He had been allowed to remain in the front part of the police station all day Sunday without being locked in a jail cell like other prisoners.

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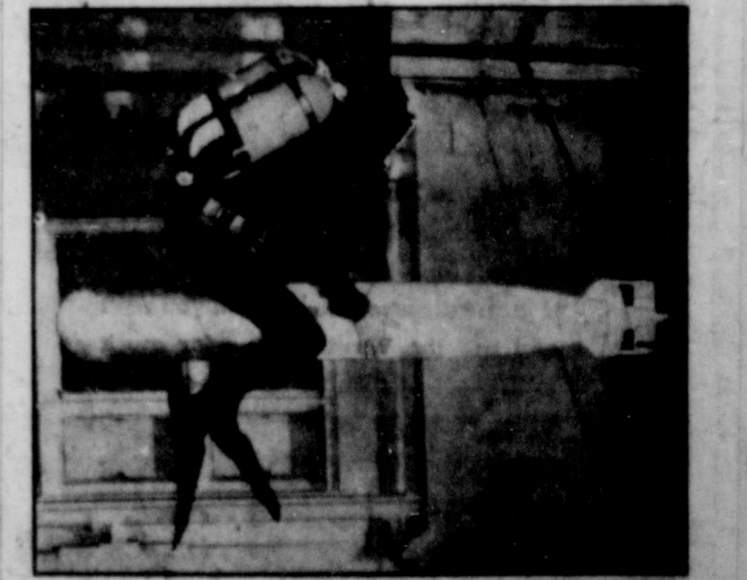

A tiny "planet," some 790 miles in diameter, is at the earth's core, according to a theory advanced by Prof. L. Don Lee, Harvard University seismologist. (Continued from Page One) us. Hearings are now in progress before certain committees of the Congress on this very sensitive situation. These hearings are highly secret and cannot be discussed, but some encouragement is to be had from the fact that Congress is inquiring into the reason why our missile program has not progressed further than it has.

This country absolutely cannot afford to have its missile program bogged down in governmental red tape, and something must be done and done soon if we are to reach the point which we should have attained in this respect two or three years ago.

It is my belief that our very survival is literally at stake. The A-bomb only helped speed the end of World War II, which we had already won. The ICBM is the best guarantee of avoiding a war we pray we will never have to fight.

We should either put one capable and qualified man at the head of such a project and give him the go-ahead sign with everything we have behind him, subject to periodic review at top level, or just admit defeat at the outset and put the budgeteers and coordinators in charge to insure that we are destroyed as cheaply and efficiently as possible.

Should Russia perfect the ICBM before the United States, they would never need attack us. Ballistic nuclear blackmail would freeze our present and potential allies into neutralization and inaction.

If we do nothing, Soviet infiltration and subversion would see to it that the lion's share of the world's resources trained people, raw materials, productive capacity, vital real estate for dispersal, etc.) would all shift to the Soviet side. The defeat of the United States would then be only a matter of time.

It is a nice slogan to say that "we have the most powerful Air Force in peace-time history," but what we must have is one better than Soviet Russia. As part of this need, we must beat the Soviets in the ICBM race, or the lights of freedom will begin going out all over the world.

 - 1/2 teaspoon salt
- Blend together shortening and unsulphured molasses. Add egg; beat well. Stir in bran and milk; let stand until most of moisture is taken up. Sift together flour, baking powder and salt. Add to molasses mixture with dates, stir only until blended. Fill greased muffin pans 3/4 full. Bake in moderate oven (350°F.) 30 minutes.
- YIELD: 12 small muffins.**
- Molasses Brown Bread**
- 1 cup sifted all-purpose flour
 - 2 teaspoons baking soda
 - 1 teaspoon salt
 - 1 cup quick rolled oats
 - 2 cups corn meal
 - 1 cup unsulphured molasses
 - 2 cups sour-milk
 - 1 cup raisins
- Sift together flour, soda and salt. Add quick rolled oats and corn meal; reserve 1/4 cup in which to coat raisins. Stir in unsulphured molasses and sour milk. Mix raisins with 1/4 cup dry mixture; add to batter and mix well. Turn into 4 greased No. 2 cans, filling each 3/4 full. Cover with metal foil or 2 layers of brown paper tied in place with string cord. Place on rack in large kettle with tight fitting cover. Pour in boiling water to approximately 1/2 of the height of can. Steam 2 hours.
- YIELD: 4 loaves.**

