T. E. Hale, 69, died Wednesday at 7:20 a. m. in his home, 121 Bowie.

Mr. Hale worked most of his life building tanks for oil companies.

Next conference action is scheduled for Jan. 31, when Tarleton State meets Ranger and Schreiner faces San Angelo.

**Oil News Two Wildcat Locations Staked In County**

Location for a new Eastland County wildcat was staked two miles north of Cisco by Big Six Oil Co. of Cisco.

It will be No. 1 Ivy, spotting 330 feet from the east and 1,770 feet from the south lines of Section 507, SP Survey. Proposed depth is 4,000 feet with rotary.

Isett and James of Brownwood No. 1 H. L. Vestal will be a 1,600-foot rotary project three and a half miles northwest of Pioneer in the Isett Field.

Location is 1,615 feet from the north and 1,817 feet from the west lines of S8M-Denton Survey.

An Eastland County wildcat location was staked two miles southeast of Rising Star.

It is C. E. Joyce, Rising Star, No. 1 J. T. Nunnally, slated for 1,200 feet with rotary. Site is 130 feet from the north and west lines of the northeast quarter in Section 11, BB&C Survey.

Two miles northeast of Eastland location for a regular field try was staked. Slated for 1,999 feet with rotary, it is W. D. Evans of Angleton, Tex., No. 1 Levie R. Van Gaasen.

Site is 648 feet from the north and 154 feet from the east lines of southeast quarter in Section 12, Block 4, H&TC Survey.

**Countians Attending Annual Convention SCD Supervisors**

V. C. Marshall, "Father of Texas' soil conservation districts," is being honored at the 15th annual convention of the Association of Texas SCD Supervisors in Lubbock January 18, 19, and 20, attracting several from Eastland County.

Farmers and ranchers from all over the state are gathered there to map conservation strategy for 1956 and ponder soil, water and farm problems of state and national concern. One point expected to get considerable attention is the Hoover Commission recommendation that USDA's upstream flood prevention work should be turned over to the Army Engineers.

Marshall, 70, retired December 31 after 16 years as executive director of the Texas State Soil Conservation Board. Well known to rural Texas for nearly 40 years.

**Ranger Meets Eastland Quintet Friday Night**

The Ranger Bulldogs take on the Eastland Mavericks in a crucial District 7-A basketball contest Friday night here.

Ranger has lost two games in conference play, dropping one to Gorman 49-46, and another one to Cross Plains, 55-44. They have won one game, defeating Rising Star, 53-43.

Eastland has lost only one game and that was a 55-54 to district leading Cross Plains.

A loss would nearly end any Bulldog hopes for a district flag and would seriously hamper the Mavericks.

**Car Overtakes Near Ranger Tuesday Night**

Three men escaped injury four miles east of Ranger Tuesday night when the car in which they were traveling overturned after the driver, Lubbock County Deputy Sheriff Elmer Todd went off the highway when he was blinded by the headlights of an approaching car.

Deputy Todd and his father, Robert Todd of Gorman, were taking a prisoner from Longview to Lubbock when the accident occurred. The car was heavily damaged.

**Rain, Sleet, Snow Bring Moisture Of Help To Farming**

Winter leveled its worst barrage of the season against this area in the form of a snow storm that virtually halted traffic, closed schools and brought an end to the otherwise mild climate.

The lengthy drouth in Eastland County, as at many other points, was broken by a precipitation that included rain, sleet and snow which gave most localities in this territory more than an inch of moisture in the forty-eight-hour period ending Wednesday mid-day. Rainfall in the area varied. Ranger received an inch of rain and three inches of snow.

Traffic hazards were considerable early Wednesday and bus schedules were temporarily disrupted by the icy condition of the highways. One traveler early Wednesday reported ten cars off the road, from skidding, which he saw enroute from Eastland to Ranger. Deputy Sheriff Johnny Boyd counted five a bit later when he made the ten-mile trip. However, only two serious accidents in the area were reported.

The automobile of Deputy Sheriff Elmer Todd of Lubbock County, formerly of Gorman, which occurred 4 or 5 miles east of Ranger Tuesday night. His father, Robert Todd of Gorman, had gone with him to Longview and they were bringing a prisoner back when the mishap occurred. The deputy said that as he was meeting another car, the approaching machine's lights blinded him, as they were not dimmed, and he ran his car too close to the shoulder and it skidded and overturned. The car was damaged heavily but no one was injured. Sheriff J. B. Williams rushed to the accident scene and assisted the Todds and brought the prisoner to the county jail, where another prisoner also was being held for Deputy Todd.

Four persons were injured in a collision of two automobiles on the TESCO property road at Leon Plant Village about 6 p. m. Wednesday.

The crash was between the automobiles of Tommie Alford and R. D. Kelley, both of whom are TESCO employees at the plant. Mrs. Alford was driving one auto and with her were three of her children — Tommie Jr., Phil and Margaret — and Mr. Kelley was the sole occupant of his car.

Mrs. Alford was most seriously injured, her hurts including several broken ribs. Her son's and daughter's injuries were mostly bruises and abrasions. It was reported Mr. Kelley was not seriously hurt. The cars were wrecked.

Mrs. Alford and children were taken to Ranger General Hospital for treatment.

By mid-afternoon Wednesday melted from the pavement and highways and thoroughfares, and this greatly reduced the accident hazards.

Towns and countryside looked like "winter wonderlands," blanketed in ice and snow. Many trees and shrubs were bent to virtually the ground by the heavy ice that cloaked them and numerous trees were damaged when limbs broke off under the weight. A few TV antennas also were broken by ice.

