Down through the years, the folks at T&P


have extended a hand of fellowship to their neighbors . . . in good times as well as in times of disaster.

Maraschino Cherries Top Desserts With Taste-Treat

HEN you want to make a fruit dessert look particularly colorful, use a few maraschino cherries to decorate it.

These cherries, incidentally, have a delightful flavor and can be used as one of the ingredients, as well as a decoration.

Cherry-Peach Shortcake (6 servings)

One and one-half cups sifted, all-purpose flour; 2 teaspoons baking powder, ¾ teaspoon salt, ¼ cup shortening, ½ cup milk, ¼ cup chopped maraschino cherries, well drained (about 10 cherries); l cup heavy cream, whipped; 2 teaspoons sugar, ½ cup quartered maraschino cherries (about 20 cherries); 3 cups sweetened, sliced peaches or drained, canned peaches.

Sift flour, baking powder and salt together. Cut in shortening with pastry blender or 2 knives until mixture is like coarse meal. Add milk and ¼ cup cherries and mix well.

F Turn out on lightly floured surface and knead gently. Roll or pat out to 1/2-inch thickness. Cut with floured 21/2-inch biscuit

Place on baking sheet and bake in very hot oven (450 degrees F.) 10 to 15 minutes, or until golden brown. Cool. Combine cream, ugar and 1/2 cup cherries. Mix well.

Cut biscuits in half and arrange peaches on bottom halves. Top with half of cream and remaining biscuit halves. Spoon remaining cream mixture over biscuits and garnish with whole cherries.

Cherry-Apricot Cobbler (4-6 servings)

One-quarter pound marshmallows (about 16 marshmallows); 1 cup water, 1 tablespoon cornstarch, 1 cup quartered maraschino cherries, well drained (about 40 cherries); 1 No. 2½ can apricot halves, drained; 2 teaspoons lemon rind, 2 tablespoons lemon juice, 11/2 cups biscuit mix, 1/2 cup chopped walnuts, 1/2 cup milk, maraschino cherry halves.

Combine marshmallows and ½ cup water; cook over low heat until marshmallows are melted. Combine cornstarch and remaining 1/2 cup water; mix well, Gradually add to hot marshmallow mixture and bring to a boil; cook until thickened; stir constantly.

Add quartered cherries, apricots, lemon rind and lemon juice. Turn into 11/2-quart casserole.

Combine biscuit mix, walnuts and milk; mix until blended. Drop by tablespoonfuls on top of cherry-apricot mixture. Garnish with cherry halves. Bake in hot oven (450 degrees F.) 20 minutes, or until biscuit is golden brown. Serve warm.

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