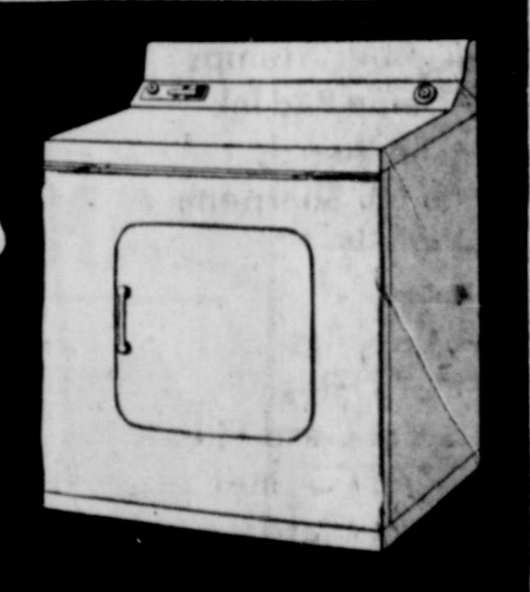

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Graham's Tour Has Created More Good Will Than Lend-Lease Dollars

DELHI, India — The triumphal tour of India by Billy Graham, in addition to its eternal values, has provided something tangible for the world to see now. It has created more good will for America here than all the millions of lend-lease dollars.

Billy is a clean-cut American that people can see. They can listen to what he says. He isn't some vague figure in the national budget that never filters down to the people in a language they can understand. The people of India like what they see in Billy and they have been listening with rapt attention to what he says. In less than three weeks he has talked to over half a million in person.

Along the same line, Russia accomplished with one airplane what dollars can never do. Nehru was presented a Russian plane while he was in Moscow last year. It

is a beautiful well-built plane. Everywhere Nehru goes people see the plane and remember that it is a gift from their Russian "friends."

Billy's tour has been phenomenal, beginning with riots in Bombay which focused world attention on the fact that he was here.

At every city and hamlet he has been met at the airport by civic and church leaders and ordinary people. He has had enough flower garlands to make him hump-shouldered. Five little girls got up at 4 a.m. to watch him catch an early morning plane. He has drawn crowds of 10,000 at 7 a.m. and 100,000 at 7 p.m. to hear him preach. A man walked 400 miles to shake his hand.

Thousands made decisions to change their way of life after listening to his simple message of Jesus Christ. This was true at every stop — Madras, Kottayam, Palamcottah and Trivandrum. When his plane landed at Hyderabad for a 30 minute stop en route to Delhi, a crowd of 5,000 rushed Billy to a nearby field where a loudspeaker was set up. He preached and gave an invitation. Scores responded. They were different people when they waved goodbye minutes later.

Other thousands greeted him with song and flowers when he landed at Delhi. Dag Hammarskjöld, secretary-general of UN, who landed two minutes later, arrived in comparative obscurity. Billy is an unofficial ambassador who did not come criticizing. He came with a message of love and goodwill. Unlike one U.S. tourist who said, "These foreigners don't understand anything," Billy has words of praise everywhere he goes.

"I have fallen in love with India," he said. "When I leave I hope to be an ambassador for India. I have been overwhelmed by the friendship that has greeted us everywhere and the tolerance with which people of other religions have greeted us."

The people love him for the words of hope and praise — they love him even more because he means them.

Texas Elite Surveyed For Duck Details

AUSTIN — Some important contributors to the future planning for waterfowl in Texas shall remain anonymous because they are the select 4500 license holders chosen at random for a statewide hunting survey.

These key informants have been assured that they need not sign their reports since, according to the Director of Wildlife Restoration, past experiences indicate that some persons approached for individual hunting data suspected a trap. And the comparatively few who declined to cooperate for that and other reasons threw the results of the spot check out of line.

The director emphasized to the special group in the original approach that a similar survey made last year "was in part responsible for the relaxation of duck regulations for the 1955-56 season."

