### Farm Bureau Meetings Set

Farm Bureau meetings scheduled to meet in various communities over the county during a thirty day period, beginning Oct. 15, and ending Nov. 15, are running according to schedule, is the report given this week by Mrs. Bill Tucker, publicity chairman.

The first of this series of meetings was held in Scranton High School Oct. 26. The purpose of these planned meetings is to acquaint the people of the Group Hospitalization plan, to include Catastrophic Illness Endorsement, for farmers and ranchers who are Blue-Cross Shield members already, and for others who are interested in becoming members of the Farm Bureau and enrolling in the Group services it has to offer.

Monday night's program at the Voc-Ag Building in Rising Star, Oct. 24, had for the speakers, Mr. Anderson, from the office of Group Hospital, Inc. Dallas, and Dr. Bradley of Rising Star Hospital. The importance of good hospital insurance was stressed, and each person present was urged to investigate the Group plan which Farm Bureau has to offer.

Tuesday night, Oct. 25, Mr. Anderson or another representative from Dallas addressed the group gathered at the Olden High School on the local Group plan. Local talent was presented for the entertainment and Mrs. J. D. Herrell and a number of the Olden women were in charge of refreshments.

Following the same pattern, the farmers and ranchers around Carbon will be given information and new members urged to enroll in the Group plan on Thursday night, Oct. 27 at Carbon High School. Clyde Barbee, Mrs. Maud Stubblefield and others will be in charge of the program.

Tentative schedules are in process for Gorman and Ranger meetings before Nov. 15 deadline.

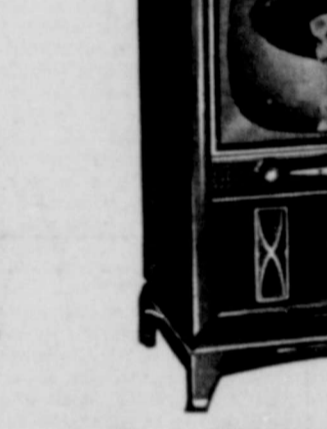

miles northwest of Eastland. Terrace lines have also been run for Joe Barnett of the Carbon area.

Soil Conservation Service technicians and landowners have also been busy with farm ponds, including making necessary site sections to determine the soil will hold water, that adequate drainage is present and that the necessary spillway can be provided. After a suitable site has been found the ponds are staked, supervision of construction given where needed and the final check is made to determine if the pond is a safe structure and meets all specifications. From this information total yards moved are calculated and this amount certified to the County A.S.C. committee for payment.

Rogers and Veta Peery have constructed ponds. J. H. Reynolds, Grover Cleveland, E. H. Ramsey and M. L. Perdue of the Cisco area have also finished their farm ponds. Ted Hall and S. S. Powers, located north of Desdemona, recently completed their farm ponds.

Mr. Hall also has marked a water way which he plans to establish to grasses in order that he can later terrace his cropland, after the waterway becomes stable. In the Morton Valley area E. A. White has completed his farm pond and Homer White is, in the process of building his farm pond. John Love, located in the Cheaney community, has finished a pond on his farm.

Many people pool their efforts and cooperate in getting conservation on the land.

Of this group the contractors of this area who take much pride in their work and strive to do a top job are to be commended. These men not only do a good job but in a true sense are conservationists. They, like others, see the needs of the land and know the benefits of conserving our soil, plants and water, and that conservation is a must. Conservation is everyone's business since the soil is our only source of food, clothing, and shelter," it was pointed out.

"Supervisors of the Upper Leon SCD and the County ASC committee along with others wish to encourage landowners to plant cover crops. No single practice can do more to conserve our soil and water.

"Plan now to cover up our lands with a cover crop."

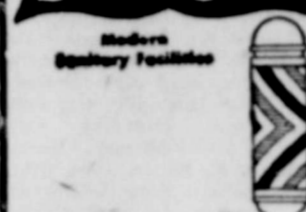
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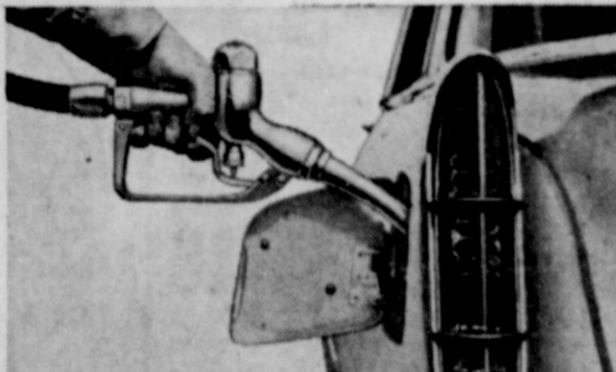