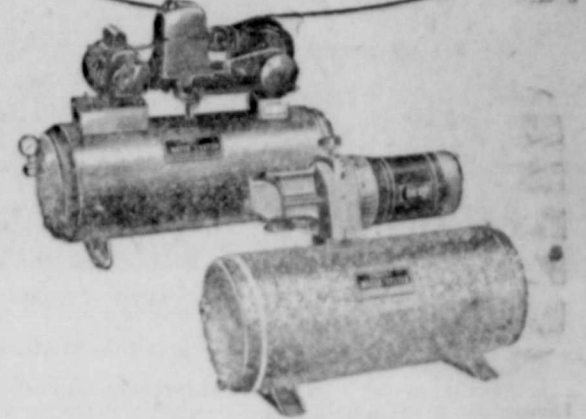
### MORE MEAT TO THE POUND



What homemaker doesn't know that wasteful regret, "if only the roast hadn't shrunk so much, we could have lived on it all week!" Cheery news! Dan Stampier, the fabulously successful New York restaurateur whose roasts are his specialty, gives his secret for reducing shrinkage.  
First off, take your roast out of the refrigerator the night before, so that it loses its chill all the way through. Make about 10 slits in the top of the roast, two and a half inches deep; pour a quality bourbon like Old Crow into the slits, one and a half teaspoons, the night before and again in the morning. In cooking, of course, the alcohol "fumes off," and only the flavor-enhancement remains. Heat oven to 325 degrees F. and cook the roast until it registers 130 degrees F. on a meat thermometer (1 1/2 degrees if you don't like it rare). Baste with a tablespoonful of Old Crow twice during roasting. A four-pound, two-ounce roast is ready in two hours and five minutes, a forty-five minute savings in time, gas, and meat shrinkage. A roast of this size loses half an inch in length, an eighth of an inch in width, and it adds a bit in height. For an unthickened gravy of rare flavor, add a tablespoon of Old Crow to the juices.

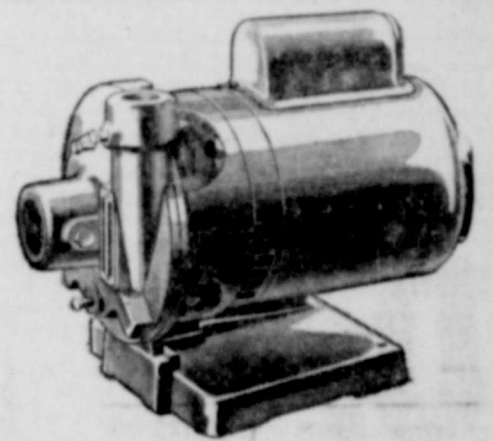

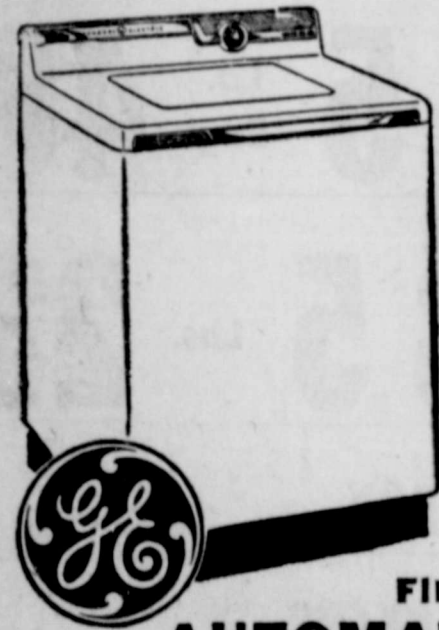

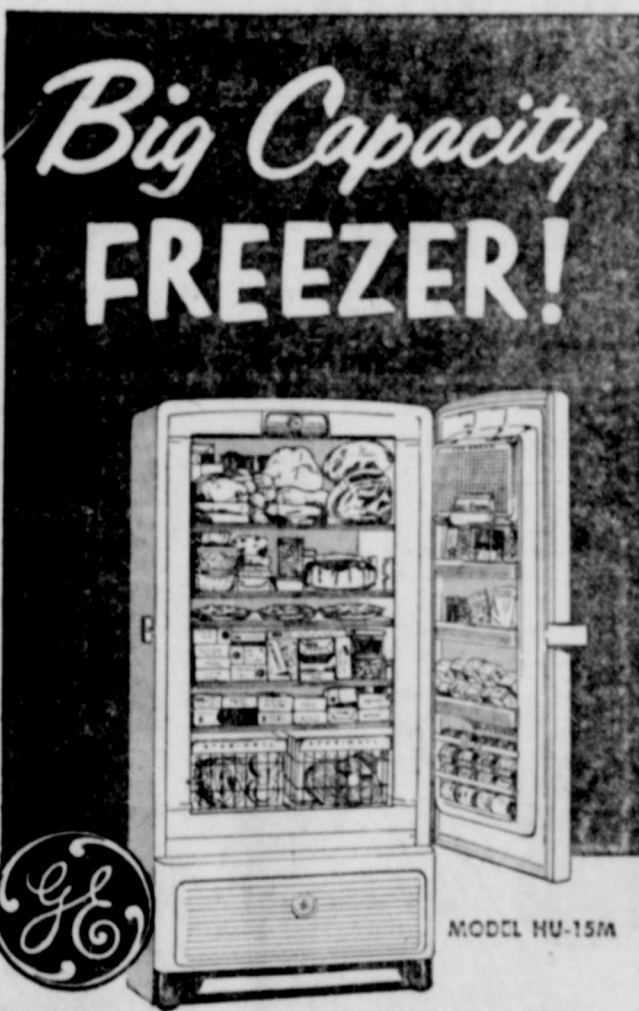