Specifically, on the basis of the information obtained through the survey, the duck season in Texas was increased from 60 to 75 days. In that case harvest statistics were compared to carry over population figures and allowances made for greater hunting privileges.

Simultaneous with the opening of the fall duck shoot, the select 4500 were sent introductory letters with a questionnaire labeled "Texas Waterfowl Kill Survey." The hunters were asked to use the form as a basis for filling out an identical card mailed them at the end of the duck season.

Hunting Fines During Past Season Disclosed

The sordid side of the recent hunting season including four persons fined for selling deer, was revealed in the latest report announced by the Director of Law Enforcement for the Texas Game and Fish Commission.

The new compilation showed 462 arrests during December with all but 57 of those charged, paying fines ranging from \$5.00 for trespassing to \$200 for possession of game birds before the legal season opened and the same fine for shooting deer from an automobile. Fines paid totaled \$14,222.90 plus \$826.23 in court costs.

The deer selling prosecutions involved cases at Caddo, \$150 fines; Eldorado and Ft. McKavett, \$100, and Llano, \$64.

The Director of Law Enforcement described the peak season arrest summary as about average. "The comparatively few who invariably do something wrong," he observed, "must be contrasted with the hundreds of thousands of those who hunt for sport and obey the law. All but a few realize wildlife is here for their own benefit and therefore deserves a fair break."

Some of the more common offenses were night hunting, 42 cases; hunting from car, 32 cases; unplugged shotgun, 28 cases; killing quail in closed season, 20 cases and killing dove in closed season, 19.

Seven persons were charged with having untagged deer: eight for shooting ducks from a motor boat; one for hunting under license of another; one for refusing to permit search; one for shooting duck with a rifle and two for failure to keep proper cold storage records.

Some of the cases involved double trouble. A Shreveport, La. man paid a \$100 fine for possessing an untagged deer and the same levy for hunting at night, both plus costs. It was the same penalty for a Bossier City, La. resident and also for a Fort Worth man. A similar combination of fines was paid by a San Antonio man for possession of a buck deer in closed season and for night hunting.

New Reserve Armories In Texas Planned

An extensive program for construction of new Reserve armories in Texas has been announced by Brig. Gen. Lewis S. Griffing, chief of Texas military district. This program, according to Griffing, is aimed at furnishing suitable training facilities for the expanding U.S. Army Reserves, expected to result from passage of the Reserve Forces Act of 1955.

At the present time permanent type reserve armories are located at Houston, Beaumont, Ft. Worth and Austin. In other Texas cities and towns, Reserve training is conducted in either leased, rent-free facilities, or at Regular Army installations.

Already under construction is a 200-man type armory at Huntsville which is expected to be completed about Feb. 29; a 200-man armory at Lubbock about Aug. 31; 400-man armories at Dallas and Waco about Dec. 31; and an additional 1,000-man armory in Dallas expected to be completed about March 31, 1957.

General Griffing stated that it is expected that armories will be constructed in many more Texas cities and towns as fast as the Reserve strength in those cities and towns increases.

The Eastland County Home Demonstration Council recently met with twenty-four members present and eight of the ten clubs in the county represented. Mrs. York Eberhart, council chairman, presided.

Two committees — Health and safety, and consumer education — presented recommendations to the council. The "standing rules" were adopted for 1956.

Following the regular council meeting, there was a county THDA meeting with the county chairman, Mrs. John Love, presiding. A training meeting was given on the organization of the Texas Home Demonstration Association and the rules and by-laws governing it.

Mrs. M. M. Sheffield, North Star club; Mrs. Cecil Bostick, Nimrod club; and I. L. Lassiter, Word club, were elected delegates to the district THDA meeting to be held in Hillsboro April 23 and 24.

Mrs. Ernest Schaefer, Word club, was elected county THDA chairman.

Lawyers Seek To Double Bar Size In Nation

The nation's lawyers have set out to double the size of their national organization in a period of a single week.

Starting February 10, an estimated 10,000 lawyers — members of the American Bar Association — are participating in a synchronized nation-wide series of interviews with other lawyers. The object is to enroll 50,000 new members of the ABA by February 17.

