Wednesday, the norther gradually forced the temperatures downward during the afternoon and climaxed the descent with a low of 49 during the night.

The front moved southward at between 15 and 20 miles an hour, dropping temperatures by a few degrees. By Wednesday night the front extended from Texarkana to Waco to south of Junction.

Very little rain was reported with the front as it moved in on the state.

Injury Toll Benches Four Starters Here

The Ranger Junior College Rangers, who generally rely on substitution quite freely, may have their traveling squad cut to no more than 23 players Saturday when they travel to San Angelo for their first conference game against the Rams.

Injuries from Saturday night's contest in Ranger and from practice sessions this week have knocked out four starters out of action for this week's tilt.

Injured to the extent that they will not see action Friday night is Fullback Ed Bawcom, Halfback Harold Cartwright, End Jim Mangum and Guard Charles Smith.

Bill Shear, a substitute guard has been lost for the season by a knee injury. Also, Eddie Joe Jones, and Dan Power have missed practice sessions this week, making their appearance improbable Saturday night.

Opening the conference this year against San Angelo, the Rangers could not come up against a tougher foe in the Pioneer championship race.

For San Angelo, now a odds-on favorite to dethrone defending champion Tarleton State, have emerged as the loop's leading offensive team and are second only to Arlington State defensively.

The Rams have the terrific total of 1,234 net yards rushing and passing in four games, an average gain of 309 yards per contest.

Bulldogs Prepare For First District Contest

Followers of the Bulldogs get a rest this week but such is not the case for the Bulldogs themselves.

For the Bulldogs, gearing for their first conference game here Oct. 21, are working just as hard this week as any time during the season, including pre-season workouts.

Several changes may be noticeable on the Ranger programs when they meet Rising Star here as a result of what may be termed "try-outs" during the vacancy in the schedule this week.

Robert Watson, a 165-pound transfer senior, will become eligible for interscholastic league competition with the Rising Star contest. A hard-working end, Watson may lose out either Boone Yarbrough, Jr., or Jerry Cantrell for a starting assignment.

Primarily concerned with pass offense this week, Gene Bagwell, a guard, has been shifted to an end position and may well get a starting berth there. "He's one of the best pass receivers we have," Yarbrough explained.

Cantrell has also been pulled into the defensive tackle position this week while Harris Tibbels, who worked with the Bulldogs before the season opened but was forced to withdraw, has again donned the maroon and white colors.

A defensive line backer and offensive guard, Tibbels is expected to greatly strengthen the Bulldog defense.

Explaining the Winters situation where the Bulldogs took their first setback of the season, Yarbrough explained, "We weren't mentally ready for the game. Physically we were."

Typical of Yarbrough's explanations, the mentor seemed to personally take the blows of the defeat on himself.

However, the primary concern of Yarbrough and Assistant Coach Harold Barrett is the Bulldog's pass offense which has done anything but shine this year. But the coaching staff seems to feel "that it is improving."

Marines Adopt Six Month Training Program

Captain Ralston F. Haun, Jr., Platoon Leader of the Eastland Marine Corps Reserve Unit announced today that the U. S. Marine Corps has adopted the six months training program recently authorized by Congress.

The provisions of the program are that young men between the ages of 17 and 18 1/2 may enlist in the program and spend six months on active duty and then spend 7 1/2 years in the Organized Reserve which meets weekly. There is a special provision for men still in High School which authorized them to enlist in the program, participate in the Organized Marine Reserve and then upon graduation from High School, take their six-months active duty training, Captain Haun said.

This is a limited program in that only a certain percentage of men

may take advantage of the program. The Abilene, Marine Corps Reserve Unit, together with the Eastland Platoon has a quota of 4 men during the month of October. For further information contact Captain Haun, at the American Legion Hall in Eastland, every Monday night at 7:30 p. m. when the reserves are having a weekly meeting.

REAL ESTATE SALES CONTRACT NO CASUAL MATTER

The signing of a contract of sale is an extremely important step in the purchase of a home. Once buyer and seller signed, they are bound by the provisions of the contract. Their respective legal rights in the transaction are thereby set and determined. If the contract is poorly and haphazardly drawn, a harvest of regret may be reaped at a later date.

Sales contracts are often called by other names, such as earnest money contracts, binders, receipts, etc. All of them are for the same purpose and almost without exception involve the deposit of money by the buyer. Some require the seller to put up a good faith deposit. The fact that such deposited sums are usually to be forfeited in event the depositor later fails to go through with his specified contractual obligations lends additional weight to the often stated admonition that no contract should be signed without complete understanding as to its terms.

But many home purchasers (and sellers) rush to sign a hastily prepared contract with very little knowledge of its contents. The pressure of time, the informality of the occasion, the casual appearance of the contract, and perhaps the fact that a partially printed form is used may contribute in causing the true importance of the act to be overlooked. At any rate, many are lulled into a lapse of good business judgment.

Every significant detail of the bargain should be crystallized in unmistakable terms in the contract of sale. Land and fixtures being sold should be clearly described. A complete description of the property by lot and block, or by metes and bounds, is a must; the street number being inadequate by itself.

Articles and fixtures included in the sale but not always sold with houses generally should be specifically listed. Included in this category are such items as venetian blinds, removable floor coverings, draperies, air conditioning units and others. In purchasing property under construction, complete plans and specifications form an essential part of the agreement.

The price to be paid must, of course, be specified, along with method and terms of payment. If a certain sized loan is a prerequisite to the buyer's ability to complete the purchase, this fact should be noted. Said indeed is the prospective purchaser who loses his earnest money when a contemplated loan transaction falls through, his contract requiring

payment of the entire consideration in cash.

The sales contract should also state the quality of the title to be conveyed to the buyer and the type of title evidence to be furnished.

The buyer's individual circumstances and desires may require that various matters not mentioned above be provided for in the contract. All too often people try to squeeze a sales contract to fit the type of printed form on hand, omitting or leaving to easily misinterpreted or forgotten oral agreement many vital provisions. Do not fall into the "pitfall" of the printed form. Too many unfortunate entanglements have been announced by clients to lawyers with the words, "I have just signed a receipt or a house on Blank Street. Will you take over now and see that everything is O.K.?"

onions, radishes). Then carry your baskets out to the porch or to the backyard if it's still warm enough—and fall to!

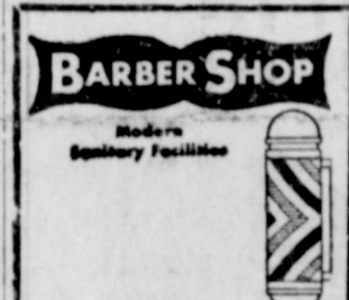