This unique project, without precedent among national professional organizations, was hailed by U.S. Senator Lyndon Johnson of Texas, the Senate majority leader, in a statement to Congress. Senator Johnson called attention to the ABA's record of public service in its 77-year history, and said the success of the "50,000 New Members" campaign would enable the association to widen its sphere of service to the public and the legal profession.

E. Smythe Gambrell of Atlanta, Georgia, president of the ABA, termed the campaign a "mass revival" of the profession to permit "a future of broader and richer service and usefulness."

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Bible Comment:

Will You Journey to Bethlehem?

WHAT a wondrous story Luke tells, of the coming of the Christ-child, and of the meaning of His coming to the world! "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace, good will toward men."

We are so familiar with that story that perhaps we lose some of its full significance. We can hardly picture a world without Christ and the Christmas story. And yet it is only as we think back to accounts of a world without Christmas that we can realize what the coming of Jesus meant to the world.

Much has been said about the materializing of the paganizing of Christmas. It is true that for many persons Christmas is merely a joyous festival, with little relation to the first Christmas or the Christ.

But no forgetfulness of God, or violence of men, can wipe out the reality of the holy birth in Bethlehem, or the glory that surrounded the manger there.

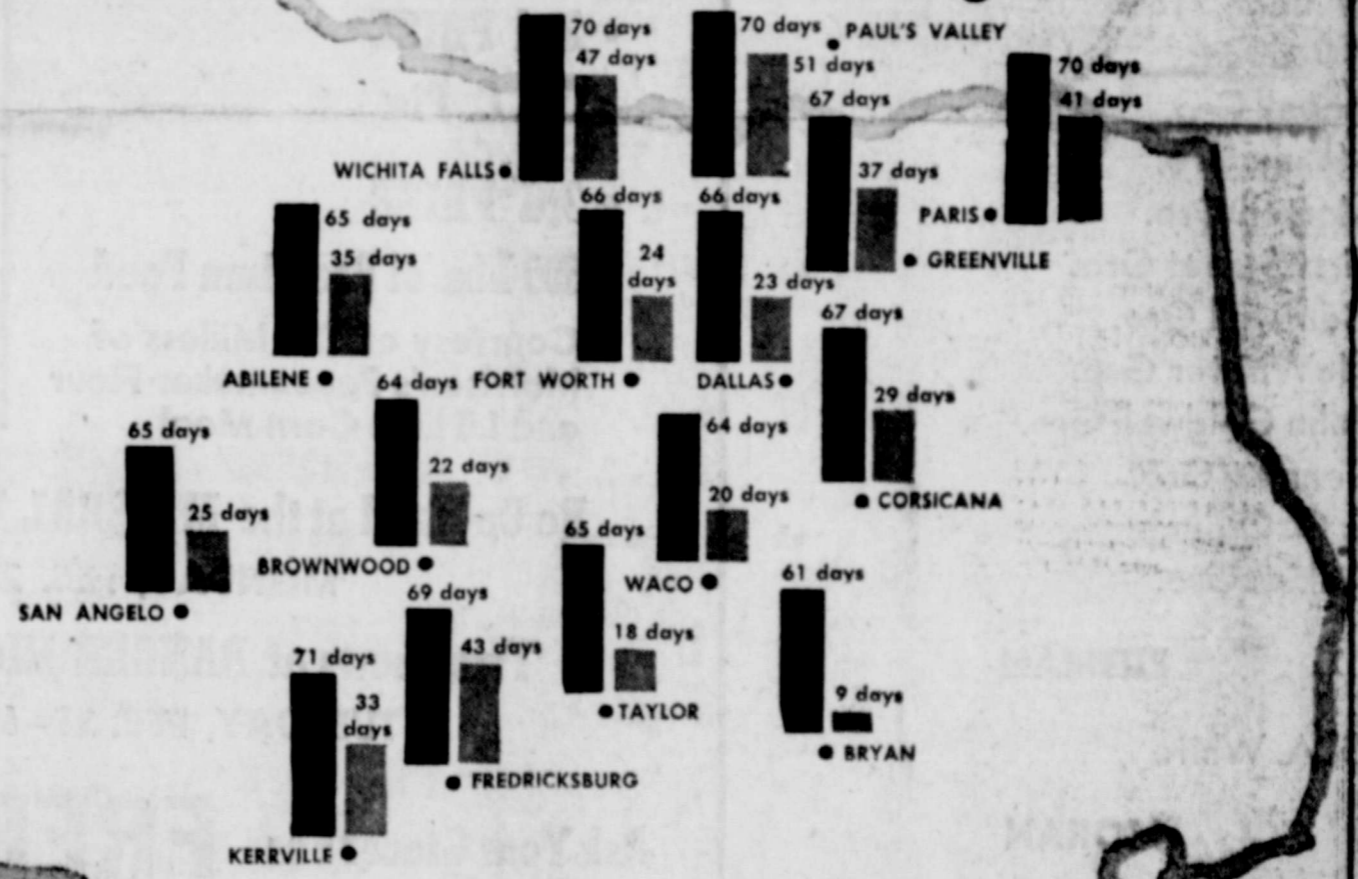

er have two exemptions which automatically eliminate any tax liability for income under \$1,200.

The old established date of March 15 by which income tax returns must be filed was abolished effective last year. All federal tax returns for individuals may now be filed on or before April 15. Although many persons believe that a tax return need only be postmarked by the due date, such is not the intent of the statute. Tax returns are supposed to be in the office of the Internal Revenue Service by the due date specified.

Tax forms and instructions will be received by most persons during January. The instructions being distributed this year contain the following statement: Internal Revenue Service will mail Form 1040 ES, as far as is practical, to each person who may need it. Anyone else required to file should obtain the form from an Internal Revenue Service office in time to file by April 15, 1956.

Declarations of estimated tax are required from all persons who expect gross income of more than \$400, plus \$600 times the number of exemptions which may be claimed, if more than \$100 of the income will not be subject to withholding.

Single persons with more than \$5,000 and married persons with more than \$10,000 expected gross income must file declarations of



estimated tax even though all of the income is subject to withholding.

Declarations of estimated tax, except those for farmers, must be filed by April 15. Like the income tax return, this date is one month later than the deadline for years before the new Revenue Act went into effect. However, the quarterly installment payment dates remain the same—June 15, September 15, and the last one on 15 of the following year.

If a person, other than a farmer, desires to file his income tax return and pay his tax in full, he may do this on or before January 15 instead of paying his last quarterly installment. It does not relieve anyone from filing the original declaration of estimated tax and making three payments on it. However, in most cases this provision does remove the possibility of a penalty for an under estimate of tax liability.

Farmers have special provisions concerning declarations of estimated tax, and may postpone the filing of any estimate until January 15 of the following year.

The penalty for underpayment of tax liability on the declaration of estimated tax was reduced by the 1954 act. There is now no underpayment if the taxpayer remits at least 70 per cent of his tax as shown on his final tax return. If there is an underpayment, the penalty is 6 per cent per annum interest on the additional amount which should have been remitted. It is expected that there will be more strict enforcement of this provision in the future by the Internal Revenue Service.

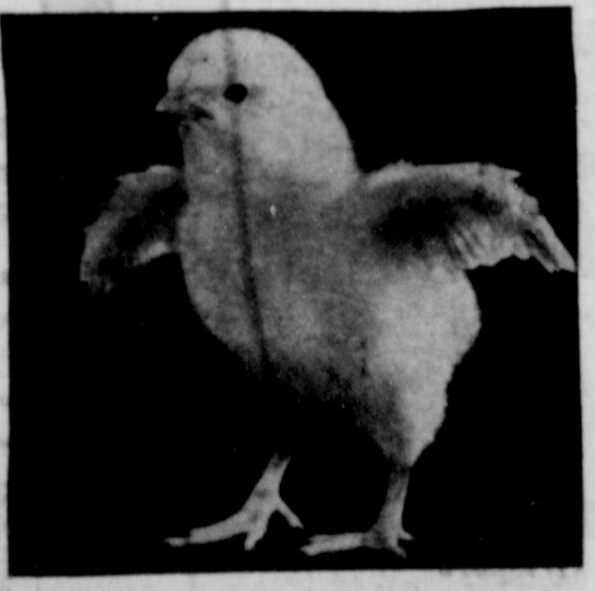
